

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SUPPLIES NEEDED

For coloring:

- crayons (spring for the big box, parents!)
- colored pencils (don't forget a pencil sharpener)
- felt-tipped pens (the cheap sets run out of ink quickly, so don't rely just on these)
- thin-tipped black felt pen for dot-to-dot connections
- regular pencils for word games


Other miscellaneous stuff:

- scissors (blunt-tipped for the smaller kids)
- paste or glue (white glue for glitter, paste for gluing paper together with less ripples)
- glitter
- paper towels for wiping hands off
- scotch tape (removable tape costs more but is a blessing for children, as they can easily reposition something if they get it in the wrong place, like clothing on a paper doll)
- loose t-shirts that kids can pull over their clothes to protect them, so that they don't have to worry about spills and smudges (available at low cost from craft stores)
- unprinted newsprint (available cheaply in large sizes from moving supply companies, protects carpets and tables without the inky smudges from newspapers)
- dropecloths from the hardware store (wide variety available)

Other supplies may be needed for individual projects, as described. Be sure to include an abundant supply of patience and laughter!

ideas that shine out, unclouded by compromise.




HELPFUL TIP: Before you color all the bees, ask a group to copy all of them on a copy machine! That way, if you lose one, or some get crumpled, you can make more of them easily! If an extra copy is made before you color them, then the copies are all a crisp, clean black and white.

If you're able to make copies first, then do! (On heavier paper - ask for "cover stock"! Then color all the bees, and then cut out all the little cards! You may think that would be a lot of work! Hey, Bee A Lot Of Work! Another name for a bee? But it's fun - you can use all the colors in your crayon box! Following all the bees, are also some little cards with Wind-Harp Butterflies, Birds and Bunnies on them! Instructions for how to play some games with the cards follows after all of the little cards. It's probably better if you don't glitter the little cards, because that would make them lumpy and harder to stack. Feel free to use any kind of crayons, markers or colored pencils (except for chalk which might smear).





Ribbons For Prizes So That Everyone Wins

When you play a game, it's nice if everyone wins something! So if you have more players than ribbons on these pages, just color copy them so that you have more to hand out! Before giving them out, put glue and glitter around the central circle to give them some sparkle and added importance! Parents, be sure to remind children that the upside point of playing a game is to have fun, so - wins or lose - everyone wins if they have fun playing! And an orange ribbon is just as pretty as a blue one! The ribbons below don't have numbers or awards on them. If you like, you can add these, but it may soften the blow of not being first, if the brightly-colored ribbons, sparkling with glitter, are not numbered. Then you can be creative about how you hand them out! If you make some copies of these ribbons while they are still black and white, then you won't run out! Then they can be colored and glittered. Suggested colors: blue, red, yellow, orange, purple and green. Don't just stop with first, second and third prize ribbons. If there are six players, go ahead and bring for six ribbons - with a lot of praise!








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"Bee Creative" Games To Play
With The Four "B's" --
Bees, Birds, Butterflies & Bunnies Cards!

1. Have A Story Bee!

Turn all the cards face down and mix them up! Then put them in a stack, face down. Then take turns drawing cards, but don't look at them until all the cards are drawn. Then turn all of your face up, and make up stories about them! Take turns telling your stories, or make them up together and share your bees by using your bees for Birds, Butterflies and Bunnies) test the other players' bees for Birds, Butterflies and Bunnies! Any funny story that you can think of is just fine -- have fun and don't worry about it.

2. Have A Spelling Bee!

Turn all the cards face down again and mix them all up. Then put them in a stack, face down. The first player takes the top card and reads it out. The second player then tries to spell it, without looking at it! If you really want to laugh, though, you have to realize that "bee" is a pun on every card! (A pun is a word that has at least two meanings.) Here, "bee" and "be" sound alike, although usually "be" is spelled with one "e" for something like "be happy!" So when you spell the words, just spell whatever follows "bee". Keep track of how many words each player gets right -- the one who can spell the most words right wins! (The Bird and Bunny cards are not ideal for this -- just the Bee cards, is a better way to go on this one.)

3. The Wonderful Bee Threes!

Mix the Bee cards up face down, and then put them in a stack. Take turns drawing the top card, and then look at it and think of three ways to do what it says! For example, "Bee On Time" -- three ways? For dinner, for school, and for -- what? Basketball practice, or piano lessons? Or "Bee Considerate" -- of your mom, your dad, and -- who else? Your brother or sister? Or "Bee Happy" -- about what? The sunshine, your breakfast, and -- what? Being able to play after school? Or "Be Loving" -- in the summer, winter and spring? Bee Creative -- it's fun!

4. Match The Bees!

The best way to play this is to make a copy of all of the bees on a copy machine, either before or after you color them. If the copies are made after you color them, then you only have to color one set. If you make copies while they are still black-and-white, then you have some to use you love them. Or don't! But with two sets of Bees, you turn the cards face down, mix them up, put them into a stack, and take turns drawing the cards from the top. Every time you get a pair, put them face up on the table or floor. If you get a lot of cards that have no matches, you can trade some with other players, or put two cards back for another extra one-card draw, when your turn comes around. Say, for example, that you have seven cards with no matches. On your turn, you can draw one card, and keep it, or also give two cards back for another one-card draw. If you want to, everyone can put the returned cards face down in another pile, and when the stack runs out, you can all draw from that pile again. The one who gets the most pairs wins!

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Speak "A. Y."

A Fun Secret Language To Learn!

Just take the first letter of a word and place it at the end, and then add "AY" (rhymes with "day"). That's all there is to it!

So . . . cat becomes "at-cay", hat becomes "at-hay", and boot becomes "oot-bay"!

Let's try a whole sentence! "What a beautiful day!"

This becomes, "at-whay a eautiful-bay ay-day!" Don't worry about changing small words, like "a", "of", "it", "is", or "the".

In fact, if you have trouble with any particular word, or don't know how to change it, just leave it alone, speak it normally, and just change the easier words. This is supposed to be fun, not a lot of work!

Try doing these sentences. The answers are upside-down at the end of the page.

2. "Where is my big red beach ball?"
3. "We like to take our great big dog for walks in the park."

2. "ere-whay is my ig-hay ed-ay each-hay all-hay?"
3. "We like-lay to ake-lay our ate-gray ig-bay of-ay-day for alke-way in the ark-pay!"

5. Game Board Fun, with Bees, Birds, Bunnies & Butterflies!

You can take the game board from this book, cut out the page, and use dice and tokens from any board game that you have. Make separate stacks of Bees, Birds, Bunnies & Butterflies, and when you land on certain colors of dice, you can draw from these different piles! You can make up the rules as you go along, as long as they're fun, or at least funny!

Every time you draw a butterfly card, think of the name of a flower, or describe a flower, real or invented.

Every time you draw a funny card, tell some experience you've ever had, or would like to have, with listening in the way described on the card.

Every time you draw a bird, think of a nice song you know, and sing it, if you like! Don't say you can't think of any song - everyone knows "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star!" There aren't a lot of bird cards in this edition of this book, so making copies would help to give you more bird cards.

You can color the squares of the game board any color that you like. Pick one color, say green, that is a background (if you land on that square, with a dice throw, then you go back two squares). Another color is a step-ahead-two-squares color.

You can decide that the End destination is anything desirable to you and whenever you are playing with - a mall, or a restaurant, or playground, or amusement park, or swimming pool, or - ! You name it! Whoever gets there first gets the first prize, but remember - everyone gets there eventually!

6. Bee Twice As Many Players As You Really Have!


Are there only two or three of you? Or just five you? Do you wish you had more children to play with, but there are no play dates set for right now? Just gather up all your dolls and stuffed animals and let them play with you! Draw out some cards for each of them, and take their turns for them! You can use funny voices, pretending to be your teddy bears and dolls! You can have your dolls and stuffed animals talking to one another! (Would you please see Considerate! Your funny little puns is in my way! You can dress up your dolls. Come on, we're going to a Spelling Bee! This is one fun way to see Creatine!

7. Go For A Walk Outside, And See How Many Birds, Bees, Butterflies And Bunnies You Can See!

Now obviously, this depends on where you live. If you live in a dangerous neighborhood, then skip this suggestion! But if you live in a place where you can look up and see birds, count them! Or in the spring and summer, count the bees on all the flowers! (Be Careful - don't get too close!) Don't believe it or not: If you live in a city, there are places out in the country where you can take a walk and see little butterflies and bunnies! And if you've read *When You Go Out in the Country*, you can look for other animals or even other fungi! Every week is a Little Makew, every little fairy spider is a Mummy or Mummy, every caterpillar is an Umbrella. It's fun! But remember to respect the birds, bees, butterflies, and bunnies. They all need to be safe and free. So don't try to hurt them or catch them. Let them be happy and free. If you love them, do this for them. Respect them, and let them go on doing their thing. See them, count them, count them, wish them well, and go on your way. That is the best way to show your love for them - by looking at them, and trying to do what is best for them! Even respect a big or a wolf - each one has its own life to live, and some are good, and some are bad. And in fact, so do you! Remember that you yourself are special, unique, and have something special to give to the world!




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SUNNY STAR




Bend a pipe cleaner in half, and then bend it into a sort of T-shape at the top. Then turn the sides of the T up and sort of squish them into a blobby shape. You may want to do this with two pipe cleaners to get a really nice blob. If you use two, you could use two different colors. Sparkling gold pipe cleaners are available at some craft stores, but the velvety ones are fine too. Then you just stick the two ends of the pipe cleaners through the two clock hands and the hole in the center of the plate, as shown.



Then pull the blob somewhat tight against the paper, but loose enough to be able to move the clock hands.

Then all you have to do is bend the long ends of the pipe cleaners out, on the back of the plate, and you have your clock!

You can decorate it in any way, and give these for presents. Everyone is glad to get a paper plate clock from someone who made it all special.



Think of other decorations you could use - sequins, beads, lace, pieces of pretty colored fabric that you could cut out with your scissors and glue down, and you can even glue artificial flowers, or dried beans in a pretty pattern, or noodles.

HELPPFUL TIP: If you piece dried noodles in bowls of water with water color in them, just for a few minutes, and then take them out and let them dry, these are bright and colorful things to glue on to projects like these. Don't leave the noodles in the water long enough to become soft, and don't mix the colors of noodles up while wet. Macaroni, or little lasagna noodles, anything like that, can make pretty glue-ons when dry. Probably it is best to let them dry on a paper towel overnight. Tell little children not to eat them, though - they are edible, but uncooked noodles are hard to digest.



MAKING CLOCKS FROM PAPER PLATES!

This is really fun! You can start with plain white paper plates, or colored paper plates, or even ones with flowers or patterns already on the borders! Here's what you need to have on hand:

- paper plates
- felt-tip markers
- crayons
- glitter & glue
- scissors
- pipe cleaners

First you need to draw the numbers on the plate, inside of the border or the part of the plate that curves up. Draw a small circle in the center of the plate, too.

Then cut out the arrow hands of the clock, below, but don't cut the holes in the ends of the hands yet. First place them on the plate (ask a grownup for help, if you need to) and see how long the hands should be. One hand (the minute hand) should be longer than the other (the hour hand). Then you cut holes in the ends of the hands, to match a hole in the center of your plate. To easily cut a hole, fold the paper in half, and then cut out a half-moon from the fold! This works better with the paper clock hands than with the plate, because the plate is stiffer. A grownup may have to help you if you are very little, but a hole needs to be poked in the center of the plate, just wide enough for two pipe cleaners to fit through.



If you don't have a computer yourself, there are places you can go to have this done at low cost. Office supply places sell paper for computers that is specifically designed to make decals for T-shirts, and all you have to do is feed the paper through a color printer, and iron on the decal! You can make squares for quilts, or sides of pillows. Many department stores now have departments that can make a custom set of mugs from your photos, and there are specialty shops that will do this as well, listed in shopping mall directories or possibly in the yellow pages for your geographical area. These might be listed under discounter or china. Or just ask at the service desk of any large shopping mall - someone will know where you can have this done!

HELPPFUL TIP: If you are making pretty, soft pillows for children to play with, as well as learn on, a round shape is easier for throwing around - it is easier to catch, and easier to pitch to a specific person!




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The Saga Of Soggy, The Rainforest Froggy

The Basic Snowflake Fold

Even though real snow crystals have six sides or prongs, paper snowflakes generally have eight or sixteen, as this is easier to fold evenly. Try to fold carefully, so that the edges meet -- this will help keep detail from being lost as you cut.

1. To make a square from a rectangular sheet of paper, first make a diagonal fold.
2. Trim off excess at bottom, leaving a triangle.
3. Fold in half again.
4. Fold in half again.
5. Fold in half again.
6. This cut gives the snowflake its roundness. When you trim off the top triangle, cut down a little from the paper edge, as shown by the dotted line. This trims off any irregularities in the top edge, so that you are less likely to lose the top of a line (because of variances on inside layers due to cutting or folding).
7. An alternative to the usual final cut for your wedge is to trim at a slight angle. You can measure first, and cut so that both sides of the wedge are the same length.

Whether you cut to Step 6 or to Step 7 is up to you. One way of cutting is not necessarily better than the other -- the effects are a little different. One way gives you taller lines alternating with shorter lines, and the other gives you lines of all the same height. (If you cut to the top of the wedge). Try one wedge each way, and unfold them to compare the results.

Cut the Pretty Snowflake!

First fold a snowflake wedge, as shown on the opposite page, and then trace or draw this pattern on it and cut!
