Testimony period for party in

(opening thirty days prior thereto)

Testimony period for party in
position of defendant to close: July 11, 2009
(opening thirty days prior thereto)

Rebuttal testimony period to close August 25, 2009
(opening fifteen days prior thereto)

¹ However, in the future, consented motions to extend discovery and/or testimony periods should comply with the requirement of Trademark Rule 2.121(d). That rule requires that stipulated or consented motions to extend those time periods be presented in the form used in a trial order.

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In each instance, a copy of the transcript of testimony together with copies of documentary exhibits, must be served on the adverse party within thirty days after completion of the taking of testimony. Trademark Rule 2.125.

Briefs shall be filed in accordance with Trademark Rule 2.128(a) and (b).

An oral hearing will be set only upon request filed as provided by Trademark Rule 2.129.

NEWS FROM THE TTAB:

The USPTO published a notice of final rulemaking in the Federal Register on August 1, 2007, at 72 F.R. 42242. By this notice, various rules governing Trademark Trial and Appeal Board inter partes proceedings are amended. Certain amendments have an effective date of August 31, 2007, while most have an effective date of November 1, 2007. By one rule change effective August 31, 2007, the Board's standard protective order is made applicable to all TTAB inter partes cases, whether already pending or commenced on or after that date. However, as explained in the final rule and chart, this change will not affect any case in which any protective order has already been approved or imposed by the Board. Further, as explained in the final rule, parties are free to agree to a substitute protective order or to supplement or amend the standard order even after August 31, 2007, subject to Board approval.
