RESPONSE TO OPPOSITION

**I. First Ground for Opposition – Likelihood of Confusion
15 .S.C. § 1052(d) (Vail Trademarks & VVF)**

The wording “VAIL/BEAVERCREEK, COLORADO USA” is geographically descriptive and thus will not cause a likelihood of confusion. Trademark Act Section 2(e)(2), 15 U.S.C. §1052(e)(2); *see* TMEP §§1210, 1210.01(a). **VAIL/BEAVERCREEK, COLORADO USA** is primarily geographically descriptive because, the primary significances of, “**VAIL**” and “**BEAVERCREEK**” are generally known geographic places or locations. In this case, the primary significance of the wording “**VAIL**” is a generally known geographic location, namely, an incorporated town located in Eagle County, in the state of Colorado; the term “**BEAVER CREEK**” is also a generally known geographic location, namely, an unincorporated community in Eagle County, Colorado that is located in close proximity to Vail, Colorado. *Please see attached third-party website evidence.* The primary significance of

“**VAIL/BEAVERCREEK**” is thus, geographic. *See In re Narada Prods., Inc.*, 57 USPQ2d 1801 (TTAB 2001) (finding the primary significance of CUBA L.A. to be geographic); *In re London & Edinburgh Ins. Group Ltd.*, 36 USPQ2d 1367 (TTAB 1995) (finding the primary significance of LONDON & EDINBURGH to be geographic). According to the USPTO, the addition of generic or highly descriptive wording to a geographic word or term does not diminish that geographic word or term’s primary geographic significance. TMEP §1210.02(c)(ii); *see, e.g., In re JT Tobacconists*, 59 USPQ2d 1080 (TTAB 2001) (holding MINNESOTA CIGAR COMPANY primarily geographically descriptive of cigars); *In re Carolina Apparel*, 48 USPQ2d 1542 (TTAB 1998) (holding CAROLINA APPAREL primarily geographically descriptive of retail clothing store services); *In re Chalk’s Int’l Airlines Inc.*, 21 USPQ2d 1637 (TTAB 1991) (holding PARADISE ISLAND AIRLINES primarily geographically descriptive of the transportation of passengers and goods by air). Therefore, the geographic significance of **VAIL/BEAVERCREEK, COLORADO USA** caused the Office to require the applicant to disclaim the unregistrable part of the mark **VAIL/BEAVERCREEK, COLORADO USA**, 15 U.S.C. §1056(a). Subsequently, the applicant disclaimed the geographically descriptive wording apart from the mark as shown. *See* 15 U.S.C. §1056(a); TMEP §§1210.06(a), 1213.03(a). The computerized printing format for the Office’s *Trademark Official Gazette* required a standardized format for a disclaimer. TMEP §1213.08(a)(i). The following is the standard format used by the Office and was utilized by the applicant:

NO CLAIM IS MADE TO THE EXCLUSIVE RIGHT TO USE "SKI" AND "VAIL /BEAVER CREEK, COLORADO USA" APART FROM THE MARK AS SHOWN.

**II. Second Ground for Opposition – False Suggestion of Connection
15 .S.C. § 1052(a) (Vail Valley Foundation)**

Applicant's Mark does not falsely suggest a connection with the Vail Valley Foundation or the **Fédération Internationale de Ski (FIS)**. The Mark does not incorporate the **Fédération Internationale de Ski (FIS)**; and, the Mark does not mention the **Fédération Internationale de Ski (FIS)**, the Vail Valley Foundation, or Vail Trademarks. Therefore, the mark does not falsely suggest a connection with the Vail Valley Foundation or Vail Trademarks.



Beaver Creek is an unincorporated community in Eagle County, Colorado, United States. Beaver Creek is located immediately south of the town of Avon and encompasses the Beaver Creek Resort and adjacent business, lodging, and residential areas. The U.S. Post Office at Avon (ZIP Code 81620) serves Beaver Creek postal addresses.^[1]

History

The Beaver Creek area was settled about 1951. The Beaver Creek Resort opened in 1980 with 425 skiable acres, 4 chairlifts and 28 runs. As of April 2008, the Resort reported 1,815 skiable acres, 17 lifts, and 149 runs. The late U.S. President Gerald Ford and Betty Ford owned a home in Beaver Creek. Steve Fossett also lived here.

The community is home to the annual AEI World Forum, founded by Ford, and the annual Bravo! Vail Valley Music Festival.

Geography

Beaver Creek is located at 39°36′18″N 106°30′55″W﻿ (39.604895,-106.515305).

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


The **Town of Vail** is a Home Rule Municipality located in Eagle County, Colorado, United States. According to 2005 Census Bureau estimates, the population of the city is 4,589.^[6] The town was established in 1966 at the base of Vail Ski Resort, which opened in December 1962. The town is famous for having the second largest single ski mountain in North America (after Whistler Blackcomb) and other winter sports in addition to being a year round destination for outdoor activities.

History

The town of Vail was incorporated in 1966, four years after the opening of Vail Ski Resort. The ski area was founded by Pete Seibert and the local rancher Earl Eaton in 1962, between the town of Eagle and Vail Pass. The pass was named after Charles Vail, the highway engineer that routed U.S. Highway 6 through the valley in 1940.

Seibert, a New England native, served in the U.S. Army's 10th Mountain Division during World War II, which trained at Camp Hale, southeast of Vail near Minturn and Leadville. He was seriously wounded in Italy and was told he should become a professional skier when he recovered.

Geography



Vail is located at $39^{\circ}38'09''\text{N}$ $106^{\circ}21'47''\text{W}$.^[7] Its average elevation is 8150 feet (2484 m) above sea level.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the town has a total area of 4.5 square miles (11.8 km²), with no lakes (there is, however, at least one pond). Gore Creek flows from east to west through the center of town.

Mount of the Holy Cross is visible from the top of Vail mountain near the top of the Eagle Bahn Gondola.

Vail is located in the White River National Forest and is leased from the United States Forest Service.

Vail Mountain

Vail Mountain has a maximum elevation of 11,570 feet (3527 m) and a low of 8,120 feet (2476 m), giving a vertical drop of 3450 feet (1052 m).^[8] It has 5289 acres (21 km²) skiable, 33 lifts, 193 marked trails on three faces: the front side, the back bowls, and Blue Sky Basin. The seven back bowls are Sun Down Bowl, Sun Up Bowl, Teacup Bowl, China Bowl, Siberia Bowl, Inner Mongolia Bowl, and Outer Mongolia Bowl. Vail was ranked as the top ski resort in SKI Magazine's reader's poll for the 2006-07 season.^[9]

Climate

Vail is high in the mountains, and therefore experiences pleasantly warm summers and cold winters. Depending on the classification used, it is either an alpine or subarctic climate. The temperature rarely rises above freezing from Thanksgiving to late February. The town of Vail receives an average of 200 inches of snowfall per season, with even more in the surrounding mountains. Roads may occasionally close. In summer, the thermometer can reach the 80s, but more often hovers around the low to mid-70s. Combined with brisk mountain breezes, this makes summers refreshing and cool.

Vail transportation

Vail is served by Eagle County Airport, which is near Gypsum. Native Americans used to call the area near this airport the "hole in the sky" because storms seemed to avoid it. Vail is modeled after European ski towns, many of which are car-free, and the town is partially car-free. Vail hosts the largest zero-fare shuttle bus system in the USA and has one hybrid-electric bus (For schedules see Vail Transit^[11], for estimated arrival times visit NextBus^[12]). At each of the several bus stops a sign tells you how long until the next two buses arrive.

Major highways



Interstate 70 runs east-west through the middle of Vail and is the only road to or from Vail, with three interchanges serving West Vail, Vail (Main) and East Vail. East of Vail the highway climbs Vail Pass and then travels to Denver, located 97 miles away. To the West, it meets Highways 6 and 24 at Dowds Junction, passes through Avon, Eagle, and Grand Junction and reaches the State of Utah, where it ends at the intersection with Interstate 15.

At the extreme West end of Vail, Highway 6 merges onto I-70 at Dowds Junction. It roughly follows the original Highway 6 route until the two highways diverge again in Silverthorne, 31 miles to the East.

Demographics

As of the census^[13] of 2000, there were 4,531 people, 2,165 households, and 762 families residing in the town. The population density was 999.0 people per square mile (385.3/km²). There were 5,389 housing units at an average density of 1,188.1/sq mi (458.3/km²). The racial makeup of the town was 94.13% White, 0.29% African American, 0.49% Native American, 1.66% Asian, 0.09% Pacific Islander, 1.43% from other races, and 1.92% from two or more races. Hispanic or Latino of any race were 6.20% of the population.

There were 2,165 households out of which 11.8% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 30.0% were married couples living together, 3.0% had a female householder with no husband present, and 64.8% were non-families. 33.2% of all households were made up of individuals and 2.7% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.09 and the average family size was 2.62.

In the town the population was spread out with 9.9% under the age of 18, 14.8% from 18 to 24, 47.9% from 25 to 44, 22.6% from 45 to 64, and 4.7% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 32 years. For every 100 females there were 140.1 males. For every 100 females age 18 and over, there were 143.0 males.

The median income for a household in the town was \$56,680, and the median income for a family was \$66,389. Males had a median income of \$33,534 versus \$32,065 for females. The per capita income for the town was \$42,390. About 1.8% of families and 6.6% of the population were below the poverty line, including 0.9% of those under age 18 and 7.2% of those age 65 or over.

Economy

The Vail economic community relies mostly upon tourism. Though the majority of the tourism industry revolves around seasonal winter activities like skiing and snowboarding, Vail has become increasingly popular as a summer vacation destination. Popular summer activities that take advantage of Vail's picturesque surroundings include guided hikes, mountain biking, horseback riding, carriage rides and fishing. Vail is also developing as a cultural center, with various art and music venues throughout the summer. Vail also has a developed culinary center with a diverse variety of restaurants.

The Town of Vail provides one of the country's largest free bus services, year-round. The "In-Town Shuttle" provides frequent service (5 minutes during peak winter times, 15 minutes non-peak) between Golden Peak, Vail Village, the Business District, and Lionshead, with real time schedule information provided at bus stops via GPS technology to track buses. Other routes centering on the Transportation Center service East and West Vail areas (and points in-between) on a scheduled, but less frequent basis.^[14]

Eagle County provides modestly priced bus service from the Transportation Center with service to Vail, Leadville, Minturn, Eagle-Vail, Avon, Beaver Creek, Edwards, Eagle, Gypsum and Dotsero.

Government

Vail has a council-manager form of government and is led by a seven-member town council elected at-large.

Education

Vail's public schools are part of Eagle County School District RE-50 with high school students attending Battle Mountain High School. Eagle County Schools also offers the Vail Ski & Snowboard Academy, a joint program with area ski programs for students in grades 8-12 that are involved in competitive skiing and snowboarding.

Private schools in Vail include Vail Mountain School (K-12), Vail Christian High School (9-12), St. Clare of Assisi Catholic School (K-8) and The Vail Academy (PK-8).

Higher education is offered through the Vail Eagle Valley campus of Colorado Mountain College.

Media

The Vail Daily ^[17] is published by Colorado Mountain News Media ^[18]. Alternative news and information sources are offered by RealVail.com ^[19] and the Vail Mountaineer ^[20].

A broadcast translator for public radio station KUNC allows listeners in the Eagle Valley to listen at 99.7 FM.

Two specialty television networks have stations in Vail, Plum TV and Resort Sports Network. The latter, branded as TV-8, also broadcasts on the low-powered UHF station K45IE. The Ski Channel is available only on DirecTV on Channel 1860.

During the mid 1970s, Vail became known as the Western White House for President Gerald Ford, and he did a good bit of the nation's business from The Lodge at Vail. Cabinet members and other high-ranking government officials were a common sight during this time. The national media followed Ford to Vail and almost daily they beamed television pictures of Vail's slopes into living rooms all over the world. That media saturation, as much or more than anything else, put Vail on the map as an international destination ski resort.^[21]

Eagle County is the thirteenth most populous of the 64 counties of the State of Colorado in the United States. The county is named for the Eagle River. The county population was 41,659 at U.S. Census 2000.^[2] The county seat is the Town of Eagle. The Edwards Micropolitan Statistical Area comprises Eagle County and Lake County.

History


Eagle County was created by the Colorado legislature on February 11, 1883, from portions of Summit County. It was named after the Eagle River, which runs through the county. The county seat was originally set in Red Cliff, Colorado, but was moved to the town of Eagle in 1921.

Geography

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 1692 square miles (4382.3 km²), of which 1688 square miles (4371.9 km²) is land and 4 square miles (10.4 km²) (0.23%) is water.

Much of the county is taken up by White River National Forest, and much of the rest is managed by the Bureau of Land Management. Interstate 70 crosses the county from east to west.

The Eagle River rises in the southeastern part of the county. It receives Gore Creek at Dowds Junction, and joins the Colorado River in the west. Fryingpan River and the Roaring Fork River intersect the southwest corner of the county.

As of the census^[5] of 2000, there were 41,659 people, 15,148 households, and 9,013 families residing in the county. The population density was 25 people per square mile (10/km²). There were 22,111 housing units at an average density of 13 per square mile (5/km²). The racial makeup of the county was 85.35% White, 0.34% Black or African American, 0.71% Native American, 0.82% Asian, 0.07% Pacific Islander, 10.80% from other races, and 1.90% from two or more races. 23.24% of the population were Hispanic or Latino of any race.

There were 15,148 households out of which 32.70% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 50.00% were married couples living together, 5.60% had a female householder with no husband present, and 40.50% were non-families. 20.90% of all households were made up of individuals and 1.90% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.73 and the average family size was 3.17.

In the county the population was spread out with 23.50% under the age of 18, 11.40% from 18 to 24, 42.10% from 25 to 44, 20.00% from 45 to 64, and 3.00% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 31 years. For every 100 females there were 121.00 males. For every 100 females age 18 and over, there were 125.80 males.

The median income for a household in the county was \$62,682, and the median income for a family was \$68,226. Males had a median income of \$37,603 versus \$30,579 for females. The per capita income for the county was \$32,011. About 3.90% of families and 7.80% of the population were below the poverty line, including 6.80% of those under age 18 and 7.60% of those age 65 or over.
