A former all-southern back at Vanderbilt in 1903, President Tigert served his first term as SEC president in 1935. Last March he was selected to head the conference again for 1946.

Fighting Gator Band . . .

The University of Florida Fighting Gator Band has always provided a between half highlight for all Florida football fans, but for 1946 an even better band than in past years will take the field to boost fans and team alike.

Abandoning the old military style uniform with its braided coat and pom-pom hat, the band this year has gone "modern" with a snappy sub-tropic uniform that will feature caps, short coats with inverted lapels in white, white belt, blue trousers with an orange stripe, and white trousers with an orange stripe.

The new uniform designed especially for Florida departs entirely from the more formal military type uniform which will be retained only for military occasions, providing a modern touch for a growing football team. The band will be eighty pieces strong.

Football Outlook . . .

The University of Florida's 1946 grid eleven remains the number one question mark in the minds of Head Coach Raymond (Bear) Wolf and his staff, even as final preparations are in progress for one of the toughest schedules in the history of the school.

With a power packed Southeastern Conference schedule on tap, and with a team faced with the prospect of running from a new single and double wing formation, Wolf's "Fighting Gators" are not going to have an easy time of it. On successive weekends they face the University of Mississippi, Tulane, Vanderbilt, University of Miami (last season's Orange Bowl champs) and North Carolina.

Then with a week's rest they engage Georgia, Villanova, North Carolina State and Auburn on successive weekends. There isn't a "breather" in the lot, all have improved squads, all are good contenders.

Florida has fair prospects in approximately 22 former players of previous years who have returned from service in World War II. There are 38 veterans on the squad currently working out. Wolf also has some strong prospects from last year's high school teams, but has a difficult task confronting him in getting both these players and his service returnees in shape for the rough competition ahead of him.

Spring practice saw a group of scrappy hopefuls who went through the daily routine of learning the Wolf technique, and the current practice sessions of prospective squad members who were not here in the Spring, reveals much the same—all of which adds up to the fact that Wolf is instilling in them an enthusiastic spirit and an aggressiveness that will make them sharp competitors for all foes. But, lack of experience, Wolf believes, will handicap them for a berth among the S.E.C.'s top contenders.

Wolf's smooth, tricky double and single wing style is not new in Southern circles, for many S.E.C. teams became acquainted with the Wolf game while he was coaching North Carolina to a top position in the Southern Conference. Later as head mentor for the Georgia Pre-Flight team in 1942, southern teams again saw the power he can put in his eleven.

Both Spring and Summer practice sessions saw Wolf and his staff concentrating on the offensive play of his single and double wing. Little emphasis has been placed on the defensive play, Wolf deciding to leave that until the final stretch session began September 2 when he called his entire squad together. In all sessions Wolf has emphasized offensive play, showing a smooth

tricky offense that won him fame both at North Carolina and Georgia Pre-Flight.

Highlights of the two sessions have been the continued spirit and aggressiveness shown by each member of the squad. Wolf's quiet but firm approach to football instruction has instilled a confidence in the team that will inevitably earn them the title of "Fighting Gators".

Wolf insists it is still too early to point to any single player or players as outstanding or good, but maintains "they have all improved and will earn individual recognition under fire".

He says he will know what the prospects of the team are when he sees them "under fire" against Ole Miss at the opening game. Until then, he says he is reserving his opinion, for they can "all look good in practice". He's not using the crying towel, but in his own words, "wants to wait and see". He's rebuilding and that, he says, will take time.

Starting out at Florida this year, Wolf faces the task of putting the Gators on the road to higher recognition in the conference—that he will do it, there is little doubt—but that it will take time is a certainty—time to build Florida strength and material equal to the strength and power of S.E.C.'s top contenders.

A New College . . .

THE COLLEGE OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION, HEALTH AND ATHLETICS

The University of Florida's College of Physical Education, Health and Athletics under Dean Dennis K. (Dutch) Stanley, veteran coach and athletic director, is one of the first colleges of its kind to be set up in any University in the United States.

Established as a division of the University last January and elevated to the rank of a College in April, the College of Physical Education, Health and Athletics incorporates five departments—Student Health, Intercollegiate Athletics, Intramural Athletics and Recreation, Required Physical Education and the Professional Curriculum.

In the professional division of the college courses leading to a BA degree in physical education, health and athletics are offered in a curriculum planned to fit takers for jobs in industry as well as in school athletic and recreation work.

The College has taken over control and direction of the student health program, which includes operation of the infirmary. Head Football Coach Raymond (Bear) Wolf has been placed in charge of the intercollegiate athletic program and Spurgeon Cherry named director of intramural athletics.

An important unit of the College of Physical Education, Health and Athletics is the required physical education program which gets under way in September.

All incoming non-veteran freshmen will be required to enroll in the college this fall and after passing physical examinations to establish their efficiency will be given the basic course consisting of track and field, tumbling, boxing, swimming and team games.



Press Box Information

The Press Box for all State games on the 1946 University of Florida Football schedule will be operated by the Publicity Department. As has been the custom for the past several years only members of the press actually working the games will be admitted to the press box.

In keeping with a general policy no complimentary tickets are issued the press for seats in the stands, therefore a member of the press not working the game must pay the price of admission. The University realizes this policy may be stern and narrow in its application, but at the same time proposes that it is a fair and just policy inasmuch as there is no discrimination. Everyone pays for admission, the coaching staff (for their families), faculty, administrative heads, and contributors to the Athletic Association.

Members of the Press who will be working the games must write for their tickets for any one game, if possible, a week in advance of the game. The press tickets will then be forwarded. If it is impossible to know whether or not a member of the press will cover the game that far in advance, then a wire the day before the game will reserve a seat in the Press Box. The ticket then can be picked up at the General Information Booth at the Stadium.

Because of the crowded conditions in some of the Press Boxes for state games, particularly at Jacksonville and Tampa, Editors are asked to hold their staff working the game to a minimum in fairness to all papers, and in order to assure efficient service.

Spotting sheets and spotters are furnished at all games as well as complete statistical summaries of the game. Papers desiring direct wire coverage for games can reserve wires with WESTERN UNION. The Gainesville Press Box has outlets for five or more direct wires.

All inquiries for Press Box tickets can be directed to the Department of Publicity, University of Florida, Gainesville.

RAYMOND (Chief) WEST

Traitor and equipment manager of the University of Florida Gators, Raymond West was born August 26, 1906, on the Cheyenne Reservation at Darlington, Oklahoma, and given the Indian name "Running Wolf." His father was "Lightfoot" and his grandfather was Chief Thunder Bill. West played football, basketball, and track at Haskell Institute where he was coached by Dick Handley, later of Northwestern. Between his Haskell years and his 26 months in the Navy starting in 1942, he played several seasons of professional basketball with Jim Thorpe's Famous Indians, Olson's Swedes, and the D.K. Oilers of Tulsa. He joined the staff at the University of Florida in June of 1946.

THE GATOR COACHES

RAYMOND (Bear) WOLF

Head Coach, University of Florida

A Texan since the tender age of four, Chicago-born Ray Wolf did his collegiate gridiron cavorting at Texas Christian University. He served there as assistant coach and at the University of North Carolina as head coach for six years before becoming the top man of University of Florida football in the spring of 1946.

As a schoolboy athlete in Fort Worth, Wolf was some shakes on the gridiron, the diamond, and the basketball court, with a short side trip down the track straightaway. He collected four letters in baseball, two in football, a pair in basketball, and added one in track as a senior when he was drafted from the diamond long enough to win one hurdle race.

At Texas Christian, under the coaching of Matty Bell, Wolf won his football letters as a sophomore and junior, but was benched by a bad knee his senior season. As a sophomore he was a tackle, and as a junior an All-Southwest Conference guard. Ray's great moments of playing jubilation and dejection came when he fired a tough-angle 45-yard field-goal to defeat Arkansas 10 to 7 in 1936, and when he missed a straight-away 20-yarder against SMU when three points would have meant the Southwest Conference championship.

Wolf started his professional career as a baseball player, a sport in which he really stood out as a first baseman in both high school and college, but the same old bothersome knee proved too heavy a millstone. His one appearance at the plate in major league baseball brought, as he describes it, "A screaming drive right back through the pitcher's box. The only thing wrong was that it resulted in a double play."

When the baseball career was definitely shelved, Wolf returned to TCU in 1928 as freshman line coach. He was elevated to varsity line coach when Francis Schmidt took over the Horned Frogs the next season. Coaching baseball all the while, "Bear" Wolf remained at TCU until he accepted the head coaching spot at the University of North Carolina in the spring of 1936.

As head coach he got his biggest thrills (aside from dumping traditional rival Duke University a couple of times) by watching his Tar Heels come from behind to tie Tulane 14-14 one Saturday and then upset favored Pennsylvania by a 30 to 6 score the next week. Those two events were highly encouraged by the sensational end play of Paul Severin, still a Wolf protege as end coach of the Gators.

After a four-year stretch in the Navy at pre-flight schools in Georgia and Texas and at Naval Air Stations in Miami and Pensacola, Wolf cast his coaching lot with the University of Florida Gators in time to direct the 1946 spring practice.

Playing spirited, colorful football, his Floridians fought their way through a rugged nine-game schedule without turning in a victory. But only once were the Gators held scoreless, and so scrappily did they go about taking it on the chin week after week that Gator supporters looked past the discouragements of the 1946 season into a definitely encouraging future.

GATOR QUICKIES

Twenty-two lettermen, twenty-one 1946 reserves, and twenty-two freshmen make up the 1947 University of Florida football roster.

Florida's two top scorers of 1946, Fullback Gaspar Vaccaro (30 points) and Halfback Hal Griffin (24 points) are back in the Gator scoring corps for the 1947 season.

Florida's Gators believe in covering the state thoroughly: They play in four Florida cities in 1947: Jacksonville, Gainesville, Tampa, and Miami.

In 40 seasons of football, the Florida Gators have met 19 different schools from 18 states and Cuba.

The University of Florida meets three outstanding 1946 Bowl teams this year: Georgia (Sugar Bowl winner), North Carolina (Sugar Bowl Loser), and N. C. State (Gator Bowl Loser).

Fullback Gaspar Vaccaro was Florida chief ground gainer last year and quarterback Doug Belden topped the passers. Belden had a total offense yardage of 518, and Vaccaro's was 361.

Florida's Gators have played only one tie football game in the last six seasons, covering 56 games. It was a 6-6 stalemate with Tulane in 1946.

Quarterback Doug Belden, who will be the man behind the center in the Florida "T" this year, completed 44 of 92 passes last fall from the double and single wing.

The University of Florida's most lop-sided football victory was a 144 rout of Southern in 1913, and the other side of the ledger shows a 75 to 0 loss to Georgia in 1942.

The Gators of Florida, who have a ten game schedule in 1947, played eleven-game campaigns in 1921-37-38-39.

Ends Dewell Rushing and Grant Hester and halfback Kenneth McLean return to the collegiate gridiron with Florida Gators this year after two years absences in service. All three won football letters here in 1944.

The two trickiest pronunciations among the names on Florida's football roster are those of Marcelina Huerta (pronounced Worta), and Bob Gruetzmacher (Gritzmocker), both of Tampa.

Since it is almost traditional to give "big and little" statistics, here goes on Florida's Gators: Heavyweight is 230 pound tackle candidate Corliss Carver of Jacksonville, and tinymite is 165 pound left halfback Loren Broadus, also of the Gate City.

Florida's Gators will meet two brand new football opponents in 1947: North Texas State and Kansas State.

A record of the 1906 Florida-Rollins game reveals that the admission price was 50 cents.

In 345 football games the University of Florida has won six one-point victories and suffered seven one-point defeats, which makes that score 7 to 6 also.

Loren Broadus, 155-pound Florida Gator freshman left half back from Jacksonville, was named by Florida sports writers for the 1946 Orange Bowl Award to the "Most Outstanding High School Athlete".

The University of Florida's longest football winning streak was from the third game of 1910 to the third game of 1912, a stretch of 13 straight victories; points were 260 to 49.

Two members of the University of Florida's coaching staff were All-America footballers in their playing days: end coach Paul Severin at the University of North Carolina and line coach Ted Twomey at Notre Dame.

Thirty-four of Florida's 65 football squadmen are ex-servicemen, and 55 of the total number of candidates are Floridians.

The best pre-season estimate reveals that Florida's Gators will average right at 191 pounds throughout this fall, with a 201-pound line and a 174-pound average in the backfield.

In two consecutive football seasons, 1934 and 1935, Florida's Gators scored 113 points.

Doug Belden, Florida's veteran quarterback, had a total offense (running and passing) average of 4.3 yards each time he handled the pigskin on a running or passing play in 1946. He scored one touchdown afoot and tossed three more.

Paul Mortellaro, 205 pound Florida tackle from Tampa, will be after his fourth football letter this fall. Mortellaro won his spurs with the Gators in 1944-45-46.

Florida's Gators might do a lot of pigskin tossing this year; returning lettermen Doug Belden, Billy Parker, Hal Griffin and Gaspar Vaccaro threw a total of 183 passes in 1946.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION: Gainesville, Florida. The University City, is located in the north-central section of the State, about equidistant—70 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 70 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando, and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida. Now a modern town of approximately 24,000 population, Gainesville is among the South's most rapidly growing cities.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT: In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1833, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established in its present Gainesville location. Its destiny has been guided since that time by four presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-1928), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-1947), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947—).

ENROLLMENT: The total enrollment at the University of Florida for the regular 1946-47 term was 8,594 students. The University became a co-educational institution in July of 1947 and anticipates the enrollment of about 1,000 women students for the fall semester.

COLLEGES: The University of Florida is administered through eight colleges (University; Agriculture; Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering; Law; Physical Education, Health and Athletics) and four schools (Pharmacy, Forestry, Architecture and Allied Arts, and the Graduate School). Bachelor and Masters degrees are awarded by colleges and schools, with the doctorate offered in economics, English, history, psychology, animal husbandry, biology, chemistry, pharmacy, pharmacology, and pharmacognosy.

PHYSICAL PLANT: The University's permanent physical plant, under current expansion, consists of 25 major instructional and research buildings designed to accommodate 3,000 students, and dormitories designed for 1,000 men. Temporary buildings are now providing space for the increased enrollment. Ten of these buildings are used for offices, classrooms, lecture rooms and laboratories, and thirteen are providing dormitory space. Further living accommodations are offered by three FlaVet (Florida Veterans) villages. The existing permanent buildings of the University represent an original investment of some \$5,194,000.

EXPANSION: Approved construction now underway at the University of Florida totals in excess of \$7,000,000. This work includes additions to the chemistry building, Florida Union, infirmary, cafeteria and library; the building of a huge modern gymnasium, a student exchange building, maintenance building, and three dormitory units for women students; and the modernization of utility, sewage, and communications facilities and roads.

THE GATOR COACHES

RAYMOND (Bear) WOLF
Head Coach, University of Florida

A Texan since the tender age of four, Chicago-born Ray Wolf did his collegiate gridiron cavorting at Texas Christian University. He served there as assistant coach and at the University of North Carolina as head coach for six years before becoming the top man of the University of Florida football team in the spring of 1946.

As a schoolboy athlete in Fort Worth, Wolf was some shakes on the gridiron, the diamond, and the basketball court, with a short side trip down the track straightaway. He collected four letters in baseball, two in football, a pair in basketball, and added one in track as a senior when he was drafted from the diamond long enough to win one hurdle race.

At Texas Christian, under the coaching of Matty Bull, Wolf won his football letters as a sophomore and junior, but was benched by a bad knee his senior season. As a sophomore he was a tackle, and as a junior an All-Southwest Conference guard.

Ray's great moments of playing jubilation and dejection came when he fired a tough-angled 45-yard field-goal to defeat Arkansas 10 to 7 in 1926, and when he missed a straight-away 20-yarder against SMU when three points would have meant the Southwest Conference championship.

Wolf started his professional career as a baseball player, but the same bothersome knee proved too heavy a milestone. His one appearance at the plate in major league baseball brought, as he describes it, "A screaming drive right back through the pitcher's box. The only thing wrong was that it resulted in a double play."

Wolf returned to TCU in 1928 as freshman line coach, and was elevated to varsity line coach when Francis Schmidt took over the Horned Frogs the next season. Coaching baseball all the while, he remained at TCU until accepting the head coaching spot at the University of North Carolina in the spring of 1936.

There he got his biggest thrills (aside from dumping traditional rival Duke University a couple of times) by watching his Tar Heels come from behind to tie Tulane 14-14 one Saturday and then upset favored Pennsylvania by a 30 to 6 score the next week.

After a four-year stretch in the Navy at pre-flight schools in Georgia and Texas and at Naval Air Stations in Miami and Pensacola, Wolf cast his coaching lot with the University of Florida Gators in time to direct the 1946 spring practice.

In 1946 Wolf's first Florida team, a freshman outfit conjured from nowhere, turned in a season of spirited, colorful football and was held scoreless only once, but failed to produce the fruit of a single victory. In 1947, grown from collegiate football infancy to adolescence, the Gators got off to a typical sophomore start with three straight losses before breaking the streak with a 7-6 upset win over N. C. State. They ended the season with four wins, five losses, and a tie.

The groundwork laid, Wolf is now in the actual building stage of a Gator football team capable of holding its own in representative competition, and making its first real bid against a schedule of tremendous proportions.

THE FLORIDA OFFENSE

THE SYSTEM

After some twenty years as a double wingback player and coach, Florida's mentor turned to the T-formation in spring practice of 1947 to better utilize the speed and elusiveness of the Gators' fast-moving backs and none-too-bulky linemen. The Gators use the standard T with or without a man in motion.

RUNNING GAME

The halfbacks handled a major portion of Florida's ball carrying last fall, but fullbacks Billy Parker and Alex Gardiner began coming into their own to such an extent near the end of the season that it's a good bet the entire Gator backfield will come in for heavy duty this year. In 1947 the pickin' was handed off to the halfbacks on 348 running plays, against 62 for the fullbacks and only 50 for the quarterbacks. A typical quick-breast T-affair, the Florida running game had a per play average of 4.1 yards for each crack at the line. The top break-away boys for the 1948 season should be Charlie Hunsinger, an exceptionally quick-starting and fast 195 pounder, and smaller but equally fast Hal Griffin and Loren Broadus. Hand-driving Bob Gruetsmacher (pronounced Grizmocher), and tough little Jim Yancey, 165 pounds of running rawhide, are a pair to keep a sharp eye on among the up-and-coming crop.

PASSING GAME

Veterans Doug Belden and Lazarous Lewis and service returnee Angus Williams will get most of the calls to direct Florida's aerial bombardment. Spring practice indicated that the overhead route may be considerably more accurate than it was a year ago. Williams was a top tosser during his schoolboy days in Tampa. Belden, sporting a pair of ponderous paws and exceptionally powerful wrist-action, has completed 70 of 185 passes over a two year period for an even 1,000 yards and five touchdowns. Left end Tommy Bishop, who gathered in 10 losses last year for a 144 yards, is the top target.

PUNTING GAME

More often than not the fullbacks, particularly Billy Parker and Alex Gardiner, handle the punting from an orthodox deep punt formation. The two kicked 69 times last year for a 33.7 average. Parker averaged 34.3; Gardiner averaged 32.6. Both seemed to be getting slightly more distance in the spring workouts, indicating more strength and length in this department.

EXTRA POINTS AND KICKOFFS

Lazarous Lewis plays his football from head to toe. When in the game he directs the offense, and whether in the game or not, he kicks the extra points and handles the kickoffs. It was his perfect placement for a 7 to 6 win over N. C. State last year that broke Florida's 13-game losing streak. Later he divided the crossbars again to tie Tulane (7-7) and the next week thumped another through to kick Miami 7 to 6. In all, he kicked 11 of 19 attempts a year ago.

SAFETY MEN

Speed, elusiveness and buckets of color characterize Florida's safety men in the punt-returning category. Usually it's the left halfback, but when the plum is ripe, both halfbacks may collaborate deep behind the scrimmage line. During the season, Florida had 17 punt returns of more than 10 yards and six of them were for more than 60 yards each. Hal Griffin, whose 26 yard average on 10 punt returns set a new collegiate record in 1947, had individual runbacks of 12, 18, 28, 51, 67, and 90 yards. The entire contingent of Gator safety men averaged 18 yards per runback in 38 trials.

GATOR QUICKIES

Florida's 1948 football schedule sounds like the roll
call of the bowls: Delta Bowl Mississippi, Orange Bowl
Georgia Tech, Gator Bowl Georgia, Great Lakes Bowl
Kentucky, and Sugar Bowl Alabama.

Florida sophomore quarterback Lazarous Lewis
plays the game from head to toe. When in the game
he directs the offensive attack, and in the game or
not, he kicks extra points. His perfect boots defeated
N. C. State and Miami by 7-6 scores last year and tied
Tulane 7-7.

There are only three seniors on Florida's 1948 foot-
ball roster: Captain and Guard Fletcher Groves, Alter-
nate Captain and Quarterback Doug Belden, and Center
John Gilbert.

In 1947 Florida Halfback Hal Griffin, whose 26.7
yard average per punt return set a new national col-
legiate record, had runbacks of 12, 18, 38, 51, 87 and
90 yards. Two of them were touchdowns.

Florida's Captain Fletcher Groves, 180 pound guard
from Tampa, was selected on the Mississippi All-
Opponent team for the 1947 season.

Senior Doug Belden, 1948 Florida Alternate Cap-
tain and Quarterback, has gained an even 1,000 yards
on passes the past two years. He completed 79 of 185
tosses.

Florida's Gators will use the T-formation for the
second time this year. Coach Ray Wolf, a double-wing
exponent from 'way back when he was an All-South-
west guard at TCU, switched to the T for the 1947
season to utilize fully the speed and elusiveness of his
break-away backs.

The Gators of Florida will be playing a brand new
opponent when Tulsa comes to Gainesville for a night
game on October 2nd. There will be a return game
in Tulsa in 1949.

In 355 football games, the University of Florida has
won eight one-point victories and dropped seven one-
point decisions. There have been 24 tie games in
Gator football.

Florida's 50-man football squad roster is made up
of three seniors, 25 juniors and 22 sophomores. A
total of 26 of them are lettermen.

The best pre-season estimate reveals that Florida's Gators will average right at 190 throughout this fall, 194 in the line and 176 in the backfield.

In 1947 Florida's 1948 football opponents won 56 games, lost 41, and tied two. Five of them played in Bowl games.

Of Florida's 50 football candidates, 41 are from the State of Florida. Three are from Alabama, and one each live in North Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Arkansas, Illinois, and Ohio.

Since the University of Florida started playing football in 1906, the Gators have played on their home field in Gainesville 127 times, an average of three games per year. However, the Gators have played in Florida 243 times.

Florida's Gators will see plenty of football nightlife this fall. The first four games with Mississippi, Tulsa, Rollins and Auburn are nocturnal tilts. Then come six day tilts with Georgia Tech, Furman, Georgia, Kentucky, Miami and Alabama.

The Florida coaching staff has undergone one change for the 1948 season. Sterling Dupree, one-time Auburn football and track star and more recently of the University of South Carolina staff, has taken over the duties of Backfield Coach Buster Brannon who returned to TCU.

The Florida coaching staff is a cosmopolitan lot: Head Coach Ray Wolf played at TCU, Line Coach Ted Twomey at Notre Dame, End Coach Paul Severin at North Carolina, Backfield Coach Sterling Dupree at Auburn, Freshman Coach Sam McAlister at St. Viators, Freshman Backfield Coach Dave Fuller at Wake Forest, and Freshman Line Coach Mush Battista at Florida.

Florida's Gators have played only two football ties in the last 7 seasons, covering 66 games. Both were with Tulane; 6-6 in 1945 and 7-7 in 1947.

There are only two tongue-twisters on Florida's football roster, and they're simple aplenty once you get the hang of it: Guard Marcelino Huerta (Worta) and Halfback Bob Gruetzmacher (Gritzmoeker).

Big and little roster statistics are inevitable for football squads, so here goes on Florida's Gators: Heavyweight is 290 pound Sophomore Tackle Corlis Carver, and flyweight is 155 pound Sophomore Halfback Loren Broadus. Both are from Jacksonville.

Florida's Gators are renewing football relations in 1948 with Rollins (last played in 1934), Kentucky (1937), Georgia Tech (1942) and Alabama (1931).

It is entirely likely that on occasions this fall, Florida will have an exceptionally light and fast backfield on the field. The quartet would average only 165 pounds. Quarterback Angus Williams (165), halfbacks Hal Griffin (158) and Loren Broadus (155), and fullback Billy Parker (183).

There seems to be little doubt that Florida's Gators ran completely out of breath in defeating Southern 144 to 0 in the opening game of 1913. The next Saturday Auburn trounced Florida 55 to 0.

Playing five of last year's Bowl teams apparently wasn't load enough for the 1948 Florida Gators. Tulsa has already signed to play in this year's Delta Bowl game.

Jack Johnson, junior college newcomer to the University of Florida squad this year, captained his Van Buren, Ark., high school team two years and participated in a 34 to 33 victory. He is a guard.

Florida's Fullback Alex Gardiner and End Bill Mitchum should at least team up well on trips this fall. Gardiner lists writing music as a hobby, while Mitchum says singing is one of his hobbies.

Florida Line Coach Ted Twomey, Notre Dame stand-out tackle of the Knute Rockne era, wants to be sure his linemen hear what he's saying this year. Twomey had his tonsils removed three weeks before football season opened.

In 41 years of football, Florida's Gators have played 74 different opponents. A new rival will go into the books when Tulsa comes to Gainesville October 2nd.

Anyone who doubts that Florida's goalline is going to take a lot of bombardment in 1948 should ponder for a moment the fact that the Gators' 10 opponents scored a total of 1,577 points in 1947.

Florida's varsity coaching staff is an All-Star lot. Head Coach Ray Wolf was an All-Southwest Conference guard at TCU; Line Coach Ted Twomey made several All-America selections at Notre Dame and is on the All-Time Irish team; End Coach Paul Severin was an All-America end at North Carolina; and Backfield Coach Sterling Dupree was All-SEC fullback at Auburn.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION: Gainesville, Florida, The University City, is located in the north-central section of the State, about equidistant—70 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 70 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando, and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida. Now a modern town of approximately 24,000 population, Gainesville is among the South's most rapidly growing cities.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT: In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established in its present Gainesville location. Its destiny has been guided since that time by four presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-1928), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-1947), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947—).

ENROLLMENT: The total enrollment at the University of Florida for the regular 1948-49 term was 11,340. This figure includes 9,681 men and 1,659 women. Estimated enrollment for the 1949-50 school year is placed in excess of 10,000 students.

COLLEGES: The University of Florida is administered through ten colleges and three schools. The redesignations of the Schools of Pharmacy and of Architecture and Allied Arts and the creation of the School of Journalism from the Department of Journalism were events of the past year. The University's ten colleges include: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health, and Athletics. Schools include: Forestry, Graduate and Journalism.

PHYSICAL PLANT: The University's permanent physical plant, under current expansion, consists of 25 major instructional and research buildings, originally designed to accommodate 3,000 students, and dormitories designed for 1,000 students. Temporary buildings are still providing space for a greatly increased enrollment with ten being used for offices, classrooms, lecture rooms, and laboratories, while thirteen are providing additional dormitory space. Further living accommodations are offered by three Flavel (Florida Veterans) on-campus villages and three off-campus leased apartment buildings for women students.

EXPANSION: Approved construction under way and yet to be completed totals \$9,622,000. Buildings currently under construction include: Classroom-Administration building; seven dormitories, (four for men and three for women), addition to the Law building, student service center, dairy unit, additions to the library, two units to new engineering building, and other miscellaneous buildings including a new horticulture area. Major expansion completed during the past year included new gymnasium-auditorium, addition to cafeteria, infirmary, hydraulics laboratory, and chemistry-pharmacy building.

COLLEGE OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION, HEALTH AND ATHLETICS

The University's College of Physical Education, Health and Athletics, now in its fourth year, provides a well-rounded program of sound professional training, instruction in physical and mental development through sports, an outstanding recreational program suited to student and faculty needs, and an excellent program of student health.

The College is headed by Dean Dennis K. (Dutch) Stanley, a Florida alumnus and regular end on the fine 1928 Gator football team. Stanley was head coach of Florida football in 1933, 1934 and 1935. Dean Stanley is also a graduate of Pennsylvania State College.

The College is composed of five departments: (1) Professional Curricula, (2) Student Health, (3) Required Physical Education, (4) Intramural Athletics, and (5) Intercollegiate Athletics.

The Professional Curriculum offers the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Physical Education and Health. Students who major in this course are prepared for careers in athletic coaching, the teaching of physical education and health, and preparation in the rapidly expanding field of recreation. In addition, state certification may be secured for the teaching of such subjects as English, history, chemistry, mathematics, physics, and the biological sciences.

The Student Health Department embraces the University infirmary and provides a preventative and clinical program designed to safeguard the health of the student body. Provision is made to check the students' physical condition, and to hospitalize and treat acute illnesses.

Required Physical Education is designed to provide a program of sound body exercise for both men and women students, and to offer them the opportunity to receive training in recreational sports.

Intramural Athletics and Recreation sponsors a program of 14 sports adapted for participation by the entire student body.

The advent of co-education at Florida in 1947 brought about the installation of an excellent program of physical education and recreation adapted to the needs and interests of all women students.

Intercollegiate Athletics includes football, basketball, baseball, track, swimming, golf, tennis, and cross country. There are varsity and freshman teams in all sports.

The physical plant includes Florida Gymnasium (completed in June 1949); the Infirmary; Florida Field (football stadium); Graham Field (track stadium); Perry Field (baseball and recreation); swimming pool; 22 all-weather tennis courts; and 16 handball courts.

The College of Physical Education, Health and Athletics has rounded into a valuable service college for every student—man or woman—of the University of Florida. Without in any way minimizing the tremendous values of purely academic instruction and application, it is adding to the richness of University experience by stressing the importance of physical fitness, competitive will, and the need for wholesome recreation in a happy and useful life.

THE GATOR COACHES

RAYMOND (Bear) WOLF
Head Coach, University of Florida

A Texan since the tender age of four, Chicago-born Ray Wolf did his collegiate gridiron cavorting at Texas Christian University. He served there as assistant coach and at the University of North Carolina as head coach for six years before becoming the top man of University of Florida football in the spring of 1946.

As a schoolboy athlete in Fort Worth, Wolf was some shakes on the gridiron, the diamond, and the basketball court, with a short side trip down the track straightaway. He collected four letters in baseball, two in football, a pair in basketball, and added one in track as a senior when he was drafted from the diamond long enough to win one hurdle race.

At Texas Christian, under the coaching of Matty Bell, Wolf won his football letters as a sophomore and junior, but was benched by a bad knee his senior season. As a sophomore he was a tackle, and as a junior an All-Southwest Conference guard.

Ray's great moments of playing jubilation and dejection came when he fired a tough-angle 43-yard field goal to defeat Arkansas 10 to 7 in 1926, and when he missed a straight-away 20-yarder against SMU when three points would have meant the Southwest Conference championship.

Wolf started his professional career as a baseball player, but the same bothersome knee proved too heavy a millstone. His one appearance at the plate in major league baseball brought, as he describes it, "A screaming drive right back through the pitcher's box. The only thing wrong was that it resulted in a double play."

Wolf returned to TCU in 1928 as freshman line coach, and was elevated to varsity line coach when Francis Schmidt took over the Horned Frogs the next season. Coaching baseball all the while, he remained at TCU until accepting the head coaching spot at the University of North Carolina in the spring of 1936.

There he got his biggest thrills (aside from dumping traditional rival Duke University a couple of times) by watching his Tar Heels come from behind to tie Tulane 14-14 one Saturday and then upset favored Pennsylvania by a 30 to 6 score the next week.

After a four-year stretch in the Navy at pre-flight schools in Georgia and Texas and at Naval Air Stations in Miami and Pensacola, Wolf cast his coaching lot with the University of Florida Gators in time to direct the 1946 spring practice.

In 1946 Wolf's first Florida team, a freshman outfit conjured from nowhere, turned in a season of spirited, colorful football and was held scoreless only once, but failed to produce the fruit of a single victory. In 1947, grown from collegiate football infancy to adolescence, the Gators got off to a typical sophomore start with three straight losses before breaking the streak with a 7-6 upset win over N. C. State. They ended the season with four wins, five losses, and a tie.

Wolf's 1948 Florida crew broke even in 10 starts, and won their first SEC victory under The Bear by trimming Auburn by a 16-9 count. The Gators should be tough to push around in 1949, but they play a schedule that's just about as rough as they come.

WORKING PRESS TICKETS

Working press and radio tickets must be obtained from Joe Sherman, Sports Publicity Department, University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida.

PRESS AND RADIO ACCOMMODATIONS

Press and radio tickets for all Florida home games will be handled by the Sports Publicity Department. These games are: Sept. 23, Citadel at Gainesville (night); Sept. 30, Duquesne at Gainesville (night); Oct. 14, Auburn at Gainesville; Oct. 28, Furman at Gainesville; Nov. 11, Georgia in Jacksonville; Nov. 18, Miami at Gainesville; Nov. 25, Alabama at Jacksonville.

SPECIAL NOTE: Because of the addition of 13,000 seats to the University of Florida's home stadium in Gainesville, it is uncertain when the new press box will be completed. (It was necessary to dismantle the old box entirely.) It WILL be necessary to arrange temporary accommodations for the first three games (Citadel, Duquesne and Auburn), but we hope the new press box will be in place for the two late season games. This means that it will be ABSOLUTELY IMPERATIVE to limit admission to the press box to those people who are actively engaged in reporting the game for the next day's editions. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated. You will like and enjoy the new press box when it is completed. It will come close to perfection in working conditions and appointments.

It will help us to serve you if you will advise us the moment you know you will need press box space and wire accommodations. We prefer to get your tickets to you well in advance to forestall last-minute mixups and delay just before the kickoff. If you do not give us time to get your accommodations to you, they will be left at the General Information Booth at the Stadium.

ON THE DAY OF THE GAME

When you arrive in Gainesville on game day, it will probably be to your advantage to drop by the Sport Publicity Office in the BASEMENT of FLORIDA GYMNASIUM. There will be someone there to help you with whatever problem you might have, and telephone and typewriter accommodations will be available. In using your press ticket, you will enter the MAIN GATE in the center West Side of the Stadium. The INFORMATION BOOTH is near the MAIN GATE, also in the center of the West Side of the Stadium.

ABOUT RADIO BROADCASTS

Florida Radio Stations desiring to carry live play-by-play broadcast of a game (or games) should make contact direct: Radio Station WRUF, Gainesville, Florida. Out of State stations should contact the Athletic Association of the visiting team (Citadel, Duquesne, Auburn, Furman, Georgia) to determine which station those schools have designated as the official station to broadcast their games.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION: Gainesville, Florida. The University City, is located in the north-central section of the State, about equidistant—70 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 70 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando, and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida. A modern town of 25,500 population, Gainesville is among the South's most rapidly growing cities.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT: In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established in its present Gainesville location. Its destiny has been guided since that time by four presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-1928), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-1947), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947—).

ENROLLMENT: The total enrollment at the University of Florida for the regular 1949-50 term was 11,709. Estimated enrollment for the 1950-51 school year is placed in excess of 10,000 students, including about 2,200 women.

COLLEGES: Among the units which make up the University of Florida are 10 colleges, 3 schools and numerous divisions and departments. The University's 10 colleges include: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health, and Athletics. Schools include: Forestry, Graduate, and Journalism.

Added during the past year was the Cancer Research Laboratory. Of special importance in the national emergency is the Department of Military Science and Tactics which serves both the Army and Air Force. Other units include: Division of Music, Agricultural Experiment Station, Engineering Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Service, General Extension Division and the Division of Libraries.

PHYSICAL PLANT: The University's permanent physical plant, under current expansion, consists of 26 major instructional and research buildings, originally designed to accommodate 3,000 students, and dormitories for 1,100 students. Temporary buildings are still providing space for a greatly increased enrollment with ten being used for offices, classrooms, lecture rooms, and laboratories, while twelve are providing additional dormitory space. Further living accommodations are offered by three Flavel (Florida Veterans) on-campus villages.

EXPANSION: Approved construction completed and to be completed in the near future totals \$9,622,000. Major expansion completed during the past year included new gymnasium-auditorium, addition to cafeteria, infirmary, hydraulics laboratory, chemistry-pharmacy building, classroom-administration building, seven dormitories, (four for men and three for women), addition to the Law building, student service center, dairy unit, additions to the library, two units to new engineering building, additions to heating plant, sewerage disposal plant, and the chapel; two sections of the Florida Union annex have been completed along with a new seating section in Florida Field, and other miscellaneous buildings including a new horticulture area.

GEORGE ROBERT (BOB) WOODRUFF

Head Coach, University of Florida

At 34 years of age, Florida's Head Coach and Athletic Director Bob Woodruff is one of the nation's youngest major coaches. He picked up the Gator football reins last January after three successful years as head coach at Baylor University.

Bob Woodruff was born at Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916. The family soon moved to Savannah where he played three years of high school football before entering the University of Tennessee. During the seasons of 1936-37-38, Woodruff was a standout tackle on the teams of General Bob Neyland which turned in a 23-5-3 record. The 1938 team on which Woodruff was a regular lineman went undefeated and then pounded out a 17 to 9 victory over Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl. Immediately after receiving a degree in engineering from the University of Tennessee in 1939, Woodruff joined the Volunteer staff as assistant coach and was with Tennessee in that capacity when the teams of 1939 and 1940 dropped decisions to Southern California and Boston College in the Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl games respectively.

Coach Woodruff entered the Army in 1941 and rose to the rank of Major in the Army Engineers with 4 years service before receiving his discharge in 1946.

For the football seasons of 1944 and 1945 he was assistant coach at West Point. Both of those seasons the Black Knights of the Hudson, manipulated by Coach Earl (Red) Blaik, thundered to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The next season, 1946, Woodruff returned South to join the Georgia Tech staff as line coach. That year Tech turned in a 9-2 record, including a 41-19 victory over Tulsa in the Oji Bowl.

In the Spring of 1947 Woodruff answered a call to Baylor University as head coach of the Southwest Conference Bears that had floundered in the league's cellar the year before with only one victory in nine starts.

The rough and ready Southwest had its eyes popped open early in the 1947 season when Baylor ripped its way to four straight victories—one a startling upset of Arkansas—before Texas halted the surge of the Bears. Baylor won five and lost five that year.

Came 1948 and a still more improved Bear eleven. They fought their way to a regular season record of five wins, three losses and two ties. Then on January 1st Baylor added another scalp by clipping Wake Forest 20 to 7 in the Delta Bowl game.

Last year Baylor made the going still harder for the giants of the Southwest and went down to the wire as the challenger to Rice for the Southwest Conference championship. The Owls had to come from behind for a 21 to 7 title win. Woodruff's record for his final year at Baylor was eight wins and two losses.

The auburn-haired, easy-going native Georgian now faces very much the same reconstruction problem in Gainesville that greeted him in Waco three years ago when he took the step up into the head coaching ranks. Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have a six year old son, Scooter.

WORKING PRESS TICKETS

Working press and radio tickets must be obtained from Joe Sherman, Sports Publicity Department, University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida.

PRESS AND RADIO ACCOMMODATIONS

Press and radio tickets for all Florida home games will be handled by the sports publicity department. These games are: Sept. 16, Wyoming at Jacksonville (8:00 P.M.), Sept. 22, Citadel at Gainesville (8:30 P.M.), Sept. 29, Georgia Tech at Gainesville (8:00 P.M.), Oct. 20, Vanderbilt at Gainesville, Homecoming (2:30 P.M.), Oct. 27, Kentucky at Gainesville (2:00 P.M.), Nov. 10, Georgia at Jacksonville (12:30 P.M.)

The new press box at Florida Field has been completed and you will enjoy the perfect accommodations it affords. The press box is in four sections: (1) The Western Union deck which houses all Western Union transmission equipment, two darkrooms and a room for wire photo transmission, (2) The Radio Deck consisting of five acoustically shielded radio booths, two spacious balconies for movie and still cameras, and adequate rest room facilities, (3) The Press Deck of 35 working press seats and rest facilities, and (4) The Movie Deck consisting of a spacious open-front area for movie and still cameras.

ON THE DAY OF THE GAME

When you arrive in Gainesville on game day, it will probably be to your advantage to drop by the Sports Publicity Office in the HASBEMENT OF FLORIDA GYMNASIUM. There will be someone there to help you with whatever problem you might have and telephone and typewriter accommodations will be available. In using your Press Deck, Radio Deck or Movie Deck ticket, you will enter the Main Gate in the center of the West Side (Press Box Side) of the Stadium. There is an elevator to deliver you to the proper deck of the Press Box. (Radio Deck and Movie Deck tickets are not valid on the Press Deck, and vice versa.)

ABOUT RADIO BROADCASTS

Out of state stations must first clear through the Athletic Association of the visiting team. (Wyoming, Citadel, Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt, Kentucky, Georgia) and having received authorization to broadcast, must then advise Major Garland Fowell, Radio Station WRUF, Gainesville, Florida, of their intention to broadcast.

To stations originating a broadcast at the Stadium, the Florida Sports Publicity Department will provide: (1) The broadcasting booth or space, (2) Three official game programs, (3) Official game statistics within five minutes of the end of the half and again within five minutes of the end of the game, (4) The broadcasting telephone line from the Stadium to the University switchboard (You must arrange with the telephone company from the University switchboard on), (5) A Florida spotter provided you request one two weeks prior to the game and with the understanding that the station will pay the spotter \$5.00.

If you need a spotter to identify players of the visiting team, it will be necessary for you to make arrangements with the visiting team. If you need facilities additional to those listed above, we will make every effort to provide them AT YOUR EXPENSE and provided we are notified of your additional needs not less than two weeks prior to the date of the game.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville, Florida, The University City, is located in the north-central section of the State, about equidistant—70 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 70 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando, and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida. A modern town of 26,500 population, Gainesville is among the South's most rapidly growing cities.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the Foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established in its present Gainesville location. Its destiny has been guided since that time by four presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947—).

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment at the University of Florida for the regular 1950-51 term was 10,500. Estimated enrollment for the 1951-52 school year is placed in excess of 9,500 students, including about 2,500 women.

COLLEGES

Among the units which make up the University of Florida are 10 colleges, 3 schools and numerous divisions and departments. The University's 10 colleges include: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health, and Athletics. Schools include: Forestry, Graduate, and Journalism.

Added in 1949 was the Cancer Research Laboratory. Of special importance in the national emergency is the Department of Military Science and Tactics which serves both the Army and Air Force. Other units include: Division of Music, Agricultural Experiment Station, Engineering Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Service, General Extension Division and the Division of Libraries.

PHYSICAL PLANT

The University's permanent physical plant has been greatly expanded during the past few years. Buildings recently completed include the Classroom-Administration Building, the Gymnasium Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, seven dormitories, additions to the Law Building, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant and Stadium, along with many other changes and additions to existing buildings.

Currently scheduled for construction are an R.O.T.C. Classroom Building, a classroom and laboratory for study and research in poultry diseases, and a meats laboratory. Under construction and scheduled for completion in the Fall is the complete rehabilitation of Science Hall.

GEORGE ROBERT (BOB) WOODRUFF

Director of Athletics

George Robert Woodruff, one of the nation's youngest major athletic directors and head coaches at 35 years of age, enters his second season as ringmaster of the Gators.

He was born at Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916. The family soon moved to Savannah where he played three years of high school football before entering the University of Tennessee. During the seasons of 1936-37-38, Woodruff was a standout tackle on the teams of General Bob Neyland which turned in a 23-5-3 record.

Immediately after receiving a degree in engineering from the University of Tennessee in 1939, Woodruff joined the Volunteer staff as assistant coach and was with Tennessee in that capacity when the teams of 1939 and 1940 dropped decisions to Southern California and Boston College in the Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl games respectively.

Coach Woodruff entered the Army in 1941 and rose to the rank of Major in the Army Engineers with 4 years service before receiving his discharge in 1946.

For the football seasons of 1944 and 1945 he was assistant coach at West Point. Both of those seasons the Black Knights of the Hudson, manipulated by Coach Earl (Red) Blaik, thundered to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The next season, 1946, Woodruff returned South to join the Georgia Tech staff as line coach. That year Tech turned in a 9-2 record, including a 41-19 victory over Tulsa in the Oil Bowl.

In the Spring of 1947 Woodruff answered a call to Baylor University as head coach of the Southwest Conference Bears that had floundered in the league's cellar the year before with only one victory in nine starts.

The rough and ready Southwest had its eyes popped open early in the 1947 season when Baylor ripped its way to four straight victories—one a startling upset of Arkansas—before Texas halted the surge of the Bears. Baylor won five and lost five that year.

Came 1948 and a still more improved Bear eleven. They fought their way to a regular season record of five wins, three losses and two ties. Then on January 1st Baylor added another scalp by clipping Wake Forest 20 to 7 in the Delta Bowl game.

Last year Baylor made the going still harder for the giants of the Southwest and went down to the wire as the challenger to Rice for the Southwest Conference championship. The Owls had to come from behind for a 21 to 7 title win. Woodruff's record for his final year at Baylor was eight wins and two losses.

The Auburn-haired, easy-going native Georgian faced very much the same reconstruction problem in Gainesville that greeted him in Waco three years ago when he took the step up into the head coaching ranks.

This past fall he opened eyes in Southeastern circles just as he had in the Southwest by taking an inexperienced Florida football squad, packed with sophomores, and whipped it into an aggressive, fighting outfit that broke even on a tough ten-game schedule.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have a seven year old son, Scooter.

ASSISTANT COACH JIMMY KYNES

During the 1950 football season he played professionally with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian-American League and made the league's All-Star second team. He is taking graduate work this year in the University of Florida's Law College. Kynes married Marjorie Hiest of Jacksonville.

ASSISTANT COACH FRED MONTSDEOCA

Fred Montsdeoca was born at Avon Park, Florida, on April 25, 1928, and graduated from the University of Florida in Physical Education in 1951. He is currently working toward his Masters Degree in Physical Education. Montsdeoca attended elementary and high school at Avon Park and a year at Georgia Military College at Milledgeville. As a schoolboy athlete, he played football, basketball and baseball. At the University of Florida he played football the seasons of 1948-49-50 and baseball the seasons of 1947-48-49-50. He captained the 1949 and 1950 baseball teams. A punting specialist in college, he did all of Florida's punting with the exception of two kicks during his three varsity years. His 72-yard punt against Tulane in 1949 is the longest Florida kick on record. During the 1951 summer, Montsdeoca played professional baseball with the Gainesville G-Men of the Florida State League. Coach Montsdeoca married Yvonne Reed of Avon Park.

TRAINER SAM LANKFORD

Sam Lankford was born at Union, S. C., on March 15, 1911. He attended the University of Tennessee and was assistant boxing coach while a student there. He boxed professionally in the 125-pound class for several years and was with the Wilson Athletic Company as specialty salesman for five years before going into the Army for a 39-month tour of duty. He was trainer of the Randolph Field world championship service team in 1944. Lankford joined the University of Arkansas staff as trainer for the four years of 1946-47-48-49. He was with the Razorback Cotton Bowl and Dixie Bowl football teams in 1947 and 1948, and with the Arkansas basketball teams that won co-championships of the Southwest Conference in 1949 and 1950. He joined the University of Florida staff in August of 1950. Trainer Lankford married Margaret McMillan, of Wellford, S. C., and they have a daughter and a son, twelve-year-old Sandra and seven-year-old Sam, Jr.

PRESS AND RADIO ACCOMMODATIONS

Press and radio tickets for all Florida home games will be handled by the sports publicity department. These games are: Sept. 20, Stetson at Gainesville; Oct. 4, 4, Citadel at Jacksonville; Oct. 11, Clemson at Gainesville; Oct. 25, Georgia at Jacksonville; Nov. 1, Auburn at Gainesville, Homecoming; Nov. 23, Miami at Gainesville; Dec. 6, Kentucky at Gainesville.

You will enjoy the perfect accommodations of the Florida Field Press Box (see diagram, inside back cover). The press box is in four sections: (1) the Western Union deck; Western Union transmission equipment, two dark-rooms and a room for wire photo transmission, (2) the Radio Deck: five acoustically tiled radio booths, two spacious balconies for movie and still cameras, and adequate rest room facilities, (3) The Press Deck of 95 working press seats and rest facilities, and (4) The Movie Deck: a spacious open-front area for movie and still cameras.

ON THE DAY OF THE GAME


When you arrive in Gainesville on game day, it will probably be to your advantage to drop by the Sports Publicity Office in the BASEMENT of FLORIDA GYMNASIUM. We can help with whatever problem you might have, and telephone and typewriter accommodations are available. In using your Press Deck, Radio Deck or Movie Deck ticket, you will enter the Main Gate in the center of the West Side (Press Box Side) of the Stadium. An elevator will deliver you to the proper deck of the Press Box. Please wear your Press Box Ticket in sight (it has a built-in button hole.)

ABOUT RADIO BROADCASTS

Out of state stations must first clear through the Athletic Association of the visiting team, (Citadel, Clemson, Georgia, Auburn, and Kentucky) and having received authorization to broadcast, must then advise Major Garland Powell, Radio Station WRUF, Gainesville, Florida, of their intention to broadcast.

To stations originating a broadcast at the Stadium, the Florida Sports Publicity Department will provide: (1) the broadcasting booth or space, (2) three official game programs, (3) official game statistics within five minutes of the end of the half and again within five minutes of the end of the game, (4) the broadcasting telephone line from the Stadium to the University switchboard (You must arrange with the telephone company from the University switchboard on), (5) a Florida spotter provided you request one two weeks prior to the game and with the understanding that the station will pay the spotter \$5.00.

If you need a spotter to identify players of the visiting team, it will be necessary for you to make arrangements with the visiting team. If you need facilities additional to those listed above, we will make every effort to provide them AT YOUR EXPENSE and provided we are notified of your additional needs not less than two weeks prior to the date of the game.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville, Florida, the University City, is located in the north-central section of the State, about equidistant—70 miles from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 70 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida. A modern town of 26,861 population, Gainesville is among the South's most rapidly growing cities.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1888, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established in its present Gainesville location. Its destiny has been guided since that time by four presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-).

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment at the University of Florida for the regular 1951-52 term was 9,000, of which approximately 2,000 were women.

COLLEGES

Among the units which make up the University of Florida are 10 colleges, 4 schools and numerous divisions and departments. The University's 10 colleges include: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools include: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and the School of Inter-American studies.

Added in 1949 was the Cancer Research Laboratory. Of special importance in the national emergency is the Department of Military Science and Tactics which serves both the Army and Air Force. Other units include: Division of Music, Agricultural Experiment Station, Engineering Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Service, General Extension Division, the Division of Libraries and Division of Public Relations.

PHYSICAL PLANT

The University's permanent physical plant has been greatly expanded during the past few years. Buildings recently completed include the Classroom-Administration Building, the Gymnasium Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, seven dormitories, additions to the Law Building, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, and Stadium, along with many other changes and additions to existing buildings. Largest building currently under construction is a \$2,000,000 student residence hall. A College of Business Administration building is scheduled for construction shortly.

BOB WOODRUFF

Director of Athletics

George Robert Woodruff is in his third season as ringmaster of the Florida Gators.

He was born at Athens, Georgia. The family soon moved to Savannah where he played three years of high school football before entering the University of Tennessee. During the seasons of 1936-37-38, Woodruff was a standout tackle on the teams of General Bob Neyland which turned in a 23-5-3 record.



Immediately after receiving a degree in engineering from the University of Tennessee in 1939, Woodruff joined the Volunteer staff as assistant

coach and was with Tennessee in that capacity when the teams of 1939 and 1940 dropped decisions to Southern California and Boston College in the Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl games respectively.

Coach Woodruff entered the Army in 1941 and rose to the rank of Major in the Army Engineers with 4 years service before receiving his discharge in 1946.

For the football seasons of 1944 and 1945 he was assistant coach at West Point. Both of those seasons the Black Knights of the Hudson, manipulated by Coach Earl (Red) Blaik, thundered to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The next season, 1946, Woodruff returned South to join the Georgia Tech staff as line coach. That year Tech turned in a 9-2 record, including a 41-19 victory over Tulsa in the Oil Bowl.

In the Spring of 1947 Woodruff answered a call to Baylor University as head coach of the Southwest Conference Bears that had floundered in the league's cellar the year before with only one victory in nine starts.

The rough and ready Southwest had its eyes popped open early in the 1947 season when Baylor ripped its way to four straight victories—one a startling upset of Arkansas—before Texas halted the surge of the Bears. Baylor won five and lost five that year.

Came 1948 and a still more improved Bear eleven. They fought their way to a regular season record of five wins, three losses and two ties. Then on January 1st Baylor added another scalp by clipping Wake Forest 20 to 7 in the Delta Bowl game.

In 1949 Baylor made the going still harder for the giants of the Southwest and went down to the wire as the challenger to Rice for the Southwest Conference championship. The Owls had to come from behind for a 21 to 7 title win. Woodruff's record for his final year at Baylor was eight wins and two losses.

The Auburn-haired, easy-going native Georgian faced very much the same reconstruction problem in Gainesville that greeted him in Waco three years ago when he took the step up into the head coaching ranks.

Woodruff's two Gator elevens (of 1950 and 1951) broke exactly even both seasons with 5-5 records against rugged schedules that have included the best of the Southeastern Conference.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have an eight year old son, Scooter.

Florida's regular fullback in 1951, Casares may be the boy to fill the quarterback gap left vacant when Haywood Sullivan turned professional baseball . . . The name is pronounced with a hard "C" (K-sa-ree) . . . As a sophomore in 1951 he led Florida's ground gainers (122 yards), punters (average 39.1) and scorers (25 points) . . . Also a kicker, extra point and field goal man . . . He joined the Gator basketballers three games late and wound up as the leading scorer (346 points) and was selected on the All-SEC second team . . . A powerfully built boy with good speed and excellent coordination, he is among the finest all-around athletes in college sports today . . . Born on the Fourth of July . . . "MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the spur-of-the-moment suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first football team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.



"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia, made a tracing of it, and supplied it to the company.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.


"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gators, has been the name of the school's athletic teams ever since.'

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—70 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1906, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been four presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1906-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-).

COLLEGES

The University's 10 colleges include: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools include: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and the School of Inter-American studies.

Added in 1949 was the Cancer Research Laboratory. Of special importance in the national emergency is the Department of Military Science and Tactics which serves both the Army and Air Force. Other units include: Division of Music, Agricultural Experiment Station, Engineering Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Service, General Extension Division, the Division of Libraries and Division of Public Relations.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Buildings recently completed include the Classroom-Administration Building, the Gymnasium Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, seven dormitories, additions to the Law Building, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, and Stadium, along with many other changes and additions to existing buildings. Largest building currently under construction is a \$2,000,000 student residence hall. A College of Business Administration Building is scheduled for construction.

BOB WOODRUFF

Athletic Director and Head Coach

This season is George Robert Woodruff's fourth as head coach of the Florida Gators.

Bob Woodruff is a slow-moving, deep-thinking, result-getting native Georgian who did in three years with the Florida Gators what twelve predecessors had attempted over a span of two score. He piloted them into a post-season bowl game and produced Florida's second All-America football player.

Dale Van Sickle, an end, was the Gators' first All-America in 1928 and defensive tackle Charlie LaPradd was selected for the honor in 1952.

Bob Woodruff was born in Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916, but the family soon moved to Cuthbert, Georgia. He lived there until he was sixteen years of age, played on Cuthbert High's first football team and then moved to Savannah to play three years at Savannah High School.

During the seasons of 1936-37-38, Woodruff was a standout tackle on the teams of General Bob Neyland.

Immediately after receiving a degree in engineering from the University of Tennessee in 1939, Woodruff joined the Tennessee staff as assistant coach and was with the Vols in 1939 and 1940.

Coach Woodruff entered the Army in 1941 and was a Major in the Army Engineers when discharged in 1946.

In 1944 and 1945 he was assistant coach at West Point, and both of these seasons the Black Knights of the Hudson, manipulated by Coach Earl (Red) Blaik, thundered to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The next season, Woodruff was line coach at Georgia Tech and in the spring of 1947 became head coach at Baylor University. The bears had floundered in the Southwest Conference cellar the year before, but the rough and ready Southwest Conference had its eyes popped open early in Woodruff's first season when Baylor won four straight victories—one a startling upset of Arkansas—before mighty Texas came along to break the string. Baylor won five and lost five that year. The next year Baylor had a 6-3-2 record, including a 20-7 win over Wake Forest in the Delta Bowl. In 1949 Woodruff's Bears won eight, lost two and pushed Rice for the Southwest Conference title.

The auburn-haired, easy-going Georgian faced very much the same reconstruction problem at Florida when he joined the Gators in 1950. His Gator elevens of 1950 and 1951 broke exactly even with 5-5 records. Then in 1952 the Gators blossomed into one of the better



teams of the country, played their way to a regular season record of seven wins against three losses and then eased by a truly fine University of Tulsa team in the Gator Bowl, 14 to 13.

As the University of Florida's athletic director, Woodruff has brought the Gators an overall athletic prosperity unexcelled in the history of the school. Florida's 1952-53 eight intercollegiate varsity teams enjoyed an amazing winning percentage of .750 when they won 69 contests, lost only 23 and tied two. Against Southeastern Conference competition only, the Gators turned in an equally unbelievable winning percentage of .741 with 40 wins against only 14 losses. That was the best overall sports record in the Conference last year by 58 percentage points.

Woodruff developed six All-Southwest Conference first team players at Baylor and has had three at Florida. He also came up with an All-America coup last year when defensive tackle Charlie LaPradd was selected on enough teams to make the consensus selection. His All-SEC first stringers at Florida both made the team last year, LaPradd and guard Joe D'Agostino.

Intensely dedicated to his work, Woodruff comes pretty close to devoting 365 days a year to his Florida Gator rebuilding project in all sports. When he does snatch a relaxing moment here and there, he enjoys hunting, fishing and bridge—and being a spectator at some sports contest.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have two sons, nine-year-old Scooter and one-year-old Mark.

**"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING
OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'**

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Philip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Rice Institute is a non-sectarian, privately endowed educational institution that first opened its doors in 1912. In athletics, the school was a charter member of the Southwest Conference when that athletic organization was founded in 1915. Rice holds a unique place in collegiate football circles. With a limited enrollment of 1,600 (including about 500 women students) under high academic standards it is the smallest school in the so-called major college grid circles.

Yet, the Owls' grid record through the years is one that can be envied by many larger schools with good backgrounds in athletics. Rice teams have won three ('34, '37 and '49) and shared one ('46) Southwest Conference championships. Three Owl teams have appeared in major bowl games (Cotton Bowl of 1938 and 1950 and Orange Bowl of 1947) and were victorious on each occasion. Several Rice gridgers have won All-American acclaim, and a host have been All-Southwest Conference players.

Everything but the limited enrollment has grown at Rice since the modest beginning of college football at the school in 1912. Where the 7-0 victory over Houston High opening that first season was played before 3,000 fans in wooden bleachers in a city of about 100,000, in 1952 over 250,000 saw the Owl home games in the new stadium located in the largest city in the South with Houston now a metropolis of 800,000.

Although this year's game marks the debut of a Rice-Florida grid series, the Owls' head coach and athletic director, Jess Neely, has fielded a team against the Gators on one previous occasion. In 1937, when he was head coach at Clemson before moving to Rice in 1940, Neely's Tigers edged Florida 10-9. The Rice mentor also has had a coaching rivalry with the Gators' Bob Woodruff when the latter was coach at Baylor University in the Southwest Conference before moving to Gainesville. In 13 seasons at Rice, Neely-coached teams have won 79, lost 61, and tied 4 games.

Rice and Florida inaugurate not only a new grid season, but a new series when they meet on the football field for the first time at the beautiful 70,000 seat Rice Stadium, built on the school campus just three years ago.

Georgia Institute of Technology is a non-sectarian engineering school of around 4,000 students. It was founded in 1885 and officially opened on October 7, 1888. It is chartered by the Legislative body of the State of Georgia.

Most of Georgia Tech's student body of 4,000 is made up of young men, but in the fall of 1952 women were admitted as full-time students of the engineering and architecture schools for the first time. In its first year of co-education there were four women students at Tech.

Georgia Tech, with Professor West its informal coach, played its first football game in the fall of 1892, losing to Mercer College 0-12. Tech hired its first regular coach, John W. Heisman, in the fall of 1904, won eight games while losing one and tying one that season, and from that time the Yellow Jackets have been rated with the top teams of the nation. Tech's second coach, W. A. (Bill) Alexander, took over the coaching reins in 1920 and served until Robert L. (Bobby) Dodd, the present mentor, took over in 1945. Tech is currently riding an undefeated streak of 26 straight games. In 1952 the Yellow Jackets had one of the greatest years in the school's history, going undefeated and untied in 11 regular season games and defeating Mississippi 24-7 in the January 1 Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans.

Georgia Tech has (including the past two seasons) been champion or co-champion of the old Southern Conference eight times and of the Southeastern Conference five times. The Yellow Jackets have played in the Rose Bowl once (1929), the Sugar Bowl twice (1944 and 1953), the Orange Bowl four times (1940, 1945, 1948 and 1952), the Cotton Bowl once (1943) and the Oil Bowl once (1947). Tech, which has a bowl record of 7 wins against 2 defeats and has never lost in a bowl game under Coach Dodd, was the first team to play in the four major bowls.

The State University of Kentucky, opened in 1865, has a current enrollment of 8,000 students. The Wildcats got their intercollegiate football start back in 1891 when Coach Jackie Thompson's team was defeated by Centre College, 0 to 10. Head Coach Paul Bryant begins his seventh season with the Kentuckians this year. His Wildcat teams have won 53 and lost 21 and tied 4. The Wildcats played in Bowl games four of the last six years. A member of the Southeastern Conference, Kentucky won a 24 to 14 victory over Villanova in the Great Lake Bowl (Cleveland, Ohio) January first, 1948. On January 1, 1950, Kentucky dropped a 13 to 21 decision to Santa Clara in the Orange Bowl game. On January 1, 1951, the Wildcats returned to the Sugar Bowl to defeat Oklahoma, 13 to 7. On January 1, 1952, Kentucky was Cotton Bowl champion over Texas Christian, 20 to 7.

The Kentuckians definitely look to improvement this year and the man to watch in the Wildcat scheme of things is bruising Steve Meilinger, a great football player whether he is stationed at end, halfback or quarterback. The Florida-Kentucky football series, Florida score first:

Stetson University is the Baptist University of Florida, founded in 1883 as the DeLand Academy. The academy became a college in 1885 and in 1889 its name was changed to Stetson University in honor of the well-known hat manufacturer who gave generously of his time and means. The enrollment of 1,196 included 731 men and 465 women in the College of Liberal Arts, Law and the Schools of Business and Music. In addition to Baptist, Stetson students showed religious preference in 22 other faiths. The Florida Times-Union said that the football game at the Jacksonville Fair won by Stetson over Florida Agricultural College (later absorbed by the University of Florida), at Lake City was "the beginning of intercollegiate athletics in Florida." C. Seton Fleming was coach of this team. The Stetson-Florida series began in 1908 with Litchfield Colton as the Stetson coach. The 17 games of the series through last year have resulted in 13 victories for Florida and two have ended in ties. The first Florida-Stetson game was in the third year of football for the Gators and was one of five victories in their eight-game schedule for that season. The second meeting that year between the same two teams ended in a scoreless tie. This is Coach Jay Pattee's second year as head coach. His record stands at three wins, three ties, and four losses. The Gators coasted to a 33-6 win over the Hatters in the opener last year. The Florida-Stetson series, Florida score first:

The Citadel has a current enrollment of 2,000 all men, all military students. The Bulldogs first started playing football in 1905 with a 0-0 tie with Porter Military Academy. First coach of the Bulldogs was Sidney Smith. The first Florida-Citadel game turned up in 1910 and the two schools have played a total of 11 games, with all of them favoring the Gators. Current Coach of the Bulldogs is John D. McMillan, who took over the top spot following the resignation of Coach Quinn Decker in June of 1953. Coach McMillan graduated from the University of South Carolina where he starred as a football, baseball and track man for the Gamecocks. He coached at Edmunds High School in Sumter, S. C., was head coach at Erskine College for five years and head coach at the University of South Carolina in 1945.

The Citadel has not built an outstanding record of wins and losses over the years, a fact certainly not surprising when the calibre of Bulldog opposition is taken into consideration. Representing a comparatively small school, the Cadets of Charleston annually tackle many of the big-time names on the Southern football scene and every now and then strike off to battle larger outfits of other sections. They have played Army on several occasions. In 1952 the Bulldogs won 3, lost 5 and tied one. The Florida-Citadel football series, Florida score first:

Louisiana State University was founded in 1860 near Alexandria, La., as the State Seminary of Learning. It got its full name in 1877 when it was merged with the Agricultural and Mechanical College, previously located at New Orleans. First "Superintendent" of LSU was General William Tecumseh Sherman. Football was introduced at LSU in the fall of 1892, with only scrimmages represented as a schedule. In 1893 the Tigers initiated intercollegiate competition with Tulane and lost 0-34. First coach at the Ole War Skule was Dr. Charles E. Coates. In 59 years of football LSU has won 293, lost 165, and tied 28 games of 486 played. In Conference activity the Tigers have played 119 games, winning 63, against 47 losses and nine ties. LSU teams have participated in four Sugar Bowl games ('36-37-38-40), and have appeared in Orange ('44), and Cotton ('47) Bowl games as well. Twenty-one coaches have tutored Tiger teams, with Gaynell Tinsley entering his sixth season as head man of the Bengals. Big Gus has done more with less than any of his predecessors at Tigertown, and his five-year record against the most formidable schedules in the land shows a 25-25-3 mark. The October 24 tilt between LSU and Florida will be the third in the history of the series between the schools. Bernie Moore-mentored LSU teams defeated the Gators, 10-7, in 1941, after an inaugural victory of 19-0 in 1937. The Florida-LSU series, Florida score first:

The University of Tennessee was chartered in 1794 and is one of the oldest State Universities in the country. It was the first co-educational institution in America and established the first Y.M.C.A. in the South.

The nickname "Volunteers" is the official nickname of the State and has become the nickname of the athletic teams of the University. The nickname originated when Andrew Jackson successfully mustered armies of Tennessee volunteers to fight the Indians and also to participate in the Battle of New Orleans. The name became prominent during the Mexican War when the Governor of Tennessee asked for 2,800 volunteers and instead of 2,800—30,000 volunteered immediately. In subsequent calls Tennessee has always had a majority of volunteers to respond.

The first year of football was in 1896. The Vols defeated Virginia Polytechnic Institute 6 to 4 in their first game.

Harvey Robinson is beginning his first year as head coach at the University of Tennessee. He has served as General Neyland's No. 1 aide at Tennessee since 1946.

The Tennessee-Florida series began in 1916 when Tennessee defeated Florida 24 to 0. The Vols and Gators have met on nine occasions and Tennessee has been victorious in all games. Tennessee defeated Florida last year in Knoxville 26 to 13. The Florida-Tennessee series, Florida score first:

The University of Miami was founded in 1926. That year the first roll call was answered by 232 students. Today that entire undergraduate body could be swallowed up by single academic departments in any of the University's eight schools, without showing a bulge.

The growth from a small new college to a University of 11,000 students in a brief quarter of a century could be ascribed with some accuracy to the parallel mushrooming of the Dade County population.

Today the Main Campus, already known as the most modern one in the country, is considered only a fraction of what some day will rise there to house and educate students of the future.

While comparatively young as far as most universities and colleges throughout the nation go, Miami in a short span of years has become a football power.

Miami first stepped into the spotlight back in 1938 in football when during that season the Hurricanes turned in stunning upsets over Florida and Georgia. These were Miami's first outstanding triumphs in football. Since then, the Hurricanes have knocked off many outstanding teams of the nation, including teams from the Big Ten, Southwest Conference and the Southeastern Conference.

Miami has met Big Ten teams in competition four times in football and in three of those four games, Miami emerged victorious.

One of the most brilliant triumphs in Hurricane history came in 1950 when Miami defeated Purdue of the Big Ten at Lafayette, Ind., a week after the Boilermakers had knocked off Notre Dame ending the Fighting Irish's sensational winning streak.

The 1950 Miami team went undefeated and played Clemson in the Orange Bowl game on New Year's day. The 1951 Miami team was selected for the Gator Bowl and defeated Clemson for the Gator Bowl crown on New Year's Day, 1952.

Miami schedules of the future include Notre Dame in football. The Irish will come to Miami in 1955 to play the Hurricanes.

THE GATOR BAND

The University of Florida Band, more popularly known as The Gator Band and The Fighting Gator Band, produces many of the most colorful halftime musical shows to be found in college football today. A total of 165 people work under the brilliant direction of Colonel Harold B. Bachman, director, to produce the spectacles that have thrilled football audiences throughout the South.

This high opinion of The Fighting Gator Band is shared by many who have seen it in action. On his NBC broadcast of the Florida-Kentucky game in 1952, sportscaster Bill Stern said: "This is one of the finest marching bands I have ever seen, and I think I have seen most of them. It's a tremendous musical organization." On the same broadcast, nationally famed bandmaster Tommy Dorsey said: "It's one of the finest college bands in the country. Everything they do is great. I could hear every instrument just as if it were set up in a studio."

Members of The Fighting Gator Band spend four, two-hour sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for their colorful Saturday spectacles.

Band members do not receive scholarships or other financial inducements. Representing every department of the University, the band membership is a true cross-section of the student body.

Fighting Gator Band field productions are primarily based on a solid musical foundation with good music as the guiding principle. Each halftime show usually includes one or more musical presentations featuring distinctive arrangements played while the band maneuvers into appropriate formations or tableaux. A distinctive characteristic is that many of the feature numbers are performed "in the round" so that the view and sound will be the same from both sides of the stadium.

Uniforms of the men in the basic square of the band are blue with orange trimmings and accessories—topped with shakos and rice blue plumes. Drum majors and baton twirlers are dressed in white, trimmed in orange and blue.

Here is the make-up of the Fighting Gator Band for the 1953 season: Two drum majors; 15 baton twirlers and flag bearers; 4 girl bell lyre players; 104 men the band; 12 alternates in auxiliary unit; public two band directors. FLORIDA HOMECOMING



The University of Florida's annual Homecoming is in the "super colossal, out of this world" category. It attracts two separate crowds of 40,000 people—one for the spectacular Gator Growl Friday night and another for the Homecoming game Saturday. This year's game: Florida-LSU, on October 24th.

Sandwiched between are parades, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority shindigs and barbecues. Standing in both magnificent and comic splendor are the colorful fraternity decorations.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the victors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult. Things happen so fast and so appealingly at a Florida Homecoming and are timed to split-second perfection with such prodigious planning that the coaches often wistfully wonder "If we'll be able to squeeze in a couple of hours for the football game."

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-LSU football game on October 24th will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

FLORIDA'S ALL-AMERICA PLAYERS

DALE VAN SICKEL The first Florida Gator to be selected for All-America first team honors was Dale Van Sichel, the star of the 1928 team. Van Sichel's accomplishments as a Florida flankman have almost entered the realm of the legendary. He was a highly colorful performer on the highest scoring team in Florida's football history and the team that was the nation's high scorer in 1928 with 336 points. That season the Gators won 8 and lost one, the single defeat to Tennessee in the final game of the season. Almost since graduation Van Sichel has been—and still is—a motion picture character player in Hollywood.

CHARLIE LAPRADD Florida's second All-America performer was Tackle Charlie LaPradd. LaPradd was selected on the Associated Press first team, the International News Service second team and the United Press third team. He collected a sufficient number of players on all of the All-America selections to make the consensus team. He is now in the insurance business in Orlando, Florida.

WHEN YOU VISIT THE GATORS

The skeletonized map on the facing page will be of service to you when you pay the Gators a visit. If you are coming for a football game, it will be better for you to follow the heavy arrows placed at the main intersections of highways and streets. By following these arrows, you will avoid suddenly running into a barricade made necessary for traffic conditions on game days.

In brief, these arrows will take you to the intersection of University Avenue and 13th Street, which is the main entrance to the University of Florida. You then proceed on University Avenue past two traffic lights, past the handball stalls on the left and turn left into the parking lot at the next corner. On occasions this corner will be blocked off by a patrolman who will send you on another half-block to a second entrance to the parking lot. Any other route to the stadium might take you into a road blockade.

The Athletic Association offices (which include the coaching staff, the ticket office and the sports publicity offices) are located in Florida Gymnasium, the large building just southeast of the Stadium on the map.


The coaches offices are on the main floor of Florida Gymnasium. You go up the main entrance steps, enter the gym lobby and turn left down the corridor. The coaches' secretary is located in the second office on the left and she will be glad to help you find any of the coaches you wish to see. If you need to go by the ticket office or see Coach Percy Beard, turn down the right corridor from the gym lobby. It will be the first door on the left.


The office of Dean D. K. (Dutch) Stanley, College of Physical Education and Health, will be the second door on your right.

To reach the sports publicity office, enter up the main steps of the Gymnasium, go into the lobby and turn down the right corridor. Use the steps at the end of that hallway and go down two flights. This will bring you out in a large recreation room. The sports publicity offices will be the third door on the right.

The map opposite also indicates the location of the University of Florida baseball field and the track stadium (Graham Field, next to football field).

The black stars on the map indicate places on or near the campus to get a bite to eat: Student Service Center, University Cafeteria, and several establishments along the "Gold Coast" on University Avenue, just across from the campus.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 160 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been four presidents: Dr. Andrew Siedd, (1906-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), and Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53). Dr. John S. Allen is acting president.

COLLEGES

The University's 10 colleges include: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools include: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and the School of Inter-American Studies.

Added in 1949 was the Cancer Research Laboratory. Of special importance in the national emergency is the Department of Military Science and Tactics which serves both the Army and Air Force. Other units include: Division of Music, Agricultural Experiment Station, Engineering Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Service, General Extension Division, the Division of Libraries, and Division of Alumni Affairs.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Class-room-Administration Building, the Gymnasium Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, and Stadium addition, along with many other changes and additions to existing buildings. Two large structures completed and accepted this year are the College of Business Administration Building and a \$2,000,000 residence hall. Scheduled for construction is the first unit of a College of Agriculture Building, and a Medical Building.

BOB WOODRUFF

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

One thing Florida football fans—among the most rabid found anywhere—desired most of all for many years was a bowl team. Coach Bob Woodruff gave them that in his third year at the helm of the Gators.

Next in importance, they wanted a scrapping, determined team that would make them proud, and for the fifth year since coming to Florida, Coach Woodruff expects to present them with such a team. Sophomore laden, the 1954 Florida squad will be composed almost half of men up from the freshman ranks. Eager to gain recognition for their team, these youngsters will provide the kind of "will to play" their coach desires most in his players.

A native Georgian, Coach Woodruff was born in Athens, on March 14, 1916. Early after his birth, the family moved to Cutthbert, Georgia, where they lived until he was 16 years old. He played on Cutthbert High's first football team, and then on moving to Savannah played three years for Savannah High School.

Those close to Coach Woodruff know him as a person who makes no hasty decisions, thinking things through to a careful conclusion. His teams are well disciplined and his associates are deeply loyal, a trait reflected from the coach himself.

These qualities, his friends believe, stem in a large measure from his playing days as a standout tackle in 1936-37-38 on the Tennessee teams of General Bob Neyland.

Following his graduation from the University of Tennessee in 1938, when he received an engineering degree, Woodruff joined the Vols staff as assistant coach, a position he held during the 1939 and 1940 seasons.

Entering the Army in 1941, Coach Woodruff rose to the rank of Major before being discharged in 1946. During that period of service, he was an assistant coach in 1944 and 1945 at West Point, helping Coach Earl (Red) Blaik guide the Black Knights of the Hudson to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The following season he was line coach at Georgia Tech, before becoming head coach at Baylor University in the spring of 1947. Immediately lifting a floundering Baylor squad out of the cellar of a tough Southwest Conference, Coach Woodruff had the eyes of the nation turned on him. That first season Baylor claimed four quick victories in a row, including a startling upset of Arkansas. A powerful Texas team broke the string, and Baylor went on to a respectable five-five season. The following season Baylor enjoyed a 6-3-2 season,



including a Delta Bowl victory (20-7) over Wake Forest. Then in 1949, Woodruff guided an astonishing Baylor Bears to eight wins and two losses.

At Florida, where he became Head Coach and Director of Athletics in 1950, Woodruff found many of the problems which had existed at Baylor. The Gators that first season compiled a creditable 5-5 season, and followed with an identical record in 1951. Then, as at Baylor, the third year was the big one. The 1952 Gators became one of the country's top teams, compiling a regular season's record of seven wins, against three losses, and went on to beat an excellent Tulsa team in the Gator Bowl, 14-13.

Following the graduation of many top stars, including Florida's second All-American in the School's history—Charlie LaPrade—another program of rebuilding was underway in 1953. The Gators won three, lost five, and tied two. Three of the losses were by four points, or less.

Meanwhile, as Athletic Director, Woodruff has continued to place a strong emphasis on a "total" sports program, and the Gators have prospered in basketball, track, swimming, baseball, tennis and golf. The centennial year 1962-63 was the big-one for all sports, too, when all Gator teams won 69 contests, lost only 23 and tied two for a percentage of 741.

A man who is intensely dedicated to his work, Coach Woodruff is also known to his close associates as an untiring fisherman and hunter. And, when teams other than football are performing, he throws himself thoroughly into the spirit of being one of the fans.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have two sons, Scooter, 10, and Mark, 2.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators'."

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

Rice Institute is a non-sectarian, privately endowed educational institution that first opened its doors in 1912. In athletics, the school was a charter member of the Southwest Conference when that athletic organization was founded in 1915. Rice holds a unique place in collegiate football circles. With a limited enrollment of 1,600 (including about 500 women students) under high academic standards, it is the smallest school in the so-called major college grid circles.

Yet, the Owls' grid record through the years is one that can be envied by many larger schools with good backgrounds in athletics. Rice teams have won three ('34, '37, and '49) and shared two ('46 and '53) Southwest Conference championships. Four Owl teams have appeared in major bowl games (Cotton Bowl of 1938, 1950, and 1954 and Orange Bowl of 1947) and were victorious on each occasion. Several Rice gridgers have won All-American acclaim, and a host have been All-Southwest Conference players.

Everything but the limited enrollment has grown at Rice since the modest beginning of college football at the school in 1912. Where the 7-0 victory over Houston High opening that first season was played before 3,000 fans in wooden bleachers in a city of about 100,000, in 1953 over 250,000 saw the Owl home games in the new stadium located in the largest city in the South with Houston now a metropolis of 1,000,000.

The Rice-Florida series was established last year, with the Owls winning, 20-16 the game played in Rice Stadium. Although the two teams met for the first time last year, Jess Neely and Bob Woodruff were coaching rivals when Coach Woodruff was at Baylor University in the Southwest Conference before moving to Gainesville. In 14 seasons at Rice, Neely-coached teams have won 88, lost 53, and tied 4 games.

Georgia Institute of Technology is a non-sectarian engineering school, founded in 1885 and officially opened on Oct. 7, 1888. It is chartered by the Legislative body of the State of Georgia.

Primarily a men's institution, Georgia Tech in 1952, however, began admitting women as full-time students of the engineering and architecture schools. Co-education is now growing steadily.

Georgia Tech, with a Professor West as its informal coach, played its first football game in 1892, losing to Mercer College 0-12. Tech hired its first regular coach, John W. Heisman, in the fall of 1904, won eight games while losing one and tying one that season. Tech has been rated as a top national team ever since. The Yellow Jackets' second coach, W. A. (Bill) Alexander, served from 1920 until Robert L. (Bobby) Dodd, the present coach, took over in 1946. Under Coach Dodd's leadership, Tech football teams have won 74 games, lost 23 and tied two in the past nine years. The 1953 Yellow Jackets won 8, lost two and were tied (by Florida). They also set new records while defeating West Virginia 42-19 in the Sugar Bowl on January 1, 1954.

Tech has been champion or co-champion of the old Southern Conference eight times and the Southeastern Conference five times. They played in the Rose Bowl (1929), the Sugar Bowl three times (1944, 1953, and 1954), the Orange Bowl four times (1940, 1945, 1948, and 1952), the Cotton Bowl (1943), and the Oil Bowl (1947). Tech's Bowl record is 8 wins and 2 defeats. The Yellow Jackets were the first to play in all four major bowls, and they have never lost a bowl game under Coach Dodd.

THE GATOR BAND

The University of Florida Band, more popularly known as The Gator Band, produces many of the most colorful halftime musical shows to be found in college football today. A total of 155 people work under the brilliant direction of Colonel Harold B. Bachman, director, to produce the spectacles that have thrilled football audiences throughout the South.

This high opinion of The Gator Band is shared by many who have seen it in action. On his NBC broadcast of the Florida-Kentucky game in 1952, sportscaster Bill Stern said: "This is one of the finest marching bands I have ever seen, and I think I have seen most of them. It's a tremendous musical organization."

On the same broadcast, nationally famed bandmaster Tommy Dorsey said: "It's one of the finest college bands in the country. Everything they do is great. I could hear every instrument just as if it were set up in a studio."

Members of The Gator Band spend four, two-hour sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for their colorful Saturday spectacles.

Band members do not receive scholarships or other financial inducements. Representing every department of the University, the band membership is a true cross-section of the student body.

Gator Band field productions are primarily based on a solid musical foundation with good music as the guiding principle. Each halftime show usually includes one or more musical presentations featuring distinctive arrangements played while the band maneuvers into appropriate formations or tableaux. A distinctive characteristic is that many of the feature numbers are performed "in the round" so that the view and sound will be the same from both sides of the stadium.

Uniforms of the men in the basic square of the band are blue with orange trimmings and accessories—topped with shakos and rice blue plumes. Drum majors and baton twirlers are dressed in white, trimmed in orange and blue.

Here is the make-up of the Gator Band for the 1954 season: Two drum majors; 15 baton twirlers and flag bearers; 4 girl bell lyre players; 104 men in the band; 12 alternates in auxiliary unit; public two band directors. Staff of Physical Education, Billy Mitchel Drill Teams field productions.

FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 40,000.

The game this year is with a Southeastern Conference opponent, Mississippi State, on October 30.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has

become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one. Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-Mississippi State football game on October 30th will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

WHEN YOU VISIT THE GATORS

The skeletonized map on the facing page will be of service to you when you pay the Gators a visit. If you are coming for a football game, it will be better for you to follow the heavy arrows placed at the main intersections of highways and streets. By following these arrows, you will avoid suddenly running into a barricade made necessary for traffic conditions on game days.


In brief, these arrows will take you to the intersection of University Avenue and 13th Street, which is the main entrance to the University of Florida. You then proceed on University Avenue past two traffic lights, past the handball stalls on the left and turn left into the parking lot at the next corner. On occasions this corner will be blocked off by a patrolman who will send you on another half-block to a second entrance to the parking lot. Any other route to the stadium might take you into a road blockade.

The Athletic Association offices, including the coaching staff, the ticket office and office of the Business Manager, the Gator Boosters, Inc., and Sports Publicity are newly located this year in the Florida Field Stadium, south west section, beneath the stands. Enter from the street (Stadium Drive). The first floor level contains the Business Manager's office, Gator Boosters, and Sports Publicity Department. Coaches offices are on the second floor.

Entrance to the Press Box is gained by showing your pass at the Elevator Lobby. The Elevator will take you to the Press, Radio, Photography, and Western Union Decks. (For further information on the Press Box, turn page.)

The map opposite also indicates the location of the Florida baseball field, the track stadium (Graham Field), Florida Gymnasium and swimming pool.

The stars on the map indicate places on or near the campus to get a bite to eat: Student Service Center, University Cafeteria, and several establishments located opposite the Campus (north side) on University Avenue.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 160 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J.

COLLEGES

The University's 10 colleges are: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the School of Inter-American Studies. The College of Medicine will be added in 1956.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Class-room-Administration Building, the Gymnasium-Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, the College of Business Administration, a \$2,000,000 residence hall, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, and Stadium Addition, along with many other changes and additions to existing buildings.

Among the buildings under construction at present are the first unit of a College of Agriculture Building, and a Medical Building.

BOB WOODRUFF

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

George R. (Bob) Woodruff, now in his sixth year as head football coach and director of athletics at the University of Florida, has the longest tenure of any football coach in the University's history.

Over the past five years, Coach Woodruff has brought the Gators into a position of respect, not only as a potent member of the strong Southeastern Conference but also as a team worthy of recognition nationally. The Gators now are "representative" of the kind of excellent football team the rest of the country has come to expect of the SEC.



A native Georgian who received his college education in Tennessee, and whose coaching career has carried him to West Point in New York State and to Baylor in Texas, Coach Woodruff today is a confirmed Floridian. Always ready to point out Florida's assets to visitors or when visiting, Woodruff tells everyone frankly: "My wife and my sons and I have found a home in Florida."

Born in Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916, Coach Woodruff's family soon moved to Cuthbert in that state, where they lived until he was 16 years old. He played on Cuthbert High's first football team, and then on moving to Savannah played three years for Savannah High School.

Those close to Coach Woodruff know him as a person who makes no hasty decisions, thinking things through to a careful conclusion. His teams are well disciplined and his associates are deeply loyal, a trait reflected from the coach himself.

These qualities, his friends believe, stem in a large measure from his playing days as a standout tackle in 1936-37-38 on the Tennessee teams of General Bob Neyland.

Following his graduation from the University of Tennessee in 1939, when he received an engineering degree, Woodruff joined the Vols staff as assistant coach, a position he held during the 1939 and 1940 seasons.

Entering the Army in 1941, Coach Woodruff rose to the rank of Major before being discharged in 1946. During that period of service, he was an assistant coach in 1944 and 1945 at West Point, helping Coach East (Red) Blaik guide the Black Knights of the Hudson to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The following season he was line coach at Georgia Tech, before becoming head coach at Baylor University in the spring of 1947. Immediately lifting a floundering Baylor squad out of the cellar of a

tough Southwest Conference, Coach Woodruff had the eyes of the nation turned on him. That first season Baylor claimed four quick victories in a row, including a startling upset of Arkansas. A powerful Texas team broke the string, and Baylor went on to a respectable five-five season. The following season Baylor enjoyed a 6-3-2 season, including a Delta Bowl victory (20-7) over Wake Forest. Then in 1949, Woodruff guided an astonishing Baylor Bears to eight wins and two losses.

At Florida, where he became Head Coach and Director of Athletics in 1950, Woodruff found many of the problems which had existed at Baylor. The Gators that first season compiled a creditable 6-5 season, and followed with an identical record in 1951. Then, as at Baylor, the third year was the big one. The 1952 Gators became one of the country's top teams, compiling a regular season's record of seven wins, against three losses, and went on to beat an excellent Tulsa team in the Gator Bowl, 14-13.

Following the graduation of many top stars, another rebuilding program was underway in 1953. In 1954 the program again was in high gear and the Gators compiled their finest Southeastern Conference in Florida's history, winning five and losing two for a third place tie. Their overall record was five wins and five losses.

Meanwhile, as Athletic Director, Woodruff has continued to place a strong emphasis on a "Total" sports program, and the Gators have prospered in basketball, track, swimming, baseball, tennis and golf. Since 1950, Florida teams in all sports have won 387, lost 204 and tied 10 for a win percentage of .655. Against SEC competition the win percentage is .605.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have two sons, Scooter, 11, and Mark, 2.

**"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING
OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'**

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Mississippi State, a land-grant college, was founded in 1878 and opened in 1880. Located in the rolling hills of Northeast Mississippi's prairie region, just a few hours' drive from the most distant point in the state, is Mississippi State College, "The Peoples College", largest institution of higher learning in the Magnolia state.

When Mississippi State's first football team, the "scoreless wonders" of 1895 (then Mississippi A. & M.) made its debut under a student coach, only two courses, agriculture and the mechanic arts, were available to the 213 students then enrolled.

Since its early beginning both the school and the football team have grown in maturity. In 1940 the Maroons were undefeated in football and had only a tie with Auburn to mar a perfect record. In 1941 the Maroons won their only Southeastern Conference football championship.

The football team has played in two bowl games, losing to Duquesne 13-12 in the 1937 Orange Bowl game, and defeating Georgetown 14-7 in the 1941 Orange Bowl game.

In 1954 the Maroons, playing their first campaign under youthful Darrell Royal, finished in a tie with Auburn for sixth place in SEC standings. The final record showed six victories against four losses. In SEC action the record was 3-3.

Royal, a former Maroon backfield coach, gave up the head coaching post of the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian pro league to take over the Maroon assignment when Murray Warmath departed for Minnesota.

The former Oklahoma All-American quarterback, who learned his football under Jim Tatum and Bud Wilkinson, had previously served as an assistant coach at North Carolina State, Tulsa and Mississippi State. The Florida-State football series, Florida scores first:

yards against Miami in 1941, was broken only in 1954 by End Ray Brown, who went 80 yards to score against Tennessee. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6 1/2 inches, which won him the National AAU championship in 1942, still stands as the best ever made by a Florida athlete.

After leaving the University, Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army. Before being severely wounded in the Normandy landing in 1944, Fergie so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years later.

THE GATOR BAND

The University of Florida Band, more popularly known as The Gator Band, produces many of the most colorful halftime musical shows to be found in college football today. A total of 155 people work under the brilliant direction of Colonel Harold B. Bachman, director, to produce the spectacles that have thrilled football audiences throughout the South.

This high opinion of The Gator Band is shared by many who have seen it in action. On his NBC broadcast of the Florida-Kentucky game in 1952, sportscaster Bill Stern said: "This is one of the finest marching bands I have ever seen, and I think I have seen most of them. It's a tremendous musical organization."

On the same broadcast, nationally famed bandmaster Tommy Dorsey said: "It's one of the finest college bands in the country. Everything they do is great. I could hear every instrument just as if it were set up in a studio."

Members of The Gator Band spend four, two-hour sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for their colorful Saturday spectacles.

Band members do not receive scholarships or other financial inducements. Representing every department of the University, the band membership is a true cross-section of the student body.

Gator Band field productions are primarily based on a solid musical foundation with good music as the guiding principle. Each halftime show usually includes one or more musical presentations featuring distinctive arrangements played while the band maneuvers into appropriate formations or tableaux. A distinctive characteristic is that many of the feature numbers are performed "in the round" so that the view and sound will be the same from both sides of the stadium.

Uniforms of the men in the basic square of the band are blue with orange trimmings and accessories—topped with shakes and rice blue plumes. Drum majors and baton twirlers are dressed in white, trimmed in orange and blue.

Here is the make-up of the Gator Band for the 1954 season: Two drum majors; 15 baton twirlers and flag bearers; 4 girl bell lyre players; 104 men the band; 12 alternates in auxiliary unit; public two band directors. Student of Physical Education, Billy Mitchell Drill Tennis field productions.

FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 40,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, Tennessee, on Nov. 12.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-Tennessee football game on November 12 will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

WHEN YOU VISIT THE GATORS

The skeletonized map on the facing page will be of service to you when you pay the Gators a visit. If you are coming for a football game, it will be better for you to follow the heavy arrows placed at the main intersections of highways and streets. By following these arrows, you will avoid suddenly running into a barricade made necessary for traffic conditions on game days.


In brief, these arrows will take you to the intersection of University Avenue and 13th Street, which is the main entrance to the University of Florida. You then proceed on University Avenue past two traffic lights, past the handball stalls on the left and turn left into the parking lot at the next corner. On occasions this corner will be blocked off by a patrolman who will send you on another half-block to a second entrance to the parking lot. Any other route to the stadium might take you into a road blockade.

The Athletic Association offices, including the coaching staff, the ticket office and office of the Business Manager, the Gator Boosters, Inc., and Sports Publicity are located in the Florida Field Stadium, southwest section, beneath the stands. Enter from the street (Stadium Drive). The first floor level contains the Business Manager's office, Gator Boosters, and Sports Publicity Department. Coaches offices are on the second floor.

Entrance to the Press Box is gained by showing your pass at the Elevator Lobby. The Elevator will take you to the Press, Radio, Photography, and Western Union Decks. (For further information on the Press Box, turn page.)

The map opposite also indicates the location of the Florida baseball field, the track stadium (Graham Field), Florida Gymnasium and swimming pool.

The stars on the map indicate places on or near the campus to get a bite to eat: Student Service Center, University Cafeteria, and several establishments located opposite the Campus (north side) on University Avenue.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 160 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-23), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J.

Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Allied Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the School of Inter-American Studies. The College of Medicine will open this fall.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Class-room-Administration Building, the Gymnasium-Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, the College of Business Administration, a \$2,000,000 residence hall, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, and Stadium Addition, along with many other changes and additions to existing buildings.

Among the buildings under construction at present is the first unit of a College of Agriculture Building, and a Medical Building.

BOB WOODRUFF

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

Even though this is the year for that lucky number, seven, for George R. (Bob) Woodruff as Athletic Director and Head Coach at the University of Florida, he is a man who learned long ago that it takes more than luck (even though you can always use some) in football.

A graduate of the Neyland School of hard knocking football at Tennessee, Woodruff is therefore a man who firmly believes that good blocking, hard tackling, a punt at the right time and other fundamentals of the game make a wonderful hand-maiden to Lady Luck.

That his players left spring training this year expressing the belief that "we have a good team" indicates the Florida Coach has promoted high morale and a healthy confidence among the Fighting Gators of 1966.

Woodruff has played with and coached some of the best teams in the nation. Out of his associations in football, ranging from bowl teams of Tennessee in the late 30's to his own Gator Bowl champions at Florida, has come a keen enthusiasm for the game and a fondness for its people.

A native Georgian who still has many ties in that state, Bob Woodruff is nevertheless a staunch Floridian who sincerely believes that many coaches in the nation must feel a great envy for his good fortune at being able to live in this state and work at the University of Florida.

Early Days

Born in Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916, Coach Woodruff's family soon moved to Cuthbert in that state, where they lived until he was 16 years old. He played on Cuthbert High's first football team, and then on moving to Savannah played three years for Savannah High School.

Those close to Coach Woodruff know him as a person who makes no hasty decisions, thinking things through to a careful conclusion. His teams are well disciplined and his associates are deeply loyal, a trait reflected from the coach himself.

Following his graduation from the University of Tennessee in 1939, when he received an engineering degree, Woodruff joined the Vols staff as assistant coach, a position he held during the 1939 and 1940 seasons.

Entering the Army in 1941, Woodruff rose to the rank of Major before being discharged in 1946. During that period of service, he was an assistant coach in 1944 and 1945 at West Point, helping Coach Earl (Red) Blaik guide the Black Knights of the Hudson to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The following season he was line coach at Georgia Tech, before becoming head coach at Baylor University in the spring of 1947.

A Head Coach

Never before in his college playing or coaching career had Woodruff been associated with anything but a nationally ranked team. When he arrived at Baylor he was confronted with the task—and this on his first head coaching assignment—of lifting a floundering Bear squad up by its bootstraps into a position of prominence in a tough league, the Southwest Conference.

He might have spoken slowly, but he moved fast. The Bears started that first season by claiming four quick victories in a row, including a startling upset over Arkansas. A powerful Texas team broke the string, and Baylor went on to a respectable five-five season. The following season Baylor enjoyed a 6-3-2 record, including a Delta Bowl victory (20-7) over Wake Forest, and then Woodruff really brought the Bears into prominence when he guided them to eight wins and two losses.

At Florida where he became Head Coach and Director of Athletics in 1950, Woodruff found many of the problems which had existed at Baylor. The Gators were an ideal "Homecoming Opponent" for others in the Southeastern Conference. In three seasons the Gators won 17, lost 13 and were victors in the Gator Bowl, defeating Tulsa, 14-13. This was the first Bowl invitation ever received by a Florida team in nearly 50 years of football. The Gators had come of age.

Another high point in Woodruff's coaching days at Florida came in 1964 when the Gators had a record of five wins and two defeats against Southeastern Conference opponents. This gave them a tie for third place in the league, highest ranking achieved by the Gators since formation of the SEC in 1933. Woodruff's record at Florida now stands at 30 victories, 29 defeats, and 2 ties. Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have two sons, Scotty, 12, and Mark, 3.

THE GATOR BAND

The University of Florida "Gator Band" is deemed one of the finest in America today. Its gridiron spectacles are an essential part of Gatorland football festivities, and its year-round musical activities are an important part of University community life.

Harold B. Bachman is the distinguished Director of the University of Florida Bands, including the 145 members of the Gator gridiron aggregation, and the five other band organizations which serve the University and the state.

Reid Poole, Assistant Director of Bands, plans and produces the football shows, and writes the special musical arrangements featured by the Band.

Claude Allen of Gainesville is the Head Drum Major who directs the Band on the field. Beverly Stalnaker is Head Majorette and featured baton twirler. Band personnel includes 104 men in the marching square of the Band, a baton twirling squad of 16, the Big Bass Drum crew of 8, and some 20 additional musicians who play in the stands and on occasion act as flag bearers, alternates, property men, etc. Delbert Sterrett is the announcer for the Band.

The Gator Band spends four 80-minute sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for the Saturday football shows.

Band members do not receive scholarships or other financial inducements. Representing every department of the University, the band membership is a true cross section of the student body.

Gator band field productions are primarily based on a solid musical foundation with good music as the guiding principle. Each halftime show usually includes one or more musical presentations featuring distinctive arrangements played while the band maneuvers into appropriate formations or tableaux. A distinctive characteristic is that many of the feature numbers are performed "in the round" so that the view and sound will be the same from both sides of the stadium.

This year the Gator Band has been outfitted with completely new uniforms. The basic uniform is two-toned blue trimmed in orange. Coats are of royal blue, trousers in a complementary French blue. The overall orange trim is high-lighted by an orange satin cape and topped off by the orange plume on the cap. The Drum Majors and the Baton Twirling Squad are dressed in white trimmed in orange and blue.

The Gator Band giant exhibition bass drum is one of the largest drums in the country. At the time it was made, a writer for the Chicago Sun-Times quoted its manufacturer as saying that it is "The World's Largest bass drum that will boom properly." The drum was especially made for the "Gator Band" by the WFL Drum Company of Chicago. The drum is 6 feet in diameter and 25½ inches in width. On its specially constructed carriage, it stands nearly 9 feet high. Two bandmen are used to maneuver the drum carriage and the player, using extra length drum sticks, marches along side.

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

Winner of the 1955 award, to be made Nov. 3 at halftime of the Auburn game in 1956, was Center Steve DeLaTorre, Florida's All-American center. The first award was made last year to Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback for the '54 Gators.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 293 feet, 6¾ inches, which won him a National AAU championship in 1942, is still the best throw ever made by a Florida athlete.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 40,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, Tennessee, on Nov. 12.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has

become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-Auburn football game on November 3 will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Philip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the School of Inter-American Studies.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Class-room-Administration Building, the Gymnasium-Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, the College of Business Administration, a \$2,000,000 residence hall, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, Stadium addition and Dan McCarty Hall, a \$1,300,000 agricultural building.

PROJECTED GROWTH

The 1957 State Legislature appropriated funds to construct a \$800,000 classroom building, a \$1,500,000 architecture building, a \$1,600,000 pharmacy wing to the Health Center, nearly \$2,000,000 for a nuclear Science Center, and funds to build a physics auditorium. Several of these projects are currently under construction.

BOB WOODRUFF

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

A man of tremendous energy with an unbounding capacity for attention to detail, Bob Woodruff over the past seven years has moulded Florida's Gators into a respected football team.

Upon his arrival at the University of Florida in 1950, Woodruff was faced with the task of giving a team back its own self confidence; its fans a feeling of pride. This he has done through ability and leadership and a sound fundamental knowledge of the game of football.

The Gators have surged steadily forward, and last year were still in the thick of the Conference title race in the waning weeks of the season. Florida finished third in the SEC with a record of five wins and two defeats against league opponents. Woodruff regrouped the 1956 Gators after a mediocre start of one victory, one loss and one tie, coming on to win five straight games.

Over the past seven years, Woodruff's Florida teams have won 36 games, lost 32 and tied 3. As head coach at Baylor and Florida his teams have won 65, lost 42 and tied five.

Early Days

Born in Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916, Coach Woodruff's family soon moved to Cutbert in that state, where they lived until he was 16 years old. He played on Cutbert High's first football team, and then on moving to Savannah played three years for Savannah High School.

Those close to Coach Woodruff know him as a person who makes no hasty decisions, thinking things through to a careful conclusion. His teams are well disciplined and his associates are deeply loyal, a trait reflected from the coach himself.

Following his graduation from the University of Tennessee in 1939, when he received an engineering degree, Woodruff joined the Vols staff as assistant coach, a position he held during the 1939 and 1940 seasons.

Entering the Army in 1941, Woodruff rose to the rank of Major before being discharged in 1946. During that period of service, he was an assistant coach in 1944 and 1945 at West Point, helping Coach Earl (Red) Blaik guide the Black Knights of the Hudson to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The following season he was line coach at Georgia Tech, before becoming head coach at Baylor University in the spring of 1947.

A Head Coach

Never before in his college playing or coaching career had Woodruff been associated with anything but a nationally ranked team. When he arrived at Baylor he was confronted with the task—and

this on his first head coaching assignment—of lifting a floundering Bear squad up by its bootstraps into a position of prominence in a tough league, the Southwest Conference.

He might have spoken slowly, but he moved fast. The Bears started that first season by claiming four quick victories in a row, including a startling upset over Arkansas. A powerful Texas team broke the string, and Baylor went on to a respectable five-five season. The following season Baylor enjoyed a 6-3-2 record, including a Delta Bowl victory (20-7) over Wake Forest, and then Woodruff really brought the Bears into prominence when he guided them to eight wins and two losses.

At Florida where he became Head Coach and Director of Athletics in 1950, Woodruff found many of the problems which had existed at Baylor. The Gators were an ideal "Homecoming Opponent" for others in the Southeastern Conference. In three seasons the Gators won 17, lost 13 and were victors in the Gator Bowl, defeating Tulsa, 14-13. This was the first Bowl invitation ever received by a Florida team in nearly 50 years of football. The Gators had come of age.

Another high point in Woodruff's coaching days at Florida came in 1954 when the Gators had a record of five wins and two defeats against Southeastern Conference opponents. This gave them a tie for third place in the league, highest ranking achieved by the Gators since formation of the SEC in 1933. Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have three sons, Scooty 13, Mark 4, and Joe, nearly one.

THE GATOR BAND

The University of Florida "Gator Band" is deemed one of the finest in America today. Its gridiron spectacles are an essential part of Gatorland football festivities, and its year-round musical activities are an important part of University community life.

Harold B. Bachman is the distinguished Director of the University of Florida Bands, including the 145 members of the Gator gridiron aggregation, and the five other band organizations which serve the University and the state.

Reid Poole, Assistant Director of Bands, plans and produces the football shows, and writes the special musical arrangements featured by the Band.

Earl Norman of Starke is the Head Drum Major who directs the Band on the field. Beverly Stalnaker is Head Majorette and featured baton twirler. Band personnel includes 104 men in the marching square of the Band, a baton twirling squad of 15, the Big Bass Drum crew of 3, and some 20 additional musicians who play in the stands and on occasion act as flag bearers, alternates, property men, etc. Delbert Sterrett is the announcer for the Band.

The Gator Band spends four 80-minute sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for the Saturday football shows.

Band members do not receive scholarships or other financial inducements. Representing every department of the University, the band membership is a true cross section of the student body.

Gator band field productions are primarily based on a solid musical foundation with good music as the guiding principle. Each halftime show usually includes one or more musical presentations featuring distinctive arrangements played while the band maneuvers into appropriate formations or tableaux. A distinctive characteristic is that many of the feature numbers are performed "in the round" so that the view and sound will be the same from both sides of the stadium.

The Gator Band basic uniform is two-toned blue trimmed in orange. Coats are of royal blue, trousers in a complementary French blue. The overall orange trim is high-lighted by an orange satin cape and topped off by the orange plume on the cap. The Drum Majors and Baton Twirling Squad will be dressed in new white uniforms trimmed in orange and blue.

LARGEST DRUM IN DIXIE

The Gator Band giant exhibition bass drum is one of the largest drums in the country. At the time it was made, a writer for the Chicago Sun-Times quoted its manufacturer as saying that it is "The World's Largest bass drum that will boom properly." The drum was especially made for the "Gator Band" by the WFL Drum Company of Chicago. The drum is 6 feet in diameter and 25½ inches in width.

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

Winner of the 1955 award, presented at last year's Homecoming game with Auburn, was Center Steve DeLaTorre, Florida's great center. The first award was made in 1955 to Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback for the '54 Gators.

Recipient for the 1957 award, to be presented October 19 at the Homecoming clash with Mississippi State, will be Larry Wesley, outstanding tackle with the '56 squad from Fernandina Beach.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 293 feet, 6½ inches, which won him a National AAU championship in 1942, is still the best throw ever made by a Florida athlete.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 41,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, Mississippi State, on Oct. 19.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-Mississippi State football game on October 19 will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UP TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.


"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT




In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the School of Inter-American Studies.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Class-room-Administration Building, the Gymnasium-Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, the College of Business Administration, a \$2,000,000 residence hall, Chemistry, Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, Stadium addition, Dan McCarty Hall, a \$1,300,000 agricultural building, Medical Sciences Building of J. Hillis Miller Health Center; Women's Residence units, west of Broward Hall; Men's Residence units, south of Flavel III; William Corey residence units for married students; Hubert Schucht residence units for married students; Physics Building; and continued construction on 420 bed teaching hospital for J. Hillis Miller Health Center; Nuclear Science laboratory for housing first atomic reactor; and other smaller buildings.

BOB WOODRUFF, HEAD COACH AND ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

BOB WOODRUFF

Athletic Director and Head Coach

Easy-mannered Bob Woodruff, native Georgian and graduate of the Bob Neyland School of Football, marches into his ninth season as guiding hand of the Fighting Gator football team.

Over the past eight seasons he has turned the one-time docile Gator into a formidable force which opponents know they must reckon with Saturday after Saturday each fall.

The rough-tough Southeastern Conference has found Florida often in the running for the championship and its members know they have a game on their hands when they now meet a team aptly known as "Fighting" Gators.

Last season's record of six wins, two defeats and a tie was the best, percentage-wise, of any Florida team since 1929. Over the eight-year span of Woodruff years, Florida has won 42, lost 34 and tied four.

Early Days

Born in Athens, Georgia, on March 14, 1916, Coach Woodruff's family soon moved to Cuthbert in that state, where they lived until he was 16 years old. He played on Cuthbert High's first football team, and then on moving to Savannah played three years for Savannah High School.

Those close to Coach Woodruff know him as a person who makes no hasty decisions, thinking things through to a careful conclusion. His teams are well disciplined and his associates are deeply loyal, a trait reflected from the coach himself.

Following his graduation from the University of Tennessee in 1939, when he received an engineering degree, Woodruff joined the Vols staff as assistant coach, a position he held during the 1939 and 1940 seasons.

Entering the Army in 1941, Woodruff rose to the rank of Major before being discharged in 1946. During that period of service, he was an assistant coach in 1944 and 1945 at West Point, helping Coach Earl (Red) Blaik guide the Black Knights of the Hudson to national collegiate gridiron championships.

The following season he was line coach at Georgia Tech, before becoming head coach at Baylor University in the spring of 1947.

A Head Coach

Never before in his college playing or coaching career had Woodruff been associated with anything but a nationally ranked team. When he arrived at Baylor he was confronted with the task—and this on his first head coaching assignment—of lifting a floundering Bear squad up by its bootstraps into a position of prominence in a tough league, the Southwest Conference.

He might have spoken slowly, but he moved fast. The Bears started that first season by claiming four quick victories in a row, including a startling upset over Arkansas. A powerful Texas team broke the string, and Baylor went on to a respectable five-five season. The following season Baylor enjoyed a 6-3-2 record, including a Delta Bowl victory (20-7) over Wake Forest, and then Woodruff really brought the Bears into prominence when he guided them to eight wins and two losses.

At Florida where he became Head Coach and Director of Athletics in 1950, Woodruff found many of the problems which had existed at Baylor. The Gators were an ideal "Homecoming Opponent" for others in the Southeastern Conference. In three seasons the Gators won 17, lost 13 and were victors in the Gator Bowl, defeating Tulsa, 14-13. This was the first Bowl invitation ever received by a Florida team in nearly 50 years of football. The Gators had come of age.

Another high point in Woodruff's coaching days at Florida came in 1954 when the Gators had a record of five wins and two defeats against Southeastern Conference opponents. This gave them a tie for third place in the league, highest ranking achieved by the Gators since formation of the SEC in 1933. The '56 eleven won six, lost three and tied one, also good for a third place finish in the SEC; the '57 squad finished in a tie for third with six wins, two losses and a tie, overall.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have three sons, Scooty, 14, Mark, 5, and Joe, nearly two.

CAPTAIN DON FLEMING



One of the outstanding defensive ends in the South, Don Fleming was slated to serve as co-captain of the 1958 Fighting Gators with teammate Bernie Parrish. However, on Parrish's signing of a professional football contract, Fleming takes over the full duty. A reserve end on the varsity last year, he weighed in at 247 lbs. and 156 pounds. He broke into the varsity lineup in 1956 and in 1957, seeing his third varsity football letter. He played 239 minutes during his sophomore year and 312 last season, winning an All-Southeastern Conference third team ranking for his efforts. Fleming is considered an excellent blocker and capable pass receiver. He caught three for 29 yards and a touchdown last year.



TACKLE LARRY WESLEY, voted most valuable senior for his outstanding play during the 1956 season, returned last year to receive the Fergie Ferguson Memorial Award from Professor Phil Constans, Chairman, Board of Directors, University Athletic Association.

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team.

Recipient for the 1958 presentation at the Homecoming game against Vanderbilt, Oct. 18, is to be All-Southeastern Conference Halfback Jim Rountree.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches, which won him a National AAU championship in 1942, is still the best throw ever made by a Florida athlete.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

THE GATOR BAND

The University of Florida "Gator Band" is deemed one of the finest in America today. Its gridiron spectacles are an essential part of Gatorland football festivities, and its year-round musical activities are an important part of University community life.

Harold B. Bachman, the distinguished Director of the University of Florida Bands during the past decade, retired as Band Director at the beginning of the school year.

Roid Poole, former Assistant Director of Bands, is Acting Director of the 130-piece Gator Marching Band, the University of Florida Symphonic Band, the combined Army and Air Force ROTC Band, and the Gator Variety Band. Mr. Poole plans and produces the gridiron shows and writes many of the special musical arrangements featured by the band.

Richard Dewey of Pompano Beach and Robert Gunn of Miami are the Drum Majors who direct the band on the field. Beverly Stalnaker is Director of the Baton Twirling Corps and feature solo baton twirler. Band personnel includes 104 musicians in the marching "square" of the band, a baton twirling corps of 16, 3 flag bearers, a bass drum crew of 3, and a number of extras and supernumeraries. Delbert Sterrett is the announcer for the band.

Elected student officers of the band are Student Manager, David Zickafoose of Trenton; Assistant Manager, Ray Wilcox of St. Petersburg; Secretary, Amelia Macy of Coral Gables; and Publicity Manager, Leslie Smith of Sanford.

The Gator Band spends four 80-minute sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for the Saturday football shows.

The Gator Band basic uniform is two-toned blue trimmed in orange. Coats are of royal blue, trousers in a complementary French blue. The overall orange trim is highlighted by an orange satin cape and topped off by the orange plume on the cap. The drum majors are attired in dazzling white uniforms, trimmed in orange and blue. The majorettes wear royal blue leotards with appropriate trimmings, white military boots to match the white shoes of the band, and military hats topped off with ostrich plumes.

THE BASS DRUM WITH THE BIGGEST BOOM IN DIXIE

The Gator Band giant exhibition bass drum is one of the largest drums in the country. At the time it was made, a writer for the Chicago Sun-Times quoted its manufacturer as saying that it is "The World's largest bass drum that will boom properly." The drum was especially made for the "Gator Band" by the WFL Drum Company of Chicago. The drum is 6 feet in diameter and 25½ inches in width.

FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 41,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, Vanderbilt, on Oct. 18.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-Vanderbilt football game on October 18 will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Toward the end of the 1957 football season there was a giant pep rally, called by some the biggest in history of the University of Florida. The occasion: A welcome to a new mascot, Albert the Alligator. Albert now resides in his private home near the Century Tower in the heart of the campus. He has a 22-foot pool enclosure. Vital statistics place Albert's age at 35 years, he is ten feet long, weighs 400 pounds, but consumes a mere ten pounds of meat per week. His value is placed at more than \$500.00 by Herpetologist Ross Allen of Silver Springs.



FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-69), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the School of Inter-American Studies.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Class-room-Administration Building, the Gymnasium-Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, the College of Business Administration, a \$2,000,000 residence hall, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force R.O.T.C. Building, Stadium addition, Dan McCarty Hall, a \$1,300,000 agricultural building, Medical Sciences Building of J. Hillis Miller Health Center; Women's Residence units, west of Broward Hall; Men's Residence units, south of Flavet III; William Corey residence units for married students; Hubert Schucht residence units for married students; Physics Building; and 420 bed teaching hospital for J. Hillis Miller Health Center; Nuclear Science laboratory for housing first atomic reactor; and other smaller buildings.

BOB WOODRUFF

Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach

"A hard core of dogged determination in a bundle of catm." That description by the Late Walter Stewart best describes gentlemanly Bob Woodruff, entering his 10th season as athletic director and head football coach at the University of Florida.

Woodruff, careful thinker and executor as befits an old Tennessee tackle of the Gen. Bob Neyland school and a graduate engineer, has distinguished at Florida in a dual capacity.

As a Football Coach

Before Coach Woodruff came to Florida in 1950, Gator football was at a low ebb. In the previous four seasons, Florida teams had won only 13 of 39 games and were usually in the Southeastern Conference lower division.

They became "The Fighting Gators" in every sense of the word under Coach Woodruff. In his first three seasons, he guided the Gators to a 17-13 record and a bid to meet Tulsa in the Gator Bowl, the first bowl invitation ever received by a Florida team in nearly 50 years of football.

Instead of being a conference doormat, per the pre-Woodruff days, the Gators have become a perennial first-division threat under the old Tennessee lineman.

His 18-8-3 record of the last three seasons climaxing in a second Gator Bowl bid after the 1958 season, is one of the best in the SEC over that span. For two straight seasons, his Gators have been nationally ranked among the top 20 teams.

His '58 team, also ranking among the top 10 teams in rushing defense, outplayed national champion Louisiana State, only to lose 10-7 on a field goal in the dying moments. The Gators lost another close one, 6-5, to second-ranked Auburn.

While compiling an overall record of 48-38-5 at Florida to bring his career head coaching record to 66-48-7, he produced three All-Americans in tackle Charley LaPrade, 1952, guard John Barrow, 1956, and tackle Vel Heckman, 1958. Under him, seven Gators have made All-SEC first teams, 10 on second teams and 13 on third teams.

His teams have impressed nationally for soundness in the fundamentals of blocking and tackling, a trait reflecting his background as a player and later a coach under Gen. Neyland and as an assistant to Col. Red Blaik at West Point. A man who thinks to a careful conclusion, Coach Woodruff is always identified with well-disciplined teams and deeply loyal associates.

As Athletic Director

Coach Woodruff's first recommendations to the Athletic Board on arriving at Florida in 1950 were:

- (1) Build a stadium addition at Florida Field.
- (2) Schedule Southeastern Conference games on a home-and-home basis except for playing the Georgia series in Jacksonville.

(3) Provide a football schedule for the students, alumni and general public that would stimulate sales of season tickets so that football gate receipts could pay for the stadium and provide the best possible all-around program in all sports.

His policies have paid off. The stadium addition, in fact, was completed in time for the Miami game in 1950. Florida Field's seating capacity has been increased from 22,500 to 44,000. Space under the stadium addition was also provided for 60,000 square feet of housing for athletic offices, radio station WRUF, the School of Journalism, University Press and the University television studios.

Football gate receipts have more than doubled during his tenure. Season ticket sales have increased every year, another tribute to improved scheduling. More big games have been brought to Florida Field than ever before in Gator history.

A new modern pressbox, seating 240, has been built during the Woodruff regime. Its superb facilities won the University the Football Writers Association of America award in 1955 and 1957, making Florida one of the few schools to twice win the honor.

The baseball field has been relocated to a handy location between Florida Field and the new track. A new quarter-mile, asphalt-type running track has been built. The idea of Florida track coach Percy Beard, the track has been acclaimed by track coaches over the nation.

New varsity tennis courts were constructed. A modern field-house is now available for spring sports. A new type Tifton 57 Turf for all athletic fields was pioneered at Florida in 1950 and now is used by most Southeastern Conference schools.

During the Woodruff regime, the University Athletic Association has allocated over \$180,000 in scholarships for non-athletes and \$21,000 for completion of the Alumni Tower.

The soundness of his all-around program is illustrated by three Gators making All-American teams in three sports during the last school year: Vel Heckman in football, Tommy Aaron in golf, and Perry McGriff in baseball.

Truly, his policy of "any sport worth having is worth supporting" has been well carried out. In all sports, the Gators boast the best all-around won-lost record in the SEC during the nine years under Athletic Director Woodruff.

Born in Athens, Ga., March 14, 1916, Coach Woodruff moved with his family to a farm near Cuthbert in that state in 1918. He played on Cuthbert High's first football team before moving to Savannah where he played three years for Savannah High.

He was a standout tackle for the University of Tennessee in 1936-37-38 on teams that won 23 games and lost only five. After receiving his engineering degree, he remained on the Tennessee staff as an assistant to Gen. Neyland in 1939 and 1940.

Entering the Army in 1941, he was discharged as a major in 1946. During that period of service, he was an assistant coach in 1944 and 1945 at West Point where he helped Coach Red Blaik guide the Cadets to a pair of national collegiate championships.

In 1946, he was a line coach at Georgia Tech. A year later, he became head coach at Baylor.

When he arrived at Baylor, he was confronted with the terrific task of lifting a second division Bear squad into a position of prominence in the tough Southwest Conference.

He moved fast. His first squad claimed four quick victories in a row, including an upset triumph over Arkansas. A powerful Texas team broke the string, but the Bears went on to a respectable 5-6 season.

The following season, Baylor posted an excellent 6-3-2 record, including a Delta Bowl victory (20-7) over Wake Forest. A year later, in 1949, he really boomed into the national spotlight as his Baylor team hit the "Top Ten" with an 8-2 record.

At Florida where he became head coach and athletic director in 1950, he found many of the problems that existed at Baylor. The Gators were an ideal "homecoming opponent" for others in the Southeastern Conference.

All of this changed as the Gators became one of the most respected teams in the conference during his first three years. They tied for third in the SEC in 1954 with a fine 5-2 record against a rugged field, marking the highest ranking gained by the Gators since formation of the Conference in 1933.

His Gator team was overall 6-3-1, also good for a third-place SEC finish. The Gators again finished in a tie for third in 1957 with a 6-2-1 record, overall.

Coach and Mrs. Woodruff (Margaret) have three sons: Scooty, 15, Mark, 6, and Joe, nearly three.



FLORIDA'S BOWL RECORD NOW EVEN

Florida's loss to the University of Mississippi, 7-3, in last year's Gator Bowl game evened Florida's bowl record at one win and one loss. The first time Florida went to a bowl game was in 1952, when Bob Woodruff's charges edged Tulsa, 14-13, in the Gator Bowl.

Last year's Gator Bowl game was a thriller. The punting of Florida halfback Bobby Joe Green was the game's highlight. Green's 76-yard quick-kick in the fourth quarter set a new Gator Bowl punting record. He also boomed a 54-yarder earlier in the game. Mississippi scored in the first quarter, as did Florida on Billy Booker's 17-yard field goal. The rest of the game saw the Rebels fight off repeated Florida threats. A 58-yard kickoff return by Jimmy Dunn was the game's offensive highlight.



CAPTAIN DAVE HUDSON

The University of Florida's 1959 captain is Dave Hudson, a 6-1, 225-pound senior from Pensacola. Picked on the All-SEC's third team last year, Hudson is given a good chance to make All-American honors this year.

Hudson came to the University of Florida after he made high school All-American at Pensacola. He wasted no time in showing everyone that he was as good as his reputation said he was. As a sophomore, Dave played on the Blue unit (second team) and caught four passes for 40 yards. His junior year last season, Dave really came into his own. The crew-cut blonde caught 11 passes for 150 yards (team high) and was a terror on defense. He scored two touchdowns and was a dependable performer all season.

He had three great games last year, against Vanderbilt, Florida State and Mississippi in the Gator Bowl. Dave caught a five-yard pass from Jimmy Dunn in the last seven seconds to give Florida a 6-6 tie with Vandy. Against FSU, he blocked a Seminole punt and picked up the ball for Florida's first score. He later intercepted a pass which led to Florida's second touchdown and an eventual 21-7 victory. In front of a Nationwide TV audience, Dave's crashing play against Mississippi in the Gator Bowl put him in the early running for 1959 All-American honors.

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.



First to win the award was Malcolm Ham-mack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, and Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback.

Recipient for the 1959 presentation at the Homecoming game against LSU, October 24, is to be Quarterback Jimmy Dunn.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Pimbo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 293 feet, 6 1/4 inches, which won him a National AAU championship in 1942, is still the best throw ever made by a Florida athlete.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 44,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, National Champs, LSU, Oct. 24.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has

become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pop rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-LSU football game on October 24 will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UP TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Band personnel includes a total of some 145 people: 104 musicians in the marching "square" of the band; the Gatorettes, a baton twirling corps of 16; 3 flag bearers; a bass drum crew of 3; and some 20 field assistants and alternates.

The Gator Band spends four 80-minute sessions each week in musical rehearsals and outdoor drills getting ready for the Saturday football shows.

The Gator Band basic uniform is two-toned blue trimmed in orange. Coats are of royal blue, trousers in a complementary French blue. The overall orange trim is highlighted by an orange satin cape and topped off by the orange plume on the cap. The drum majors are attired in dazzling white uniforms, trimmed in orange and blue. The Gatorettes wear dazzling sequined leotards with appropriate trimmings, white military boots to match the white shoes of the band, and military hats topped off with ostrich plumes.

THE BASS DRUM WITH THE BIGGEST BOOM IN DIXIE

The Gator Band giant exhibition bass drum is one of the largest drums in the country. At the time it was made, a writer for the Chicago Sun-Times quoted its manufacturer as saying that it is "The World's largest bass drum that will boom properly." The drum was especially made for the "Gator Band" by the WFL Drum Company of Chicago. The drum is 6 feet in diameter and 25½ inches in width.

GATOR FOOTBALL BOOSTERS, Inc.



Col. Everett M. Yon (U.S.A., Ret.), administrative assistant to the director of athletics, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University.

The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization.

Born in Blountstown, Fla., Col. Yon has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-elect of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army.

In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929.

Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville.

He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands.

Col. and Mrs. Yon are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev., Jr., is now with the Army in Germany after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1959 graduate of the University of Florida, is stationed with the regular Army at Ft. Bragg.

The two efficient secretaries in Col. Yon's office are Miss Mary Parker McCraw and Mrs. Mary Martin.

EQUIPMENT MANAGER SARGE BANISTER



Sarge Banister was born in Belton, South Carolina, and attended high school at Belton. Sarge spent 21 years in the Army, of which 14 were spent with the University of Florida ROTC program. Retiring from the Army in 1949, Sarge became equipment manager that same year. He has the tremendous task of assigning uniforms and making sure that Gator football players have the best equipment available and keeping the equipment in top-notch condition. He



FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).


COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: University, Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the School of Inter-American Studies.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Important buildings completed since World War II include the Classroom-Administration Building, the Gymnasium-Auditorium, two units of the Engineering and Industries Building, the Student Service Center, eight dormitories, additions to the Law Building, the College of Business Administration, a \$2,000,000 residence hall, Chemistry-Pharmacy Building, Cafeteria, Infirmary, Hydraulics Laboratory, Library, Heating Plant, Army and Air Force ROTC Building, Stadium addition, Dan McCarty Hall, a \$1,300,000 agricultural building, Medical Sciences Building of J. Hillis Miller Health Center; Women's Residence units, west of Broward Hall; Men's Residence units south of Flavet III; William Corey residence units for married students; Hubert Schucht residence units for married students; Physics Building; and 420 bed teaching hospital for J. Hillis Miller Health Center; Nuclear Science laboratory for housing first atomic reactor; and other smaller buildings. Additional housing for 1,300 students will be completed for fall term 1961.



RAY GRAVES

Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach

Those who have followed Ray Graves through his career in football knew it was inevitable that he would be summoned as head coach of a major college team. They applauded President J. Wayne Reitz for his choice of Graves as the man to head not only the fortunes of the Fighting Gators on the gridiron but the progressive program underway in all athletics at the University. The call to Florida came in January, 1960.

He came well qualified for the work. Graves was a star player (a center) in high school, college and in professional football. He claimed the respect and admiration of his fellow players by being named captain of every team from high school to professional ranks on which he played at least one year.

Graves was a successful assistant coach. He has the unusual record of having seen 13 players who were directly in his charge become All Americans. One of these was at Tennessee and 12 were at Georgia Tech.

His bowl record as a player and coach is probably unmatched by anyone in the country over a comparable period of time. As a player at the University of Tennessee in 1939, 1940 and 1941, he took part in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl games. As a coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and the Cotton and Rose Bowl once each.

Born in Knoxville, Tenn. on December 31, 1918, Ray Graves was graduated from Knoxville Central High in 1937. After a year at Tennessee Wesleyan Junior College, he entered the University of Tennessee and played basketball and football with the Vols. He was captain of the Vols' 1941 football team.

After receiving his AB degree in 1942, he played with the Philadelphia Eagles professional football team. Following two years of professional ball (the second year of which he was team captain), Graves returned to Tennessee in 1944 for a two-year stay as line coach. He rejoined the Eagles as a coach and scout in 1946 and then was appointed as an assistant coach to Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech.

From the day he joined the Georgia Tech staff in 1947, Graves' position continued to grow in importance. In two platoon days of collegiate football, he was defensive coach. Dodd early recognized his promising ability in other areas and steadily increased his duties to the point where he was in charge of both the offense and defense of the mighty Yellow Jackets. Bobby Dodd paid him the ultimate compliment available to an assistant by naming him "Assistant Head Coach" in 1957.

The Man

University of Florida President J. Wayne Reitz, summed up the feeling of many about Ray Graves, when he said on announcing his



FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.



First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, and Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback. Recipient of the 1960 award is Asa Cox, senior guard last year. The presentation will be made at Homecoming, Nov. 12, when the Gators play Tulane.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches, which won him a National AAU championship in 1942, is still the best throw ever made by a Florida athlete.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.



"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

GATOR FOOTBALL BOOSTERS, Inc.



Col. Everett M. Von (U.S.A., Ret.), Director of Public Relations for the Athletic Association, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University.

The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization.

Born in Blountstown, Fla., Col. Von has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-coach of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army.

In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929.

Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville.


He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands.

Col. and Mrs. Von are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev., Jr., is now with the Army in Germany after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1950 graduate of the University of Florida, is also in the regular Army.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents; Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the Graduate School of Inter-American Studies.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 13,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 85 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 17 million dollar facility.

RAY GRAVES

Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach

In just one year Ray Graves has led the Florida Gators to their finest record in history (nine victories and two defeats); guided the Gators to their highest ranking in the Southeastern Conference (one-half game out of first place); sent them to a bowl game (13-12 victory over Baylor in the Gator Bowl); and saw his players lavished with honors.

Coach Graves himself was highly recognized for the work he did. He was named Coach of the Year in the Southeastern Conference, and was the District nominee for Coach of the Year in the nation. The Orlando Sentinel paid him praise by naming him Man of the Year in Florida.

Success is an old companion of the Florida head football coach and Director of Athletics.

Graves was a star player (a center) in high school, college and in professional football. He claimed the respect and admiration of his fellow players by being named captain of every team from high school to professional ranks on which he played at least one year.

Graves was a successful assistant coach. He has the unusual record of having seen 13 players who were directly in his charge become All Americans. One of these was at Tennessee and 12 were at Georgia Tech.

His bowl record as a player and coach is probably unmatched by anyone in the country over a comparable period of time. As a player at the University of Tennessee in 1939, 1940 and 1941, he took part in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl games. As a coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and the Cotton and Rose Bowl once each. Now add the Gator Bowl at Florida.

Born in Knoxville, Tenn., on December 31, 1918, Ray Graves was graduated from Knoxville Central High in 1937. After a year at Tennessee Wesleyan Junior College, he entered the University of Tennessee and played basketball and football with the Vols. He was captain of the Vols' 1941 football team.

After receiving his AB degree in 1942, he played with the Philadelphia Eagles professional football team. Following two years of professional ball (the second year of which he was team captain), Graves returned to Tennessee in 1944 for a two-year stay as line coach. He rejoined the Eagles as a coach and scout in 1946 and then was appointed as an assistant coach to Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech.

From the day he joined the Georgia Tech staff in 1947, Graves' position continued to grow in importance. In two platoon days of collegiate football, he was defensive coach. Dodd early recognized his promising ability in other arenas and steadily increased his duties to the point where he was in charge of both the offense and defense of the mighty Yellow Jackets. Bobby Dodd paid him the ultimate



FLORIDA HOMECOMING



All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 44,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, Louisiana State, Oct. 28.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has

become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidights.

Almost everyone who comes to a Florida Homecoming finds himself torn between more desires than a kid at Coney Island. There is something going on every minute and all too often, for the visitors, colorful events overlap to make the choices more than a little difficult.

Sports editors and writers assigned to cover the Florida-L. S. U. football game on Oct. 28 will be primarily interested in the football game, but those who want to be in on the unforgettable side-show attraction will be one of that huge, happy, fun-loving crowd of folks at Florida Field Stadium Friday night for Gator Growl, a brilliant evening's entertainment in anybody's book.

FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The Florida Field Press Box consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) Photo Darkroom and Western Union, (2) Radio and Photographers, (3) Press and (4) Photo. Here they are in detail:

PRESS DECK: There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable, swivel chair that is bolted to the floor. Every seat has perfect vision—there are no uprights between any seat and the field and people walking along the front row are below the vision of folks on the back row. There are no windows on the press deck. A public address system operated exclusively for the press box gives all official information, including statistics on individual plays.

RADIO DECK: There are five ample-sized, acoustically tiled radio booths with glass windows that may be opened or closed, depending upon the desire of each announcer. The front row of each radio booth will seat four people very comfortably and five in a slight pinch. The back row seats three and is adapted for engineering equipment. Each radio booth may receive the press box PA announcements via headphones. There are two other booths, one for visiting coaches and one for the stadium public address system. Flanking the radio booths are large open-front decks for use by still, movie or television photographers. There are toilet facilities on the radio deck.

PHOTOGRAPHY DECK: This is a large open-front area at the very top of the press box. It has ample table space both in front of the cameraman and behind him. This deck also includes the Florida coaches booth and the stadium manager's booth.

WESTERN UNION and PHOTO DARKROOM DECK: This is the first floor of the press box and the first elevator stop coming up from ground level. The entire Western Union operation is carried out in a large room that provides every needed facility for transmitting copy. Messages are sent by pneumatic chute from the press deck to the Western Union room. This, of course, eliminates the necessity of having bulky and noisy page printers in the actual working press section. (When you have a message ready for sending, you merely hold it over your head, yell "Copy Boy" and one swoops down on it.)

This deck also includes newly added photographic darkrooms for photographers who wish to process film at the stadium and telephoto room from which they may send pictures to the papers. While the places to do this work are a part of the press box, we are unable to furnish such equipment as enlargers, wire-photo sending sets, etc. Portable units must be brought by the cameramen.





The band personnel includes about 145 students—104 players in the "marching square" of the band; the All-Star Twirling Corps; the Ga orettes; the herald trumpets; flag bearers; bass drum crew; and a number of field assistants and alternates.

"GATORS"

(From THE FLORIDA TIMES-UNION (Jacksonville), Thursday, August 13, 1948.)

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

GATOR FOOTBALL BOOSTERS, Inc.



Col. Everett M. Yon (U.S.A., Ret.), Director of Public Relations for the Athletic Association, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University.

The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization.

Born in Blountstown, Fla., Col. Yon has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-elect of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army.

In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929.

Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville.

He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands.

Col. and Mrs. Yon are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev., Jr., is now with the Army in Germany after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1959 graduate of the University of Florida, is also in the regular Army.



FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 160 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1906, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1906-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphy (1909-22), Dr. John J. Tigert (1922-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-63), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1965-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the Graduate School of Inter-American Studies.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 13,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 85 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 17 million dollar facility.

RAY GRAVES

Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach
University of Florida

A contagious enthusiasm is one of the remarkable traits of Ray Graves, Head Coach and Director of Athletics at the University of Florida. His first Florida team—that spirited 1900 aggregation which compiled Florida's finest record in history by winning nine and losing two—found it so.

Graves' second group must have found it even more so. Despite heavy losses in the ranks through graduation and academics, and though this undermanned Gator team fell off the winning pace with a 4-5-1 record, it played the same aggressive, determined type of football.

Looking back on his two years at Florida, Coach Graves can remember these accomplishments with pleasure:

A record of 13 victories, 7 losses and 1 tie; "Coach of the Year" in the Southeastern Conference in 1960; District nominee for "Coach of the Year" honors in the nation in 1960; "Man of the Year" in Florida as named by the Orlando Sentinel in 1960; and, Coach of the Gator Bowl champions over Baylor (13-12) that same year.

Graves at the age of 43 is an energetic man-on-the-move, constantly traveling about the State and nation in the "off" season, delivering speeches, meeting alumni, conducting coaching clinics, meeting the press, and making public appearances wherever an audience might be interested in Florida's Football program.

EARLIER DAYS

Graves was a star player (a center) in high school, college and in professional football. He claimed the respect and admiration of his fellow players by being named captain of every team from high school to professional ranks on which he played at least one year.

Graves was a successful assistant coach. He has the unusual record of having seen 13 players who were directly in his charge become All Americans. One of these was at Tennessee and 12 were at Georgia Tech.

His bowl record as player and coach is probably unmatched by anyone in the country over a comparable period of time. As a player at the University of Tennessee in 1939, 1940 and 1941, he took part in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl games. As a coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and the Cotton and Rose Bowls once each. Now add the Gator Bowl as a head coach.

Born in Knoxville, Tenn., on December 31, 1918, Ray Graves was graduated from Knoxville Central high in 1937. After a year at Tennessee Wesleyan Junior College, he entered the University of Tennessee and played basketball and football with the Vols. He was captain of the Vols' 1941 football team.

After receiving his AB degree in 1942, he played with the Philadelphia Eagles professional football team. Following two years of professional ball (the second year of which he was team captain), Graves returned to Tennessee in 1944 for a two-year stay as line coach. He rejoined the Eagles as a coach and scout in 1946 and then was appointed as an assistant coach to Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech.

From the day he joined the Georgia Tech staff in 1947, Graves' position continued to grow in importance. In two platoon days of collegiate football, he was defensive coach. Dodd early recognized his promising ability in other areas and steadily increased his duties to the point where he was in charge of both the offense and defense of the mighty Yellow Jackets. Bobby Dodd paid him the ultimate compliment available to an assistant by naming him "Assistant Head Coach" in 1957.

THE MAN

He is a man who loves the out-of-doors. Happiest perhaps directing strategy of his team on the football field, he nevertheless finds the fish a genial adversary. He's also quick to accept a challenge to a tennis match.

Ray married the former Opal Richardson of Tazewell, Tenn., on November 8, 1942, and they are the parents of three lovely daughters, Rebecca Ann, 18, Katherine Gibbs, 15, and Elizabeth Greer, 12.

Left Halfback **RICHARD SKELLY** . . . 207 pound junior left halfback from Jacksonville. One of the hardest runners ever to play for the University of Florida. Offensive Backfield Coach Pepper Rodgers said, "Skelly has the ability to be one of the finest backs in the country this season."

Quarterback **LARRY LIBERTORE** . . . Only 138 pounds, but he's been one of the top signal callers in the SEC over the past two years. Guard **LARRY TRAVIS** . . . Senior who has been a steady performer through two years of varsity play. Outstanding offensive lineman and a tough defensive performer.

Tackle **FRANK LASKY** . . . A junior college graduate of North-east Oklahoma . . . 250 pounder . . . Surprising quickness for a person his size. Frank has the ability and potential to be one of Florida's truly great linemen.

Tackle **GERALD ODOM** . . . Spirited player with plenty of ability and desire. Could be one of the better linemen on the Florida team this year.



FLORIDA HOMECOMING

All year long the people of Florida talk about Homecoming at the University of Florida. Homecoming means two days of continuous activity, highlighted by the double-feature attractions—Friday night's Gator Growl and the Saturday afternoon football game. Both draw capacity crowds of 44,000.

The game this year is with a fellow member of the Southeastern Conference, Vanderbilt, October 20.

Among other outstanding events are a parade of giant proportions, banquets, swim shows, alumni reunions, fraternity and sorority doings, and a Legislative Barbecue.

Back in 1906 the students decided to stage a "Dad's Day." Homecoming was the natural outgrowth of "Dad's Day" and in late years it has become almost traditional for each one to surpass the last one.

Gator Growl, an all-student variety extravaganza that draws a packed house to Florida Field Stadium on the eve of the football game, came into the picture back in 1924. About 7,000 Dads and Grads gathered in the old gymnasium the night before the game to drum up the necessary enthusiasm to help the Gators defeat Drake University the next day, 10 to 0.

From that spontaneous gathering in 1924 has grown what is very likely the largest, most colorful and noisiest pep rally on the college sports scene today. A student committee of Florida Blue Key works a year ahead to set the theme. Fraternities and sororities plan their parts months in advance and spend months preparing interior and exterior house decorations, parade floats and skits for Gator Growl. No admission is charged for Gator Growl or other sidelights.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.



First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, and Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960. This year the award goes to Jim Beaver. The presentation will be made at Homecoming, October 20.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

Col. Everett M. Yon (U.S.A., Ret.), Director of Public Relations for the Athletic Association, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University.

The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization.

Born in Blountstown, Fla., Col. Yon has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-elect of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army.

In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929.

Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville.

He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands.

Col. and Mrs. Yon are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev, Jr., is now with the Army in Germany after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1959 graduate of the University of Florida, is also in the regular Army.

Col. Yon's two personable secretaries in the office are Mrs. Margaret Melton and Mrs. A. M. Henry.

Mrs. Melton has been in the Gator Boosters office since 1959. She is married to Mr. Charlton Melton, and the couple has four daughters—Marilyn, Betty, Virginia and Gene.

Mrs. Henry is the parent of three daughters—Linda, Jane and Ann Merrill. Mrs. Henry has been with the Gator Boosters since 1960.

RAY GRAVES

Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach

Ray Graves, an enthusiastic, energetic recruiter, speaker and head football coach, has in the brief span of three years pumped new life into the football and overall athletic situation at the University of Florida.

In three seasons he has compiled an outstanding 20-11-1 record against top SEC powers plus rugged independent competition.

He has fielded two bowl teams, both winners in the Gator Bowl.

His 1960 team compiled the finest record in Florida football history (9-2), best SEC record (5-1) and captured a 13-12 thriller from Baylor in the Gator Bowl.

For this he was named SEC "Coach of the Year" and "Man of the Year" in Florida by the Orlando Sentinel.

Graves came to Florida from Georgia Tech, where he was an assistant coach from 1947-1957, and assistant head coach from 1957-1960.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 13 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar, and Rose Bowl respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each. Now he has added two Gator Bowl appearances as head coach.

His record as head coach or assistant on nationally televised games is 13-1, tops in the nation.

Graves, an avid fisherman and tennis player, was born in Knox-

ville, Tenn., Dec. 31, 1918. He graduated from Knoxville Central HS in 1937, attended Tennessee Wesleyan Junior College for a year and then entered Tennessee.

He played basketball and football for the Vols and was captain of the 1941 Tennessee football team. He graduated in 1942 and played two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles prior to starting his coaching career.

Graves married the former Opal Richardson of Tazewell, Tenn., Nov. 3, 1942 and they have three lovely daughters—Rebecca Ann (Becky) 19, Katherine Gibbs (Kathy) 16 and Elizabeth Greer (Beth) 13.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications, and the Graduate School of Inter-American Studies.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 13,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 85 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 17 million dollar facility.



FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.



First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Ana Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960 and Jim Beaver in 1961. This year's award goes to end Sam Holland.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson. These two Jacksonville residents donated the original Ferguson trophy, which is displayed at all times in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics trophy case.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'"

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator.' After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

GATOR FOOTBALL BOOSTERS, Inc.



Col. Everett M. Yon (U.S.A., Ret.), Director of Public Relations for the Athletic Association, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University. The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization. Born in Blountstown, Fla., Col. Yon has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-elect of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army. In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929. Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville. He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands. Col. and Mrs. Yon are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev., Jr., is now with the Army in Germany after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1959 graduate of the University of Florida, is also in the regular Army.

Assisting Boggs is Ted Covington, Lakeland insurance man and former radio station owner. Pierre Bejano, assistant director of the University Station, WRUF, is producer for the ten-game broadcasts which are also fed to the Southeast on the "Pick of Dixie" Network.



RAY GRAVES

Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach

Ray Graves, an enthusiastic, energetic recruiter, speaker and head football coach, has in the brief span of four years pumped new life into the football and overall athletic situation at the University of Florida.

In four seasons he has compiled an outstanding 26-14-2 record against top SEC powers plus rugged independent competition. Graves has Florida's best four-year SEC mark in history, 15-9-1.

He has fielded two bowl teams, both winners in the Gator Bowl.

His 1960 team compiled the finest record in Florida football history (9-2), best SEC record (5-1) and captured a 13-12 thriller from Baylor in the Gator Bowl.

For this he was named SEC "Coach of the Year" and "Man of the Year" in Florida by the Orlando Sentinel.

Graves came to Florida from Georgia Tech, where he was an assistant coach from 1947-1957, and assistant head coach from 1957-1960.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 13 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar, and Rose Bowl respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each. Now he has added two Gator Bowl appearances as head coach.

His record as head coach or assistant on nationally televised games is 13-2, tops in the nation.

Graves, an avid fisherman and tennis player, was born in Knox-

ville, Tenn., Dec. 31, 1918. He graduated from Knoxville Central HS in 1937, attended Tennessee Wesleyan Junior College for a year and then entered Tennessee.

He played basketball and football for the Vols and was captain of the 1941 Tennessee football team. He graduated in 1942 and played two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles prior to starting his coaching career.

Graves married the former Opal Richardson of Tazewell, Tenn., Nov. 3, 1942 and they have three lovely daughters--Rebecca Ann (Mrs. Allan Holt), 20, Katherine Gibbs (Kathy) 17 and Elizabeth Greer (Beth) 14.

FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT



In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-23), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 16,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 100 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 20 million dollar facility.

"GATORS"

(From THE FLORIDA TIMES-UNION (Jacksonville), Thursday, August 11, 1933.)

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.



First to win the award was Malcolm Hamrick, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Aaa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, and Sam Holland in 1962.

Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke are co-winners this year.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Plombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards—against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 5½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

GATOR FOOTBALL BOOSTERS, Inc.



Col. Everett M. Von (U.S.A., Ret.), Director of Public Relations for the Athletic Association, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University. The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization. Born in Mountstown, Fla., Col. Von has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-elect of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army. In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929. Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville. He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands. Col. and Mrs. Von are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev., Jr., is now with the Army in Germany after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1959 graduate of the University of Florida, is also in the regular Army.

FLORIDA FOOTBALL NETWORK

The voice of the Fighting Gators, Otis Boggs, once again will bring to the listeners of more than fifty Florida stations the exciting play-by-play description of the Florida Football Gators. Otis, who was named the State's outstanding sportscaster in 1960, 1961 and 1962, has been at the microphone for the Gators for more than fifteen years. Assisting Boggs is Ted Covington, Lakeland insurance man and former radio station owner. Bob Leach, assistant director of the University Station, WRUF, is producer for the ten-game broadcasts which are also fed to the Southeast on the "Pick of Dixie" Network.





Meet Ray Graves

Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

(1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves' take-



over in 1960. Graves has fielded five Gator teams with four winding up in the first division.

(2) Florida's two highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and tied for second in 1964 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.

(3) Graves has compiled the best five-year record in Florida history with a 33-17-2 mark.

(4) Florida owns only three wins in history over teams which finished in the nation's top ten, all three under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964).

(5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's three best records have been 8-3 (1952), 9-2 (1960) and 7-3 (1964), the latter two by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves' first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gators, competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 69 percent. In 1964-65 Florida won the all-sports crown in the SEC.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-60.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 13 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar, and Rose Bowl respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each. Now he has added two Gator Bowl appearances as head coach.

His record as head coach or assistant on nationally televised games is 13-2, tops in the nation.

He is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazewell, Tenn. and they have three lovely daughters, Becky, 21, Kathy, 18, and Beth, 15.

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equi-distant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-23), Dr. John J. Tigert (1923-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville.

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 16,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 100 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 20 million dollar facility.



PERCY BEARD

Assistant Director of Athletics

Percy Beard resumed the post of Assistant Director of Athletics in 1960, after holding this same position from 1940-45. He is also Business Manager of Athletics, General Manager of the University Athletic Association, and was Head Track Coach at Florida from 1936-1964, during which time his squads compiled one of the nation's best records. He was recently inducted into the National Track Hall of Fame by the Helms Foundation. He has coached on the United States team for the Pan-American Games and is a member of the Olympic Track and Field Committee. He is also widely known for inventing the asphalt track now used the nation over. Beard was an outstanding track star at Auburn University, from which he graduated in 1929. At one time, he held the world record in the 110-meter high hurdles, 120-yard high hurdles, the 70-yard indoor and the 65-meter indoor high hurdles. His brother, Jeff, is Athletic Director at Auburn. Beard is married to the former Sara Ratcliffe of Monroeville, Ala. and they have three children: Percy M., Jr. (28), David (25) and Thomas (16).

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, and Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963. This year's winner is All-America halfback Larry Dupree.

Idea for the Award was conceived by John Piombo, teammate and friend of Ferguson, and Dick Stratton, former Florida athlete and admirer of Ferguson.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—663 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

Gator Football Boosters, Inc.



Col. Everett M. Yon (U.S.A., Ret.), Director of Public Relations for the Athletic Association, is also director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University. The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization. Born in Blountstown, Fla., Col. Yon has devoted most of his life to University of Florida athletics. He was a first-string guard on the Gator football teams of 1914 and 1915 and a regular outfielder on the 1915 and 1916 baseball teams. He was captain-elect of the 1917 baseball team, but went into the Army. In 1923-24, the Colonel was line coach at Florida under Gen. James A. Van Fleet. He served as director of athletics from 1926 through 1929. Soon after the outbreak of World War II, he was promoted to Colonel and assumed command of the 25th Infantry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. He accompanied this regiment to Guadalcanal early in 1944 and later saw action on Bougainville. He commanded the 63rd Infantry of the Sixth Division during the invasion of the Philippine Islands. Col. and Mrs. Yon are parents of two sons. The elder son, Ev, Jr., is now with the Army after graduating from West Point in 1957. The younger son, Frank, a 1959 graduate of the University of Florida, is also in the regular Army.

Florida Football Network

The voice of the Fighting Gators, Otis Boggs, once again will bring to the listeners of more than fifty Florida stations the exciting play-by-play description of the Florida Football Gators. Otis, who was named the State's outstanding sportscaster in 1960, 1961 and 1962, has been at the microphone for the Gators for more than fifteen years. Assisting Boggs is Ted Covington, Lakeland insurance man and former radio station owner. Bob Leach, assistant director of the University Station, WRUF, is producer for the ten-game broadcasts which are also fed to the Southeast on the "Pick of Dixie" Network.







Facts About The University

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville.

There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-26), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Health Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate, Journalism and Communications.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 18,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 100 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 20 million dollar facility.

Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

(1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves takeover in 1950. Graves has fielded six Gator teams with five winding up in the first division.

(2) Florida's two highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and tied for second in 1961 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.

(3) Graves has compiled the best six-year record in Florida history, a 40-21-2 mark.

(4) Florida owns only four wins in history over team which finished in the nation's top ten, all four under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964 and 1965).

(5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's three best records have been 8-3 (1952), 9-2 (1960) and 7-3 (1964), the latter two by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves' first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history.

(7) Florida's only appearance in a bowl game outside the state came under Graves, the 1966 Sugar Bowl.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gators, competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 69 percent, winning the SEC all-sports crown the past three years.

Graves is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-60.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 13 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar, and Rose Bowl, respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each.

He is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and they have three lovely daughters, Becky, 22, Kathy, 19, and Beth, 16.



Typical Room In New Dormitory


Completed in time for the September 17 opener against Northwestern will be new East Stands at Florida Field. Seating capacity of the stadium will then be 56,000, an increase of 8,200 over last season.



ATHLETICS AND ACADEMIC

University of Florida football is conducted within the academic framework, as an integral part of the overall composition of this institution.

Florida Athletic Director Ray Graves encourages, in fact demands, that his football players use their scholastic ability to the fullest.

In this regard, close track is kept on athletes' classroom efforts. Tutors are provided for those who wish, and for all who fall behind in their studies.

This method has paid off. Florida athletes have consistently maintained a higher overall average than the student body.

Heading up the tutoring and guidance program is Dr. Edmund S. Holden, whose brief biography follows.

DR. EDMUND S. HOLDEN

Academic Counselor



Dr. Edmund S. Holden is considered one of the most important men in the Florida Athletic Department. Dr. Holden is Florida's academic advisor to athletes on scholarship and has the job of advising athletes on a course of study and helps them work out a balanced schedule of class hours.

He also has complete charge of the athletic tutoring program and keeps up with the progress of the athletes throughout the school year.

Dr. Holden was born in Chicago, Ill., in 1920 and attended Schurz High School and Northwestern University. His studies at Northwestern were interrupted with a five-year hitch in the Air Force (1942-1946), but he graduated with a Ph.D. from Northwestern in 1952.

He came to Florida in 1957 and joined the faculty as an assistant professor of English. He took over the job of Athletic Counselor in 1958 and is still in the English Department.

Florida's 1966 football squad has a variety of academic interests, as proven by the following list of scholastic majors and the number of varsity gridgers pursuing them: Law (3), Pre-Medicine (11), Business Administration (17), Industrial Management (3), Art, Drama or Speech (4), Education (4), Physical Education and Health (23), Engineering (13), Liberal Arts (1), Agriculture (3), Sociology (1) and Journalism (1) . . . Gator gridder Steve Spurrier, a 1965 All-America quarterback, was a great all-around athlete in Johnson City, Tennessee while in high school. Steve, all-state in football, basketball and baseball, is a 70-shooter in golf who admits to being addicted to the sport . . . Two Gators still hold national records Bobby Joe Green (1939) punted 54 times for an average of 44.9 and Joe Brodsky (1956), intercepted five passes and returned them 244 yards for two TDs. Green is currently a punter with the Chicago Bears and Brodsky is head football coach at Miami Jackson High School . . . Gator quarterback Spurrier, incidentally, goes steady with Alpha Delta Pi Jerri Starr, the niece of recently retired Penn State head football coach Rip Engle.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.'

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gators' most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.




First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1934 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1935 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1936 team, Jim Rountree, 1937 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1938 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1939 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964 and Charles Carey in 1965.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1964. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6 1/4 inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

Facts About The University

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant—60 miles—from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Independent Institute, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been five presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), and Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Health, Related Service, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Health, and University College. Schools are: Forestry, Graduate.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is the largest land-grant institution in the South with a faculty of 2,000 and a student body of more than 19,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 100 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications, and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in Medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's newest and finest facility at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy and Health Related Services, the Health Center is housed in a 20 million dollar facility.

RAY GRAVES

RAY GRAVES

Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

(1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves takeover in 1960. Graves has fielded seven Gator teams with six winding up in the first division.

(2) Florida's three highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and 1966 and tied for second in 1964 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.

(3) Graves has compiled the best seven-year record in Florida history, with a 49-23-2 mark.

(4) Florida owns only four wins in history over teams which finished in the nation's top ten, all four under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964 and 1965).

(5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's five best records have been 8-3 (1952), 9-2 (1960 and 66), 7-3 (1964) and 8-2 (1966), the latter four by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves' first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history. His 1956 team matched this.

(7) Under Graves the Gators have played in four bowl games in the past seven seasons. They are 1960 and 1962 Gator Bowl, 1965 Sugar Bowl and 1967 Orange Bowl.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gators, competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 70 per cent, winning the SEC all-sports crown the past four years.

Graves is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-60.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 14 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar, and Rose Bowl, respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each.

He is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn and they have three lovely daughters, Becky, 22, Kathy, 19, and Beth, 16.

Eibner, who has been on the Florida staff since 1950, assumed his new duties in January of 1966, replacing the late Col. Everett M. Von.

The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying ticket information to members of the organization in addition to being a scholarship booster organization for both athletic and academic grants.

Eibner is a graduate of the University of Kentucky (1941), where he majored in history and political science. In 1939 and 1940 he was an all-SEC tackle and captained the Wildcats in his senior year.

He played professional football with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1941, 1942 and 1946. From 1943-45 he was a Gunnery Officer in the South Pacific and Far East with the United States Navy.

Eibner's coaching career began in 1947 at Prestonsburg, Kentucky High. From 1948-50 he was line coach under Andy Gustafson at the University of Miami. Since 1950 he has served as an assistant football coach at the University of Florida.



"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS' "

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators'.

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University at Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1936 team. Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback. Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Braver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963. Larry Dupree in 1964. Charles Casey in 1965 and Steve Spurrier in 1966.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. He caught 43 passes in the 1939-40-41 seasons, a career record that stands today. His record for the most yards gained on passes caught—668 for 3 seasons—still stands, and a record for the longest TD pass caught, 74 yards against Miami in 1941 remained on the books until 1954. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942.

Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.



FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The Florida Field Press Box consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) Photo Darkroom and Western Union, (2) Radio and Photographers, (3) Press and (4) Photo. Here they are in detail:

PRESS DECK: There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable, swivel chair that is bolted to the floor. There are no windows on the press deck. A public address system operated exclusively for the press box gives all official information, including statistics on individual plays. **WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED.**

RADIO DECK: There are five ample-sized, acoustically tiled radio booths with glass windows that may be opened or closed, depending upon the desire of each announcer. The front row of each radio booth will seat four people very comfortably and five in a slight pinch. The back row seats three and is adapted for engineering equipment. Each radio booth may receive the press box PA announcements via headphones.

PHOTOGRAPHY DECK: This is a large open-front area at the very top of the press box. It has ample table space both in front of the cameraman and behind him. **WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED.**

Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

(1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves take-over in 1960. Graves has fielded eight Gator teams with seven winding up in the first division.

(2) Florida's three highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and 1966 and tied for second in 1964 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.

(3) Graves has compiled the best eight-year record in Florida history, with a 55-27-2 mark.

(4) Florida owns only four wins in history over teams which finished in the nation's top ten, all four under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964 and 1966).

(5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's five best records have been 8-3 (1952), 9-2 (1960 and 1966), 7-3 (1964) and 8-2 (1966), the latter four by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves' first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history. His 1966 team matched this.

(7) Under Graves the Gators have played in four bowl games in the past eight seasons. They are 1960 and 1962 Gator Bowl, 1965 Sugar Bowl and 1967 Orange Bowl.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gator's competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 70 per cent, winning the SEC all-sports crown the past five years.

Graves is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1937-60.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 14 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1946.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl, respectively.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.


"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

Lynn became the assistant athletic trainer at the University of Florida during the winter of 1967. The Ohio native served as an assistant trainer for the Gators in 1963-64.



Lynn, 26, was an outstanding high school athlete at Montpelier High School in Ohio, where he excelled in football, basketball and track. After high school he served in the United States Navy and was on the training staff at the U. S. Naval Academy.

He is married to the former Linda Cannington of Green Cove Springs. They are the parents of a daughter, Linda (2).

SARGE BANISTER, Equipment Manager



FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD



The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is an-

nounced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.


First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hugood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, and Richard Trapp in 1967.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.



FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The Florida Field Press Box consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) Photo Darkroom and Western Union, (2) Radio and Photographers, (3) Press and (4) Photo. Here they are in detail:

PRESS DECK: There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable, swivel chair that is bolted to the floor. There are no windows on the press deck. A public address system operated exclusively for the press box gives all official information, including statistics on individual plays. **WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED.**

RADIO DECK: There are five ample-sized, acoustically tiled radio booths with glass windows that may be opened or closed, depending upon the desire of each announcer. The front row of each radio booth will seat four people very comfortably and five in a slight pinch. The back row seats three and is adapted for engineering equipment. Each radio booth may receive the press box PA announcements by headphones.

PHOTOGRAPHY DECK: This is a large open-front area at the very top of the press box. It has ample table space both in front of the cameraman and behind him. **WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED.**

The University of Florida is one of the largest land-grant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2000 and a student body of more than 20,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last ten years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately 160 million dollars.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various schools and departments, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, nuclear physics, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Encompassing the Colleges of Dentistry, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Health Related Professions, the Health Center is housed in a 30 million dollar facility.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883, and by 1905 six colleges were at least in part state supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1906, the University of Florida was established in Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphy (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67), and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-).



RAY GRAVES

Little needs to be said of Ray Graves' football coaching ability other than mere presentation of facts concerning his record at the University of Florida.

(1) Florida finished in the Southeastern Conference first division four times in 27 years prior to Graves take-over in 1960. Graves has fielded nine Gator teams with seven winding up in the first division.

(2) Florida's three highest SEC finishes have come under Graves, second in 1960 and 1966 and tied for second in 1964 while playing the toughest schedule in Gator history.

(3) Graves has compiled the best nine-year record in Florida history, with a 61-30-3 mark.

(4) Florida owns only four wins in history over teams which finished in the nation's top ten, all four under Graves. These came over Penn State (1962), Alabama (1963) and LSU (1964 and 1965).

(5) Since the formation of the SEC in 1933 Florida's five best records have been 8-1 (1962), 9-2 (1960 and 1966), 7-3 (1964) and 8-2 (1968), the latter four by Graves' teams.

(6) Graves' first team at Florida won more games (9) than any in Gator history. His 1964 team matched this.

(7) Under Graves the Gators have played in four bowl games in the past nine seasons. They are 1960 and 1962 Gator Bowl, 1965 Sugar Bowl and 1967 Orange Bowl.

As Athletic Director Graves has seen the Gator's competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade above 70 per cent, winning the SEC all-sports crown five of the past six years.

Graves is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee.

This energetic, enthusiastic speaker and recruiter came to Florida after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he had been assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1967-60.

Graves has the unusual record of having seen 14 players directly in his charge become all-Americans during his career as an assistant coach.

In addition to coaching at Tech, Graves was line coach at Tennessee from 1944-45 and a scout for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1940.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl, respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each.

He is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazewell, Tenn, and they have three lovely daughters, Becky, 24, Kathy, 21, and Beth, 18.

"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which fea-

ured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"

FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD



The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1963 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Haggood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967 and Larry Smith & Guy Dennis in 1968.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6 1/2 inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.




FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The press box at Florida Field consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) President's Deck, which houses a lounge for the President of the University and his guests. This deck also has Western Union facilities. (2) Radio Deck. (3) Working Press Deck. (4) Photo Deck.

WORKING PRESS DECK: There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable chair. This deck also contains the outside PA announcer's position and the controls for operating the electric scoreboard.

An inside PA is operated from this deck, providing information for reporters and photographers on the Photo Deck.

Admission to the Working Press Deck is limited strictly to members of the press covering the football game. No VIPs are allowed on this deck, nor children or non-working women. Requests for credentials must be made with the Sports Publicity Office at least a week in advance, in writing.

Priority system for seats on this deck is based on (1) Reporters filling copy for Sunday editions (2) Daily newspapers who do not have Sunday editions. (3) Others wishing to cover the game.

PHOTOGRAPHY DECK: This is a large open-front area at the top of the press box. Most space is unreserved, however, some areas are reserved for game film and television show crews, other television and still cameramen.

No VIPs will be admitted to this deck and children and non-working women will not be admitted.

DARKROOM: A modern, air-conditioned darkroom is located at field level, Southeast corner just under the ramp to You Hall.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



RAY GRAVES

Ray Graves resigned as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1970 to become Director of Athletics after giving Gator fans the best decade on the gridiron in the school's history.

Graves' team ran up an overall record of 70-31-4, winning four of the five bowl games in which they appeared and winding up in the upper half of the rugged Southeastern Conference eight times.

As Director of Athletics, also, during the decade of the 1960s, Graves saw the Gators competing in eight intercollegiate sports, total a winning percentage a shade over 70 percent and win the SEC overall sports championship six times. Florida teams won 14 league titles and an NCAA championship during this period.

Graves, a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee, coached at Tennessee, 1944-45, Philadelphia Eagles, 1946, and Georgia Tech, 1947-59. He played for the Eagles in 1942-43.

A star center during his playing days, Graves was named captain of his high school, college and professional (Eagles) teams.

His bowl record as player and coach matches any in the country. He played on Tennessee teams in 1939, 1940 and 1941 which went to the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowl, respectively.

As an assistant coach at Tennessee and Georgia Tech, he helped guide teams that played in the Orange Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl three times, Gator Bowl twice, and Cotton and Rose Bowls once each.

Graves is a firm believer in having a solid overall sports program, an energetic and enthusiastic public speaker who never misses an opportunity to promote the University of Florida's athletic program.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and they have three lovely daughters, Becky, 25, Kathy, 22 and Beth, 19.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

doug dickey

Doug Dickey, 37, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In the previous six years Dickey compiled a record of 46-15-4 as Head Football Coach at the University of Tennessee, sending the Vols to five bowls, winning two Southeastern Conference championships and being named the league's Coach of the Year three times.

After a beginning year of rebuilding at Tennessee, which resulted in a 4-5-1 mark in 1964, Dickey's teams ran up five consecutive years of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey played college football for Florida, starting as a safetyman on defense and winding up as a quarterback who guided the Gators to the 1952 Gator Bowl title.

An imposing figure at 6-2½ and 200 pounds, Dickey's reputation has been built on strength of character and purpose, in addition to brilliant coaching and leadership qualities. He is known as one of the best organizers in coaching, a man who covers all details.




COACH DICKEY'S

thoughts

ON HIS 1970 GATORS:

"You need at least a half-dozen super players, the kind who can make the plays that win games for you. On top of that, you need about 35 good, solid SEC-calibre football players to be a solid title contender.

"We have the half-dozen super players. We have about 25 or 26 players who should be able to hold their own. After that, however, we can get out-personneled in a hurry. I think you need about 35 boys who are capable of starting for you. My championship teams have had this. This team is a little thin in this respect.

"My biggest disappointment last spring is the lack of time we spent with a number of players who might be able to help us. Right boys who are potential starters didn't practice at all. Carlos Alvarez was with us only three days. Fred Abbott, a sophomore linebacker, was with us only 10 days and he needs the work to play the role we think he can play for us next fall. The offensive line veterans didn't participate a single day due to operations."

"I think, however, we accomplished our three main objectives of spring practice. First, we found this staff can work together. Second, we've learned the abilities of our first 25-to-30 players. We know what each of them can do best and any moves we make from here on in will be vertical, not horizontal. Third, we were able to put together our fundamental offense and defense - four or five basic plays."

"Our schedule is difficult. We must win the tough games on the road and defeating Alabama, Tennessee and FSU in their stadiums is not going to be easy. Auburn and Miami are never anything less than difficult, regardless of the site and Georgia is not only an outstanding football team, this is an exceptional rivalry. On top of these obviously demanding games we face a group of opponents, any one of which is capable of giving us all we can handle."

OFFENSE

The 1970 Florida offense has already been dubbed the "3-D Offense", meaning dropback, drive and dash... the ingredients Coach Doug Dickey hopes will keep defenses from catching up with the "Super Sophs" of 1969.

Dropback and pass is still the key, with John Reeves throwing to a variety of receivers led by All-America split end-flanker Carlos Alvarez. Both running backs, Tommy Durrance and either Mike Rich or Garry Walker, can catch, as can tight end Jim Yancey, split receivers Andy Cheney and sophomore Willie Jackson. The Gators should be able to throw the ball as well as anybody.

Drive, in Dickey terminology, means run the ball inside, from tackle-to-tackle. This is an area in which he looks for improvement with Durrance and the Rich-Walker fullback combination taking the load. Improvement here should bring about more concentration by defenses and perhaps open up the passing attack a bit.

Dash, the Dickey way, is sprint for the corners to either throw or run. Reeves will run more than in 1969 and he can also throw the rollout pass with steady accuracy. That's the 1970 Gator offense, 3-D for Dropback, Drive and Dash.

DEFENSE

The 4-3 with the Monsterman, Jack Burns, returns to key the Gators on defense. The front four appears solid with an all-star candidate in end Jack Youngblood, tested veterans in tackle Danny Williams and end Robert Harrell and a promising sophomore in Eddy Moore. Three linebackers are set, all of them capable of being exceptional football players. The starters are Mike Kelley and Richard Buchanan outside and sophomore Fred Abbott in the middle. Defensive chief Doug Knotts has handed heavy responsibility to a sophomore in placing Abbott in the middle, and he believes the spot is in good hands. FERGIE FERGUSON AWARD



The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the

annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Ass Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hugood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967 and Larry Smith & Guy Dennis in 1968.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6 1/2 inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's second highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.



**"MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF
UF TEAMS AS 'ALLIGATORS'"**

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied Miller's with blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1833 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially state-supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Stead (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-).

COLLEGES


The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation and University College. A College of Veterinary Medicine is being planned for the future. Schools are: Forestry and Graduate.

GENERAL INFORMATION


The University of Florida is one of the largest land-grant institutions in the South with nearly 2,500 faculty members and a student body of more than 22,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last 15 years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately \$200 million.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various colleges, schools and divisions, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 million during the next three years will provide space to house the College of Dentistry and to accommodate more medical students.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



RAY GRAVES

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969 he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times.

Graves has seen Florida athletic teams, competing in nine intercollegiate sports, win one national championship (golf) and 14 SEC titles during his 10 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the University and the game of football in general. He is credited with perfecting the shifting defense and is recognized as the originator of the "Monster Defense." He perfected this while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950s.

Graves has authored two books, "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Offense" and "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Defense."

His overall record as Head Football Coach at Florida was 70-31-4 with five bowl teams, four of which won. His teams won the 1960-1962 & 1969 Gator Bowl games and the 1967 Orange Bowl. He lost in the Sugar Bowl in 1966.

His decade also produced 14 football All-Americans and Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier.

Graves came to Florida in 1960 after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he was assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-1960.

Graves is a 1942 graduate of the University of Tennessee and a three year football starter for the Vols who played in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowls and was captain of the 1941 Tennessee team.

Following a two-year career with the Philadelphia Eagles Graves entered coaching at Tennessee in 1944. In 1946 he was an assistant coach with the Eagles and he joined Dodd's Georgia Tech staff in 1947.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and has three daughters, Becky, Kathy and Beth.

**HEAD FOOTBALL COACH
DOUGLAS ADAIR (DOUG) DICKEY**

Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In seven seasons as a head coach he has compiled a record of 53-19-4, have five bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey, 38, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964 and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickey's later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.


Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don 15, Danny 14, David 12 and Darrell 9, and a daughter, Jaren Ann 4.

DOUG DICKEY LOOKS AT 1971 GATORS

"This team is a sounder football team than we had last season. It has more going for it in terms of depth at many positions, capable first team players at most positions and outstanding players who can break games open.

"Two factors have influenced the progress this team made in the spring. First, there was spirited competition for positions between veterans and talented young players. Secondly, we got extremely good senior leadership. The combination, which should continue in the fall, could enable us to develop into a capable football team.

"Specifically, we are improved in the offensive line and defensive secondary, areas which were not strong last season. Several young players figure in this improvement, plus our veterans all showed considerable improvement in the spring.

"At this point our top players would be quarterback John Reeves, tailback Tommy Durrance, split end Willie Jackson, flanker Carlos Alvarez, tight end Jim Yancey, offensive guard Fred Abbott, defensive lineman Bob Harrell, defensive backs Harvin Clark, Andy Chaney, John Silman and John Clifford.

"Many sophomores will either start or play a great deal. Offensive tackle Kris Anderson, linebacker Ricky Browne and defensive end Mike Moore have established themselves already as first team football players.

"The strongest part of our football team is the group of running backs we have. This is a position where we have ability and depth with five good football players in Durrance, Mike Rich, Lenny Lucas, Vince Kendrick and Duane Doel.

"I think John Reeves ranks with any quarterback in college football. He was our most impressive player in the spring and handles the team with maturity and judgement. He is a Heisman Trophy candidate.

"We play a very difficult schedule and it will be demanding on us. We will need all the depth we can get to run through Mississippi State, Alabama, Tennessee, LSU and FSU in a row, then have only two weeks before meeting Auburn and Georgia back-to-back."

He is regarded as one of the brightest young coaches in football, a prime head coaching candidate of the future.

Knotts joining Coach Dickey's staff came in 1965. He took over the defense following the 1966 season and his troops have been among the nation's best the past few seasons.

Knotts is known as a "tough but fair" coach who has a close relationship with his defensive players.

Veteran coach John Eibner is Director of Gator Football Boosters, Inc., an organization designed to promote University of Florida intercollegiate athletics through the alumni and friends of the University.

Eibner, who has been on the Florida staff since 1950, assumed his new duties in January of 1966, replacing the late Col. Everett M. Von.

The Boosters handle such important duties as distributing films of Gator games, arranging public appearances and supplying information to members of the organization in addition to being a scholarship booster organization for both athletic and academic grants.

Eibner is a graduate of the University of Kentucky (1941), where he majored in history and political science. In 1939 and 1940 he was an all-SEC tackle and captained the Wildcats in his senior year. He played professional football with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1941, 1942 and 1946. From 1943-45 he was a Gunnery Officer in the South Pacific and Far East with the United States Navy.

Eibner's coaching career began in 1947 at Prestonsburg, Kentucky High. From 1948-50 he was line coach under Andy Gustafson at the University of Miami. Since 1950 he had served as an assistant football coach at the University of Florida. He is married to the former Katie Oakley of Mount Sterling, Kentucky.

Assisting Boggs is Ted Covington, Lakeland insurance man and former radio station owner, Bob Leach, assistant director of the University Station, WRUF, is producer for the ten-game broadcasts which are also fed to the Southeast on the "Pick of Dixie" Network.

FLORIDA FIELD PRESS BOX

The press box at Florida Field consists of four decks: Starting from the bottom and going to the top (by elevator) they are (1) President's Deck, which houses a lounge for the President of the University and his guests. This deck also has Western Union facilities. (2) Radio Deck. (3) Working Press Deck. (4) Photo Deck.

WORKING PRESS DECK: There are 48 seats on the front row and 47 on the back row. Each reporter has 34 inches of desk space and an adjustable chair. This deck also contains the outside PA announcer's position and the controls for operating the electric scoreboard.

An inside PA is operated from this deck, providing information for reporters and photographers on the Photo Deck.

Admission to the Working Press Deck is limited strictly to members of the press covering the football game. No VIPs are allowed on this deck, nor children or non-working women. Requests for credentials must be made with the Sports Publicity Office at least a week in advance, in writing.

Priority system for seats on this deck is based on (1) Reporters filing copy for Sunday editions (2) Daily newspapers who do not have Sunday editions. (3) Others wishing to cover the game.

PHOTOGRAPHY DECK: This is a large open-front area at the top of the press box. Most space is unreserved, however, some areas are reserved for game film and television show crews, other television and still cameramen.


No VIPs will be admitted to this deck and children and non-working women will not be admitted.

DARKROOM: A modern, air-conditioned darkroom is located at field level, Southeast corner just under the ramp to Yon Hall.

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about
 equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of
 Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120
 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast
 of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University
 of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private
 school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida
 Agricultural College was established at Lake City in
 1883 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially
 state-supported. With the passage of the Backman Act
 in 1905, the University of Florida was established at
 Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew
 Stead (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-26), Dr.
 John J. Tigert (1926-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53),
 Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1953-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell
 (1967-).


The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architec-

GENERAL INFORMATION


The University of Florida is one of the largest land-
 grant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2,500
 and student body of more than 24,000. The physical plant
 is valued at \$200 million and includes more than 700
 buildings on 2,400 acres.

In addition to numerous research projects in the var-
 ious colleges, schools and divisions, the University has
 established a number of specialized laboratories. These
 agencies carry on continuous basic research in the
 fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, busi-
 ness, economics, public administration, communications
 and statistics, making significant contributions to pri-
 vate industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and
 patient care is being carried out in the University's J.
 Hillis Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 mil-
 lion will provide space by 1974 to house the College of
 Dentistry and to accommodate more medical and health
 related students.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



RAY GRAVES

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969 he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times.

Graves has seen Florida athletic teams, competing in nine intercollegiate sports, win one national championship (golf) and 14 SEC titles during his 10 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the University and the game of football in general. He is credited with perfecting the shifting defense and is recognized as the originator of the "Monster Defense." He perfected this while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950s.

Graves has authored two books, "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Offense" and "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Defense."

His overall record as Head Football Coach at Florida was 70-31-4 with five bowl teams, four of which won. His teams won the 1960-1962 & 1969 Gator Bowl games and the 1967 Orange Bowl. He lost in the Sugar Bowl in 1966.

His decade also produced 14 football All-Americans and Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier.

In April, 1972, Graves was elected to membership in the Florida Sports Writers Association Hall of Fame.

Graves came to Florida in 1960 after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he was assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-1960.

Graves is a 1942 graduate of the University of Tennessee and a three year football starter for the Vols who played in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowls and was captain of the 1941 Tennessee team.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and has three daughters, Becky, Kathy and Beth.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH
DOUGLAS ADAIR (DOUG) DICKEY

Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In eight seasons as a head coach he has compiled a record of 57-26-4, had five bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey, 39, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964 and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.


Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Bevill and they have four sons, Don 17, Danny 16, David 14, and Darrell 10, and a daughter, Jaren Ann 5.

Looking At The '72 Gators

Strengths:

Improved linebacking and defensive secondary with more speed and quickness . . . Improved offensive line due to added experience and addition of promising sophomores, most notably guard Burton Lawless . . . Solid first unit running backs.

Problems:

Lack of depth at every position but linebacker . . . Inexperienced kicking in all areas except kickoffs . . . Inexperienced quarterbacks . . . Very difficult schedule which includes seven bowl teams.

Quoting Coach Dickey:

"We should show improvement on defense, but then we had a long way to go because we finished 10th in a 19-team league in 1971 . . . We will have more speed and quickness, defensively, and our linebacking and secondary play could be much improved if sophomores like linebacker Ralph Ortega and cornerback Tyson Sever come through and the veterans continue to improve as they did in the spring . . . I thought our offensive line developed some in the spring and we are hopeful some young people like Burton Lawless will be able to establish themselves quickly . . . We are strong at center with Mark King, an exceptional football player . . . Our first unit running backs, Vince Kendrick and Lenny Lucas, are very capable but this is an area where we can't stand injuries like we had in 1971 . . . Chan Galley enters the season as our first team quarterback. He came along well in the spring. I think sophomore David Bowdan is still in the battle here, however . . . Our schedule is as demanding as in 1971. We need to keep our key people healthy to play the likes of FSU, Alabama, Ole Miss, Auburn, Georgia, LSU and North Carolina, all bowl teams last year."

Gator football fans remember Jimmy Dunn as the 137-pound quarterback who led UF teams from 1956-58, ran 76-yards for a touchdown to upset Georgia, 7-6, in '58 and stood out as one of the finest punters for accuracy in the school's history.

While not picking up much weight along the way Dunn has, none-the-less, moved up the coaching ladder rapidly. He joined Coach Dickey's original Tennessee staff in 1964 as an offensive assistant, has been in charge of the Vol offense the past four seasons. He is regarded as one of the brightest young coaches in football, a prime head coaching candidate of the future.

Mention the name Knotts in North Carolina and they will tell you of an entire clan which played football for Duke University. One of the finest was Doug Knotts, an All-American prep athlete in Albemarle, N.C. who starred for the Blue Devils as a center and tackle from 1952-55.

Knotts joining Coach Dickey's staff came in 1965. He took over the defense following the 1966 season and his troops have been among the nation's best the past few seasons.

Knotts is known as a "tough but fair" coach who has a close relationship with his defensive players.

Secretaries in the Gator Booster office are Mrs. Louise Henry and Mrs. Margaret Melton.


Florida Football Network

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially state-supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Stead (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. H. Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation and University College. A College of Veterinary Medicine is being planned for the future. Schools are: Forestry and Graduate.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is one of the largest landgrant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2,500 and student body of more than 24,000. The physical plant is valued at \$200 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

In addition to numerous research projects in the various colleges, schools and divisions, the University has established a number of specialized laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's J. H. Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 million will provide space by 1974 to house the College of Dentistry and to accommodate more medical and health related students.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



RAY GRAVES

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969 he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1950s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times.

Graves has seen Florida athletic teams, competing in nine intercollegiate sports, won two national championships (golf) and 15 SEC titles during his 13 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves felt many contributions to the University and the game of football in general. He is credited with perfecting the shifting defense and is recognized as the originator of the "Monster Defense." He perfected this while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950s.

Graves has authored two books, "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Offense" and "Ray Graves Guide to Modern Football Defense."

His overall record as Head Football Coach at Florida was 70-31-4 with five bowl teams, four of which won. His teams won the 1960-1962 & 1969 Gator Bowl games and the 1967 Orange Bowl. He lost in the Sugar Bowl in 1966.

His decade also produced 14 football All-Americans and Helaman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier.

In April, 1972, Graves was elected to membership in the Florida Sports Writers Association Hall of Fame.

Graves came to Florida in 1960 after 13 years as an assistant football coach at Georgia Tech, where he was assistant head coach under Bobby Dodd from 1957-1960.

Graves is a 1942 graduate of the University of Tennessee and a three-year football starter for the Vols who played in the Orange, Sugar and Rose Bowls and was captain of the 1941 Tennessee team.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and has three daughters, Mrs. Bill (Becky) Shaw, Kathy and Beth.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH
DOUGLAS ADAIR (DOUG) DICKEY

Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In nine seasons as a head coach he has compiled a record of 62-31-5, had five bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.



Dickey, 41, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964 and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.

Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1964 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1965-66), University of Arkansas (1967-69) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Seville and they have four sons, Don 18, Denny 17, David 15, and Darrell 11, and a daughter, Jaren Ann 6.

1973 UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Coach Doug Dickey's Gators will be improved in every phase of the game in 1973 and will face a most demanding schedule with a team which will feature solid defense, good kicking and an offense headed by one of the nation's top backs in Neil Moore.

Florida started nine sophomores and two freshmen in 1972 and went 4-5-1 against a schedule described as the SEC's toughest. The Gators were only beaten by more than one touchdown in one game, a 24-7 loss to Alabama.

The Gators will be a more mature football team in 1973 with 39 lettermen returning. They lost only one offensive starter and three on defense.

"We have good quality in our squad," says Coach Dickey. "We have some big play people and some depth in players who can make winning plays. I think Florida football has arrived at a point where we can look the best teams in our league in the eyes. Now we must find the winning edge against this calibre of competition. This is what we did not do in 1972."


The 1972 Gators lost to Auburn, 26-20, Georgia, 10-7, and to LSU, 3-3, in addition to the loss to Alabama. These teams, plus Mississippi, are all on the 1973 schedule and must be played in a row.

"The winning edge for us rests in a lot of areas," Dickey says. "Areas such as conditioning, development of skills, luck on injuries to key people and breaks over the course of a season. Our schedule is very demanding and I believe there will be several close games in 1973."


Moore is the key to the Florida offense. He came to the Gators as a junior college basketball star who had played only two

the leading candidates but here again there is little in the way of proven performers.

Dickey believes Alabama and Georgia have physically stronger teams than the Gators, that LSU and Auburn probably have better team speed and quickness and that the schedule of 7 conference games in a row will be most difficult.

He does concede, however, that his Gators have a better chance against these types of teams than they have had in the past.

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially state-supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-26), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-74), Dr. Robert O. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Jour-

nalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation and University College. A College of Veterinary Medicine is being planned for the future. Schools are: Forestry and Graduate.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is one of the largest landgrant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2,500 and student body of more than 25,000. The physical plant is valued at \$210 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

In addition to numerous research projects in the various colleges, schools and divisions, the University has established a number of specialized laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 million will provide space in 1974 to house the College of Dentistry and to accommodate more medical and health related students.

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

director of athletics



When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969, he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times. His overall football mark of 70-31-4 is the best in school history.


Florida athletic teams have won two NCAA golf titles and 16 SEC crowns during Graves' 14 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the University and to the game of football in general. He is recognized as one of the originators in perfecting the shifting defense now commonly called the "Monster Defense." Graves perfected this defense while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950s.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn. and they have three daughters. Becky (Mrs. Bill Shaw), Kathy and Beth.

douglas adair (doug) dickey

head football coach,



Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In ten seasons as a head coach, he has compiled a record of 69-36-5, had six bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey, 41, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964, and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.


Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is active in community work. He has been state chairman for the Easter Seal Drive and the Cancer Fund Drive, as well as involvement in work with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don 19, Danny 18, David 16 and Darrell 13, and a daughter, Jaren Ann 7.

He began his coaching career at Miami High School in 1948 and also coached at the University of Miami prior to joining the Gator staff in 1960. Most of the next 10 seasons he was in charge of the defensive team and his teams annually finished ranked among the nation's best.

Since 1970, he has been Executive Assistant Athletic Director. Ellenson attended the University of Georgia and graduated in 1943 with a degree in Journalism. He was a three-

year starting tackle for the Bulldogs and played on two bowl teams, the 1942 Orange Bowl and the 1943 Rose Bowl teams.

Ellenson, 53, was a much-decorated hero of the Battle of the Bulge during World War II.

Ellenson is married to the former Jeanne Center of Springfield, Mass. and has two children, daughter Donna, a former Gator cheerleader and UF graduate, and son Mark, a student at Buchholz High School in Gainesville.

Chief secretary in the Gator Boosters office, and one of the keys to its operation, is Mrs. Margaret Melton.

The voice of the Fighting Gators, Otis Boggs, once again will bring to the listeners of more than 65 Florida stations the exciting play-by-play description of the Florida Football Gators. Assisting Boggs is Ted Covington, Lakeland insurance man and former radio station owner. Bob Leach, assistant director of the University Station, WRUF, is producer for the 11 game broadcasts which are also fed to the Southeast on the "Pick of Dixie" Network.

1974 gator grid outlook

The offense will be improved, the defense has some big shoes to fill and the overall outlook is encouraging in 1974 for Gator Head Coach Doug Dickey.

Starting with the good news for Florida fans . . . the offense was impressive in the spring and figures to be improved with a veteran, tested offensive line, several capable running backs and quarterbacks who can run the option and throw.

The importance of having this type of quarterback in the Dickey scheme of offense shouldn't be underestimated. In his career as a head coach Dickey's record when he has had the option, run-or-throw QB is 51-16-4.


"There's no question we are pleased with our situation at quarterback going into the season," Dickey says. "Don Gaffney is 5-1 as a starter and was virtually ineffective due to a back injury in the one we lost, the Tangerine Bowl.

"Jimmy Fisher is a fine young prospect at this position, as are David Wright and Cleaver Hayling. I think we can get the job done at this position."

Dickey is also pleased with an offensive line which is now well-seasoned. Sophomores played most of the time last year and they have now grown up and have the experience of that year under their belts.

The running backs are solid with veterans Jimmy DuBose, Larry Brinson, James Richards, Thom Clifford and defensive-back-turned runner Wayne Fields. A name to note here, too, is


sophomore Robert Morgan.

The major offensive questions arise around the wide receiver corps which includes the league's best, Lee McGriff, but no other proven performers. This situation is up in the air going into the season.

The Gator defense, best in the Southeastern Conference in 1973, had some big holes knocked in it by graduation which took tackles John Lacer and David Hitchcock, end Ricky Browne and safetyman Jim Revels.

All four were three-year starters. Browne and Revels were both All-SEC and Gator coaches thought Lacer and Hitchcock would have been, too. The pair of tackles made more big plays than any in memory for the Gators.

Sophomore Darrell Carpenter and senior Clint Griffith figure to replace Lacer and Hitchcock but there is no depth in this vital area. Junior Joe Allen moves from linebacker to replace Browne at end and the secondary could shape up a variety of ways but will include people like



"Miller recalls christening of UF teams as 'alligators'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied

'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Fergie Ferguson Award

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Hountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967, Guy Dennis and Larry Smith in 1968, Steve Tannen in 1969, Jack Youngblood in 1970, John Reaves in 1971, Fred Abbott in 1972, and David Hitchcock in 1973.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially state-supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Stodd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-74), Dr. Robert O. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Jour-

nalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation and University College. A College of Veterinary Medicine is being planned for the future. Schools are: Forestry and Graduate.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is one of the largest landgrant institutions in the South with a faculty of 2,500 and student body of more than 25,000. The physical plant is valued at \$210 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

In addition to numerous research projects in the various colleges, schools and divisions, the University has established a number of specialized laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the University's J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 million provided space in 1974 to house the College of Dentistry and to accommodate more medical and health related students.



When Roy Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969, he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times. His overall football mark of 70-31-4 is the best in school history.


Florida athletic teams have won two NCAA golf titles and 20 SEC crowns during Graves' 15 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the University and to the game of football in general. He is recognized as one of the originators in perfecting the shifting defense now commonly called the "Monster Defense." Graves perfected this defense while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950s.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tenn., and they have three daughters.

douglas adair (doug) dickey

head football coach,



Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In 11 seasons as a head coach, he has compiled a record of 77-40-5, had seven bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey, 42, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964, and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.

Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is active in community work. He has been state chairman for the Easter Seal Drive and the Cancer Fund Drive, as well as involvement in work with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.



Gene Ellenson was appointed Executive Secretary of Gator football Boosters, Inc., in January of 1974 following 13 years as an assistant football coach and athletic department administrator at the University of Florida. Going into its second season in the Wishbone offense Florida gives every indication of being improved and more consistent offensively. Defensively, there are some big shoes to fill and the rugged early season schedule will test several young but talented people in a hurry.


Improved offensive consistency should begin with the quarterbacks. New to the Wishbone last September they have now had a season and a spring to improve execution in all areas. The improvement was obvious by the end of spring drills.

Senior Don Gaffney, junior Jimmy Fisher and sophomore Bill Kynes all showed ability to run the offense and out-execute the defense.

Another strength will be perhaps the finest corps of running backs in Florida history, led by sophomore halfback Tony Green, who broke the school single-season rushing record in 1974 and was named the Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year.

Joining Green will be halfbacks James Richards, Larry Brinson, Earl Carr and Sammy Lemon and fullbacks Jimmy DuBose and Robert Morgan.


Coach Doug Dickey is also pleased with the situation at tight end where seniors Alvis Darby and Thom Clifford and sophomore Ron Enclade are all capable of outstanding play.

Somewhat of a rebuilding job exists in the offensive line, where four starters graduated. However, young players saw a lot of action in 1974 and a group which includes guards Joe Pupello and Keith Tribble, centers Robble Moore and Mike Berry and tackle Bruce Mulliniks will be bolstered by a pair of senior all-star candidates in tackle Mike Williams and guard Gerald Loper.

Graduation took the SEC's leading pass receiver of the past two seasons, Lee McGriff, and the replacement appears to be sophomore Wes Chandler, who runs his routes very well and has a good pair of hands. Help in this area will likely come from senior Glenn Sever and sophomore Derrick Gaffney.

Gone from the strong defensive unit are a pair of super linebackers, Glenn Cameron and Ralph Ortega, along with two other All-SEC players of 1974, defensive end Preston Kendrick and Randy Talbot, who led the league in pass interceptions at cornerback. All three cornerbacks graduated.

Strength of the defense appears to be up the middle with tackles Darrell Carpenter and Scott Hutchinson, nose guard-middle linebacker



"Miller recalls christening of UF teams as 'alligators'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied

'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

fergie ferguson award

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967, Guy Dennis and Larry Smith in 1968, Steve Tannen in 1969, Jack Youngblood in 1970, John Reaves in 1971, Fred Abbott in 1972, David Hitchcock in 1973, and Lee McGriff in 1974.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

Dr. Robert Quarles Marston was born in Toano, Virginia, February 12, 1923. He earned his B.S. from Virginia Military Institute in 1943, his M.D. from Medical College of Virginia in 1947, a B.Sc. from Oxford University in 1949 where he was a Rhodes Scholar from 1947-49.

Marston received honorary degrees from the College of William and Mary, 1969; Albany Medical College, Union University, 1969. He was an intern with Johns Hopkins Hospital from 1949-50 and a resident of Vanderbilt University Hospital, 1950-51, Medical College of Virginia, 1953-54 and assistant professor of medicine in 1954.

Marston was assistant professor of bacteriology and immunology at the University of Minnesota, 1958-59 and was associate professor of medicine and assistant dean in charge of student affairs at the Medical College of Virginia, 1959-61. He was dean of the University of Mississippi School of Medicine, 1961-66, director of the Medical Center, 1961-65 and vice chancellor, 1965-66.

He served as the associate director of the division of regional medical programs at the National Institute of Health, 1966-68; administrator of Federal Health Services and Mental Health Administration, 1968. He became director of the NIH, Bethesda, Maryland in 1968 and in 1973 was elected scholar-in-residence by the faculty of the University of Virginia School of Medicine.

Marston is married to the former Ann Carter Garnett and is the father of three children—Ann, Robert and Wesley.

University Information

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida, located in Gainesville, is a coeducational state university and land-grant college with a faculty of 2,500 and a student body of 27,000. The physical plant is valued at more than \$250 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

The University has conferred more than 50,000 degrees since its founding. There are 5,200 individual courses offered providing 90 areas of instructional specialization for undergraduates and more than 50 specialties for doctoral degrees.

Tracing its beginning to 1853 (founding date of the East Florida Seminary, one of six state-supported institutions consolidated in 1905 to form the University of Florida), classes on the present campus first were held in 1906.

There have been seven presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67), Dr. Stephen C. O'Connell (1957-73) and Dr. Robert O. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

Encompassing 16 colleges and two schools, the University offers programs ranging from general to highly specialized education. It is unique in that all of its colleges are located on a single campus where the professional skills represented in the various departments can combine for interdisciplinary work.

Academic divisions include the College of Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation, along with the University College, School of Forest Resources and Conservation and the Graduate School. A College of Veterinary Medicine is in planning stages.

SERVICE

In addition to numerous research projects in the colleges, the University has specialized laboratories carrying on continuous basic research in engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, public administration, architecture, building construction and other areas which make significant contributions to private industry and government agencies.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. The expansion program underway will provide space for the College of Dentistry and accommodate more medical and health-related students.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences is the University's statewide agricultural research and educational organization. Its purpose is accomplished through 10 departments and the School of Forest Resources and Conservation in Gainesville and the efforts of 23 research and education centers throughout the state.

The Division of Continuing Education enables the University to be responsive to the varied and changing needs of Florida's citizens. Last year 72,000 people obtained educational opportunities through credit, non-credit, and special programs of the division.



Ray Graves

Director of Athletics

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969, he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960's, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times. His overall football mark of 70-31-4 is the best in school history.

Florida athletic teams have won two NCAA golf titles and 20 SEC crowns during Graves' 16 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the game of football in general. He is recognized as one of the originators in perfecting the shifting defense now commonly called the "Monster Defense". Graves perfected this defense while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950's.

Graves is a 1943 graduate of the University of Tennessee, where he was a star lineman.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazwell, Tennessee and they have three daughters.



Douglas Adair (Doug) Dickey Head Football Coach



Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In 12 seasons as a head coach, he has compiled a record of 86-43-5, had eight bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey's 1975 Gators were his third consecutive bowl team at Florida and the first team in the history of Gator football to win nine games during the course of a regular season. They finished 5-1 and tied for second in the SEC.

Dickey, 43, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964, and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.

Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don, Danny, David and Daryl, and a daughter, Jaren Ann.

COACH DICKEY ON THE 1976 GATORS

"Florida football is on a steady course. The Gators have reached the point where they can play near the top of the Southeastern Conference and compete seriously for the title each season . . . The 1976 team will be of the same general calibre as the past few teams which have won 24 games in the past three seasons and 17 in the past two . . . We need to develop depth in some areas and need some young players to come along at defensive end, linebacker, tight

end and in some areas of the offensive line. We are encouraged about the potential for this to happen . . . Our strengths certainly are at running back, split receiver and the defensive secondary . . . Our kicking game should be solid . . . The schedule is tougher than a year ago because I anticipate LSU, Mississippi State and Auburn being improved and we trade Vanderbilt in Gainesville for Tennessee in Knoxville, not to mention playing FSU there."

"Miller Recalls Christening of UF Teams as 'Alligators'"

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied

'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator."

Fergie Ferguson Award

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967, Guy Dennis and Larry Smith in 1968, Steve Tannen in 1969, Jack Youngblood in 1970, John Reaves in 1971, Fred Abbott in 1972, David Hitchcock in 1973, and Lee McGriff in 1974.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.







Douglas Adair "Doug" Dickey Head Coach



Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In 13 seasons as a head coach, he has compiled a record of 94-47-5, had nine bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey's 1975 team was the first in the history of Gator football to win nine games during the course of a regular season. They finished 5-1 and tied for second in the SEC.


His 1976 team won eight games and went to the school's fourth consecutive bowl game. Among SEC schools only Alabama and Florida have averaged at least eight wins per season over this period.

Among active coaches Dickey ranks fifth nationally in winning percentage. His track record, as player and coach, has always shown a consistency to finish in the winning role.

He came to the University of Florida as a non-scholarship football player, one of 105 in his freshman class. He earned a scholarship as a defensive back and prior to his junior season of 1952 the Gators' star quarterback, Haywood Sullivan, signed a baseball bonus with the Boston Red Sox.

Coach Bob Woodruff moved Dickey to quarterback and he led the Gators to their first-ever bowl game, a 14-13 win over Tulsa in the Gator Bowl, and a season record of 8-3.

He went on to coach Fort Carson, Colorado to a service championship and then joined the staff of Frank Broyles at Arkansas. Dickey was at Arkansas six seasons and was generally credited by Broyles as being the source of much of the rebuilding of the Razorbacks.



Dickey moved on to Tennessee in 1964 and Arkansas won the National Championship that season with a lineup dotted with his recruits.

The 1964 season at Tennessee was a rebuilding year which was followed by five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over that period of time.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.

His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey, 44, is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don, Danny, David and Daryl, and a daughter, Jaren Ann.

PRESIDENT




Dr. Robert Quarles Marston was born in Toano, Virginia, February 12, 1923. He earned his B.S. from Virginia Military Institute in 1943, his M.D. from Medical College of Virginia in 1947, a B.Sc. from Oxford University in 1949 where he was a Rhodes Scholar from 1947-49.

Marston received honorary degrees from the College of William and Mary, 1969; Albany Medical College, Union University, 1969. He was an intern with Johns Hopkins Hospital from 1949-50 and a resident of Vanderbilt University Hospital, 1950-51, Medical College of Virginia, 1953-54 and assistant professor of medicine in 1954.

Marston was assistant professor of bacteriology and immunology at the University of Minnesota, 1958-59 and was associate professor of medicine and assistant dean in charge of student affairs at the Medical College of Virginia, 1959-61. He was dean of the University of Mississippi School of Medicine, 1961-66, director of the Medical Center, 1961-65 and vice chancellor, 1965-66.

He served as the associate director of the division of regional medical programs at the National Institute of Health, 1966-68; administrator of Federal Health Services and Mental Health Administration, 1968. He became director of the NIH, Bethesda, Maryland in 1968 and in 1973 was elected scholar-in-residence by the faculty of the University of Virginia School of Medicine.

Marston is married to the former Ann Carter Garrett and is the father of three children—Ann, Robert and Wesley.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969, he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960's, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times, his overall football mark of 70-31-4 is the best in school history.

Florida athletic teams have won two NCAA golf titles and 20 SEC crowns during Graves' 17 years as Director of Athletics.

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the game of football in general. He is recognized as one of the originators in perfecting the shifting defense now commonly called the "Monster Defense". Graves perfected this defense while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the 1950's.

Graves was a '43 graduate and star lineman at Tennessee.

Graves is married to the former Opal Richardson of Tazewell, Tennessee and they have three daughters, Rebecca Shaw, Atlanta, Ga.; Katherine Oakley, Denver, Colo.; Beth Rosenburgh, New York City; one granddaughter, Katherine Courtenay Shaw.

University Information

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida, located in Gainesville, is a coast-to-coast state university and land-grant college with a faculty of 2,520 and a student body of 27,000. The physical plant is valued at more than \$210 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

The University has conferred more than 50,000 degrees since its founding. There are 5,000 individual courses offered providing 90 areas of instructional specialization for undergraduates and more than 50 specialties for doctoral degrees.

Tracing its beginning to 1853 (founding date of the East Florida Seminary, one of six state-supported institutions consolidated in 1905 to form the University of Florida), classes on the present campus first were held in 1905.

There have been seven presidents: Dr. Andrew Sells (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Mumford (1909-23), Dr. John J. Tigert (1924-47), Dr. J. Hittis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Belz (1955-57), Dr. Stephen G. O'Connell (1957-73) and Dr. Robert Q. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

Embracing 10 colleges and two schools, the University offers programs ranging from general to highly specialized education. It is unique in that all of its colleges are located on a single campus where the professional skills represented in the various departments can combine for interdisciplinary work.

Academic divisions include the College of Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation, along with the University College, School of Forest Resources and Conservation and the Graduate School. A College of Veterinary Medicine is near completion.

SERVICE

In addition to numerous research projects in the colleges, the University has specialized laboratories carrying on continuous basic research in engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, public administration, architecture, building construction and other areas which make significant contributions to private industry and government agencies.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. The expansion program underway will provide space for the College of Dentistry and accommodate more medical and health-related students.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences is the University's statewide agricultural research and educational organization. Its purpose is accomplished through 14 departments and the School of Forest Resources and Conservation in Gainesville and the efforts of 22 research and education centers throughout the state.

The Division of Continuing Education enables the University to be responsive to the varied and changing needs of Florida's citizens. Last year 72,000 people obtained educational opportunities through credit, non-credit and special programs of the division.



They are very proud parents, also, of former Gator punter John James, who now punts for the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League.

The Gators,

Note: The following position-by-position evaluation of the Gator squad is based on Coach Doug Dickey's mid-summer estimate.

OFFENSE:

Split Ends: There is likely no better wide receiver in college football this season than Wes Chandler. He runs pass routes, catches the ball in a crowd and blocks with the best of them and is the most dangerous and explosive runner I have ever coached at this position. Senior Derrick Gaffney is an excellent wide receiver who would be an all-conference type player if he weren't on the same team with Chandler. Junior Tony Stephens is a solid backup player. This is probably the strongest position on our football team.

Tackles: Senior David Forrester is a steady, consistent player who was second team All-SEC last season. We are confident he'll play winning football for us. David's twin brother, Dennis, starts out as our first team right tackle. He is a competitor who had a good spring. He doesn't have much experience but works hard and will get the job done. We lack depth and going into the season non-lettermen Ed Jacobsen and Mike Guldo are on the second unit. It's possible a freshman could get in the picture here in a hurry.

Guards: Steve Kiefer, a big 268-pound senior who has not seen much action, opened spring drills on the first unit and responded by playing like a first teamer should. If he continues this play during the season it will be a bonus we need. He is backed by junior Gary Lenard, who will also play offensive tackle. Sophomore Bill Bennet opens practice on the first team at left guard and he could be an outstanding player before he's finished. He's backed by another good young prospect in Mark Midden, who might move to right guard.

Centers: Big Mark Totten had an outstanding spring. He'll weigh in at about 290 this season and if he plays up to his ability there won't be many better centers around. His backup is junior Doug Schroeder, a fine football player who could also play guard if needed. Schroeder is very close to being a first-team type of player and we might have to find a way to get him in the lineup. Senior Larry Cline will snap on placements and punts for the fourth consecutive year.

Tight Ends: Don Swafford had a solid spring and is perhaps our best blocker at the line of scrimmage. He needs experience catching the football but we have absolute confidence in his blocking ability. Senior Lewis Gilbert is a steady player who has seen considerable action and gives us good depth.

Quarterbacks: Senior Terry LeCount is finally getting his chance to start and his speed gives us a new dimension at the position. I have never seen a QB that fast and he makes things happen by simply outrunning everybody. His passing improved during the spring and we are confident he'll be the same type of passer he was in high school, which would be exceptional. We need depth and this could come from sophomores John Brantley or Sammy Henderson or perhaps a freshman. Tony Green worked at this position in the spring and could help if needed.

Halfbacks: Our first stringers, Willie Wilder and Tony Green, could play for anybody's football team. They have outstanding speed and Green is a knuckleball sort of runner who just makes people miss him. Both can catch the ball and block extremely well. We are very happy with these two starting halfbacks. We lack depth and hope it will come from sophomores Kyle Coburn, Tony Waters and Carl Prieoleau,

along with Junior Nap Green. This is an area where freshmen might get in the picture quickly.

Fullbacks: Earl Carr had a great spring. He's got the same type quickness Jimmy DuBose had and he has sprinter's speed. He could make a big difference in our offense and return some punch to our fullback-inside running game. Sophomore Joe Portale is a rough-and-tumble, hard-nosed inside runner who will play a lot. Sophomore Bo Smith has a chance to get in the picture and could also play halfback. This is a pretty solid position at this stage.

DEFENSE:

Ends: We are in better shape than a year ago. Those totally inexperienced ends of last season have grown up and learned by playing. Seniors Richard Ruth, Robert Adkins and Steve Blair team with juniors Michael DuPree and John Spinks with Ruth and DuPree the starters. This is an improved area and it was obvious last spring.

Tackles: Last year we had to do a lot of juggling to find somebody to play opposite Darrell Carpenter, who had an outstanding senior year. Now we have to replace him and find two steady players. Best bets are senior Sylvester King and junior Melvin Flournoy. Junior Greg Tennell and sophomore Dozyier Hinton are capable and we could move sophomore Ron Coleman back to this position if needed.

playing as a down lineman. He'll be one of the nation's better middle guards. Sophomore Ron Coleman is on the second unit but could play tackle or even end if needed.



Miller Recalls Christening of UF Teams as 'Alligators'

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied

'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Fergie Ferguson Award

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967, Guy Dennis and Larry Smith in 1968, Steve Tannen in 1969, Jack Youngblood in 1970, John Reaves in 1971, Fred Abbott in 1972, David Hitchcock in 1973, Lee McGriff in 1974, Jimmy Du Bose in 1975 and Jimmy Fisher in 1976.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.







Doug Dickey joined the century club as a head coach during the 1977 season, chalking up his 100th win to go with 51 losses and six ties.

Dickey, a 1954 graduate of Florida, returned to his alma mater as head football coach on December 30, 1969 following an outstanding six-year period at Tennessee.

In 14 seasons as a head coach Dickey has produced nine bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference champions and has been named the league's coach of the year twice. His teams at Florida went to four consecutive bowls, 1973-76, and his 1975 team was the first in the history of Gator football to win nine games during the course of a regular sea-

son of play. They finished 5-1 and tied for second in the SEC.

Among active coaches Dickey ranks in the top 20 nationally in winning percentage. His track record, as player and coach, has always shown a consistency to finish in the winning role.

He came to the University of Florida as a non-scholarship football player, one of 105 in his freshman class. He earned a scholarship as a defensive back and prior to his junior season of 1952 the Gators' star quarterback, Haywood Sullivan, signed a baseball bonus with the Boston Red Sox.

Coach Bob Woodruff moved Dickey to quarterback and he led the Gators to their first-ever bowl game, a 14-13 win over Tulsa in the Gator Bowl, and a season record of 8-3.

He went on to coach Fort Carson, Colorado to a service championship and then joined the staff of Frank Broyles at Arkansas. Dickey was at Arkansas six seasons and was generally credited by Broyles as being the source of much of the rebuilding of the Razorbacks.

Dickey moved on to Tennessee in 1964 and Arkansas won the National Championship that season with a lineup dotted with his recruits.

The 1964 season at Tennessee was a rebuilding year which was followed by five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over that period of time.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickeys later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.


His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University

of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

Dickey, 45, is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don, Danny, David and Daryl, and a daughter, Jaren Ann.






DEFENSE:

Ends: Solid first team performers are there in senior co-captain Michael DuPree (6-2, 225, Tallahassee) and sophomore David Galloway (6-2, 230, Brandon). Both are proven players who excelled in the spring and either or both could wind up in the all-conference category. I really think Galloway will be an All-America defensive end before he graduates. We don't have much in the way of depth behind these two fellows. Sophomores Jim Subers (6-3, 224, Miami), Steve Tanner (6-4, 237, Cleveland, Ohio) and Steve Eisenbarth (6-5, 242, Oxon Hill, Md.) are

freshman Robin Fisher (6-0, 195, Satellite Beach) will provide depth.

Linebackers: If Scot Brantley (Jr., 6-2, 230, Ocala) and David Little (So., 6-0, 216, Miami) return at full speed this will be an extremely solid position. Bubba Pratt (Jr., 6-0, 210, Leesburg), Yancey Sutton (So., 6-1, 210, Tallahassee), Jim Kreis (Jr., 6-2, 214, Jacksonville), James Harrell (Jr., 6-1, 216, Tampa) and Tim Golden (Fr., 6-0, 213, Ft. Lauderdale) all showed last spring that they can play solid football in the SEC. We are in the best shape at linebacker since the days of Glenn Cameron, Ralph Ortega and Sammy Green back in 1973-74.

Secondary: We'll show definite improvement on the first unit but we are thinner than we would like to be going into the season. We'll start out with a first unit of corners Kyle Coburn (Jr.,

young men who could help this season. Mike Clark (6-4, 234, Graceville) was injured in the spring but, if healthy, could play as a sophomore.

Tackles: The loss of Greg Tennell and Melvin Flournoy last summer creates depth problems although we are solid on the first unit. Dozyier Hinton (Jr., 6-5, 241, Tampa) and Dock Luckie (So., 6-2, 246, Ft. Pierce) are starters with ability. Sophomores Harold Galloway (6-3, 231, Maccleony) and Steve Eisenbarth (6-5, 248, Oxon Hill, Md.) and


5-9, 192, Gainesville) and Warren Gaffney (Sr., 6-1, 206, Jacksonville) and safetyman Chuck Hatch (Jr., 5-11, 187, Branford) and Derrick Burgess (So., 6-2, 192, Brandon). Vernon James (Jr., 6-1, 190, Gainesville) started many games in 1977 and underwent knee surgery last October. His return to full speed would be a bonus for us. Skipper Peek, another '77 starter, underwent back surgery in June and is out for the season. Perhaps Jim McClellan (So., 6-2, 178, Lake City) or Bill Fiorillo (So., 5-10, 175, Coral Gables) will give us some depth.

OFFENSE:

Split Receivers: We are very thin. Tony Stephens is an all-conference type of player. Stephens (Sr., 6-0, 181, Sarasota) is a game-breaker who is probably our most consistent threat going into the season. Behind Tony, we have no experience at all. Sophomore John Smith (5-10, 172, Venice) or freshman Johnny Gaffney (6-1, 186, Jacksonville) might be able to provide some depth but they might be a year away at this point. Playing with a two-wideout offense we're going to have to come up with some more people. We'll take a look at Carl Prieleau (So., 5-8, 167, Jacksonville), Tony Waters (Jr., 5-8, 174, Sarasota) and probably Cris Collinsworth (Co., 6-4, 184, Titusville). Incoming freshmen could get in the picture in a hurry.

Tackles: Don Swafford (Sr., 6-7, 250, Dayton, Ohio) started coming into his own this spring. He's our co-captain and an all-conference type of player. Starting opposite Don will be Bill Bennek (Jr., 6-4, 240, Glen Cove, N.Y.). Our depth should come from sophomores Ron Coleman (6-3, 231, Tampa) David Mabardy (6-1, 240, Chattahoochee) and Wally Hough (6-3, 252, Tampa).

Guards: Mark Midden (Jr., 6-3, 237, Hampton, Va.) and Gary Lenard (Sr., 6-3, 245, Miami) are capable SEC players. What we need at this position





is development of young players for depth. Sophomores Jay Johnson (6-2, 240, Merritt Island), Alex Hewko (6-2, 240, Hattboro, Pa.) and Joe Wickline (6-2, 240, St. Petersburg) are the top contenders.

Centers: Top-flight first-stringer in senior Doug Schroeder (6-2, 245, Merritt Island). Good depth available in Ray Lawrence (So., 6-2, 226, Port St. Joe) and Matt Morrill (Jr., 6-2, 242, Miami). We're in good enough shape here to play Schroeder at guard some without weakening our total picture.

Tight Ends: Juan Collins (Jr., 6-2, 202, Hollywood) is a fine receiver and a key man on our football team. He'll also be available to play wide receiver if sophomore Van Jones (6-4, 235, Bradenton) and Junior Bill Bell (6-2, 210, Wheaton, Md.) perform as we expect.

Quarterbacks: Sophomore Tim Groves is our starting quarterback going into fall practice. He's an outstanding athlete who gives us a good run-pass balance. Groves (6-1, 187, Orlando) will get competition from John Brant-

ley (Jr., 5-10, 175, Ocala), sophomore Larry Ochab (5-10, 180, Orlando) and perhaps freshman Tyrone Young (6-5, 182, Ocala). We could wind up with a two-quarterback system such as we used with Don Gaffney and Jimmy Fisher in 1974.

Running Backs: Cris Collinsworth, Terry Williams (So., 5-10, 199, Frost-proof), Tony Waters and David Johnson (So., 5-11, 204, St. Augustine) were our best runners in the spring. We will determine what combination to go with during fall practices. Solid depth is possible at fullback with Tony Robinson (Jr., 6-0, 227, Lake City) and Joe Portale (Jr., 6-2, 230, N. Olmstead, Ohio). How we wind up looking will be determined, in part, by


whether or not Collinsworth and/or Waters play at a split receiver position. Freshmen like Calvin Davis (5-10, 185, Winter Haven), Shannon Burch (5-11, 180, Bartow) and Mike Ricketts (6-0, 195, Cinneminson, N.J.) could figure in quickly.


Kicking Game: Berj Yepremian (Sr., 5-6, 155, Miami) was 12x15 on field goal attempts in 1977. He was 10x11 inside the 50-yard-line and his only misses were from 44, 56 and 59 yards away. He was 28x28 on PATs. Sophomore Brian Clark (6-1, 184, Sarasota) kicked well in the spring and will compete with Yepremian. Our best punter appears to be walk-on Bill Conover

(So., 6-1, 178, Valparaiso, Ind.), who had a good spring and gets the ball away quickly. We feel pretty good about our kicking game.

All-Star Candidates: Although we are primarily a "no-name team" going into the season we do have a few players who deserve pre-season consideration. Scot Brantley was an All-SEC linebacker in 1977 as a sophomore and he should rank with the nation's best this season. Don Swafford is a most outstanding offensive tackle. Tony Stephens (split end), David Galloway (defensive end) and Michael DuPree (defensive end) deserve consideration, also.

Gator All Americans

Miller Recalls Christening of UF Teams as Alligators

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied

'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'

Fergie Ferguson Award

The Forest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of Florida's finest athletes, one of the great all-time ends to wear the uniform of the Fighting Gators. The Award is made annually in the form of a beautiful trophy, which remains in the permanent possession of the University of Florida, and is given to the football player selected as the Gator's most valuable senior each year. The winning player is announced at the annual spring banquet, and he is then invited to return to the campus to receive the award at the following Homecoming.

First to win the award was Malcolm Hammack, outstanding fullback on the 1954 eleven. Others were Center Steve DeLaTorre of the 1955 squad, and Larry Wesley, tackle on the 1956 team, Jim Rountree, 1957 halfback, Jimmy Dunn, 1958 quarterback, Asa Cox, 1959 guard, Pat Patchen and Vic Miranda, 1960, Jim Beaver in 1961, Sam Holland in 1962, Jimmy Morgan and Hagood Clarke in 1963, Larry Dupree in 1964, Charles Casey in 1965, Steve Spurrier in 1966, Richard Trapp in 1967, Guy Dennis and Larry Smith in 1968, Steve Tannen in 1969, Jack Youngblood in 1970, John Reaves in 1971, Fred Abbott in 1972, David Hitchcock in 1973, Lee McGriff in 1974, Jimmy Du Bose in 1975, Jimmy Fisher in 1976 and Wes Chandler in 1977.

About Fergie Ferguson

Fergie came to Florida in the fall of 1938 after having been a star end for the Stuart (Fla.) High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and from that time wrote several records into the books. Fergie was also a track and boxing star, and his javelin throw of 203 feet, 6½ inches won him a National AAU championship in 1942. Fergie became a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing of 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of war wounds ten years after the landing.

WILLIAM CURTIS (BILL) CARR

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS, UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA



Bill Carr, a dynamic young leader who worked his way up through the ranks in the Gator athletic program, assumed duties as Director of Athletics at the University of Florida on March 15, 1979.

Carr served as a graduate assistant football coach at Florida in 1970-71 and joined the staff full-time in April of 1972 as academic advisor and junior varsity assistant coach.

He turned to athletic administration in 1974, and was named assistant to Athletic Director Ray Graves. In 1976, he was named assistant athletic director, working primarily with spring sports budgeting, scheduling, facility maintenance and athletic eligibility.

Carr, in his own words, best describes his former position as "the nuts and bolts man in the organization."

Carr was a first string All-America center for Florida in 1966. He started 32 consecutive games for the Gators, playing in the 1965 Sugar Bowl and the 1966 Orange Bowl. He was offensive captain of the 1966 team and was on the taxi squad of the New Orleans Saints in 1967.

An ROTC commissioned officer, Carr spent 1968-69 in the Army, serving in Korea for one year.

Carr was born in Gainesville on Nov. 29, 1945. He attended elementary school in Vero Beach and high school in Pensacola, the son of a Baptist minister moving around to various churches. He graduated from Florida with a BA in Spanish (1967) and an MA in Education Administration (1971). He is married to the former Jan Jackson and they have two sons, Jason (8), Scott (6) and a daughter, Julie (3).

Carr is an elder in the Community Evangelical Free Church.

CHARLEY PELL

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH, UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

Charles Byron (Charley) Pell, 38-year-old native of Albertville, Ala., was named head football coach at the University of Florida on Dec. 4, 1978.

Pell, Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-Of-The-Year in both 1977 and 1978, took over the Gator reins following two consecutive outstanding teams at Clemson, bringing a reputation as a man who loves the challenge of turning collegiate football programs around.

His first Clemson team finished 8-2-1 and went to the Gator Bowl in 1977. The Tigers had finished 3-6-2 the previous season and had only one winning team in the eight years prior to '77.

In 1978 Clemson was 10-1, captured the ACC title and returned to the Gator Bowl. That team finished ranked sixth in the nation and wound up fifth in the NCAA statistical charts in both scoring and defense against scoring.

Pell's 1978 coaching effort resulted in his being named District III Coach-Of-The-Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

Pell is a hard-working, rugged competitor whose only speed is full-speed. He went to the University of Alabama as a 180-pound halfback who had played only one year of high school football. He wound up starting for three years at offensive and defensive tackle (1960-62) and was a member of the Tide's 1961 National Championship team. He also played in the Orange, Sugar and Bluebonnet bowls.

Following graduation he served as a graduate assistant coach on Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant's 1964 Alabama team, was defensive line coach at Kentucky (1965-68), head coach at Jacksonville State (1969-73), assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Virginia Tech (1974-75), a position he also held at Clemson in 1976.

At Jacksonville State, Pell inherited a losing team and turned it into a small college power which finished second in the nation in 1970 while posting a 10-0 record and beating Florida A&M in the Orange Blossom Classic. His overall record at JSU was 33-13-1.

Pell was Coach-Of-The-Year in the State of Alabama in both 1970 and 1973, and was runner-up for Division II national coach honors following the 1970 season.

He holds a BS degree from Alabama (1964). He married the former Ward Noel of Lexington, Kentucky on Feb. 1, 1969, and they have a son, Carrick, who was born March 1, 1970.

Pell was born Feb. 27, 1941 in Albertville, Ala.

1979 GATOR OUTLOOK

You get the impression that new Gator Head Football Coach Charley Pell has a completely open mind about just which players might wind up on his first team.

One of his most difficult tasks following spring practice, for example, was picking a three-deep lineup for the media to use in pre-season evaluations.

"While some players are clearly ahead of others at this point, we expect significant changes as a result of the long offseason," Pell says. "The word 'starter' is not in our vocabulary and the word 'first team' would apply only to the first day of fall practice.

"The strength of our football team will be determined by how many young football players challenge seriously for first team status. We're going on performance, not potential. The individual development of athletes over the last five months will be the key. If some of our better athletes put in enough offseason work, they can come back in the fall and be exceptional players.

"However, we're going to go with whoever is playing better. These will be our first team players."

Pell's list of the most significantly improved areas include (1) defensive secondary, (2) inside running game and (3) defensive front seven.

The energetic Gator head man, however, still feels unsettled about his quarterback situation and lack of depth at virtually every position, this being the reason he is so concerned over individual improvement in the offseason.

Individuals who would have to rate as pre-season candidates for all star recognition include linebackers Scot Brantley and David Little, defensive linemen David Galloway and Dock Luckie, defensive backs Chuck Hatch and Juan Collins, offensive linemen Harold Galloway, Bill Bennek and Joe Wickline and wide receiver Cris Collinsworth.

"We have outstanding first team linebackers in Brantley and Little," says Pell. "These two could line up with most anybody's pair at this position, and we have confidence they will both perform exceptionally well."

Quarterback has remained a questionable position after spring injuries eliminated veterans John Brantley and Tim Croves, both of whom should return in the fall to challenge Larry Ochab, James McClellan and Tyrone Young.


"We have a five-man race going with no idea who the first-teamer will be next season," Pell says. "Each player has some things he can do very well."

The Gator kicking game should be sound with veteran punter Bill Conover and sophomore place-

kicker Brian Clark, plus incoming freshman Donnie Van Wie.

The return game could be exciting with the versatile Collinsworth, who ranked among the nation's leaders in kickoff returns last season, and sophomore speedster Curt Garrett.

The Gators return 45 lettermen from last season's 4-7 team which tied for fourth place in the Southeastern Conference.



All-SEC Linebacker Scot Brantley





UNIVERSITY FACTS



GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida, located in Gainesville, is a co-educational state university and land-grant college with a faculty of 2,500 and a student body of 31,000. The physical plant is valued at more than \$300 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

The University has conferred more than 125,000 degrees since its founding. There are 5,000 individual courses offered providing 90 areas of instructional specialization for undergraduates and more than 50 specialties for doctoral degrees.

Tracing its beginning to 1853 (founding date of the East Florida Seminary, one of six state-supported institutions consolidated in 1905 to form the University of Florida), classes on the present campus first were held in 1906.

There have been seven presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John F. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67), Dr. Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-73) and Dr. Robert Q. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

Encompassing 16 colleges and three schools, the University offers programs ranging from general to highly specialized education. It is unique in that all of its colleges are located on a single campus where the professional skills represented in the various departments can combine for interdisciplinary work.

SERVICE

In addition to numerous research projects in the colleges, the University has specialized laboratories carrying on continuous basic research in engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, public administration, architecture, building construction and other areas which make significant contributions to private industry and government agencies.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. The expansion program provides space for the College of Dentistry.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences is the University's statewide agricultural research and educational organization. Its purpose is accomplished through 18 departments and the School of Forest Resources and Conservation in Gainesville and the efforts of 22 research and education centers throughout the state.

The Division of Continuing Education enables the University to be responsive to the varied and changing needs of Florida's citizens. Last year 80,000 people obtained educational opportunities through credit, non-credit and special programs of the division.

PRESS, RADIO & TV

ENTRANCE TO PRESS BOX

Enter through glass doors located midway at base of West Stands (press box side of the field). Elevator goes to the various decks in the press box.

PRESS BOX LEVELS

There are four levels in the press box: (1) President's Deck, which houses a lounge for the University President and his guests; (2) Radio Deck, which houses home and visiting networks, plus a VIP area; (3) Working Press Deck; and (4) Photo Deck.

WORKING PRESS DECK

Reserved for print media and statistical and scoreboard operation. Telecopier service available via SportsComm. Make arrangements for your telephone through Southern Bell in Gainesville. We will furnish play-by-play, individual and team stats and coaches' quotes.

PHOTO DECK

Reserved for electronic media and two coaches' telephone booths.

CREDENTIALS

Requests for working press and photo passes will be honored from SPORTS EDITORS of DAILY newspapers and TV SPORTS DIRECTORS ONLY. Make request directly to NORM CARLSON, preferably a week in advance. Spouses, dates, non-workers and children will not be permitted in the working press area.

PRIORITY: Print Media — (1) Daily newspapers with Sunday editions; (2) Official school newspaper, maximum of two per daily; (3) Other approved special coverage (magazines, etc.).

Electronic Media — (1) Press and TV working photographers; (2) Coaches game films, TV shows; (3) Approved special coverage (magazines, etc.).

NOTE: In accordance with SEC regulations, armbands must be worn on sidelines. No free-lance photographers will be allowed, nor any radio stations except the two originating networks.



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1980 GATOR OUTLOOK

If your living depended on making an accurate forecast of what the Florida football team might accomplish in 1980 you would most certainly be in a precarious position.

There are areas which appear to be very solid, such as the defensive front five, wide receivers, tight ends and running backs. There are game-breaking athletes available in flanker Cris Collinsworth, fullback James Jones, tight end Chris Faulkner and tailbacks Doug Kellom, Derald Williams and Johnell Brown.

These are positive aspects, but there are many areas which are far from ready for Southeastern Conference competition. Quarterback is totally up for grabs, only one linebacker is of proven SEC-calibre, the defensive secondary contains only one veteran, the punting game is questionable and depth in the offensive line is a source of concern.

"We are farthest from being ready in the defensive secondary, at quarterback and our punting game," says Head Coach Charley Pell. "We've made progress in every area but we aren't ready in some areas."

Florida's offense should be improved over last season. The new "run-and-gun" attack showed promise in the spring and could become potent if a quarterback steps forward. The Gators will throw the football often in 1980 and have excellent targets in Collinsworth, Faulkner, split end Spencer Jackson and all of the running backs.

The offensive line is built around 6-3, 270-pound tackle Joe Wickline and features good young players in tackle Dan Fike (6-6, 250), guard Dan Plonk (6-2, 242) and center John Redmond (6-2, 237), all sophomores.

Faulkner, 6-5, 248-pound sophomore, has potential greatness at tight end. He tied for the SEC lead in TD receptions as a freshman, is an outstanding receiver and a hard-nosed blocker.

The key to the offense is Collinsworth, two-time All-SEC performer and pre-season All-America, a 6-4, 192-pounder who runs the 40 in 4.4 and can run, throw and catch the football with exceptional skill. He will be used to do all three, plus return kicks, in 1980.

The sophomore running backs need only experience, they have the talent. Jones is a 6-3, 235-pound fullback with 4.6 speed, having moved to the position from tight end. He is backed by a good senior two-year-letterman in Terry Williams.

The tailback race is almost even between sophomores Kellom (5-8, 190), Derald Williams (5-11, 212) and Brown (5-10, 188). All three are good players.

Florida's defensive line is big, mobile and experienced. The ends are Tim Golden, 6-2, 220, and either Yancey Sutton, 6-2, 223, or Val Brown, 6-4, 219. There is size and talent at tackle with David Galloway, 6-3, 272, and Dock Luckie, 6-2, 264. Nose Guard Robin Fisher is an all-star candidate, 6-0, 229, and the team's leading tackler in 1979 with 110, including seven sacks.

Senior David Little is a solid all-star linebacking candidate, but is the only proven linebacker at this point. He will be joined by sophomore Fernando Jackson on the opening day first-team when practice begins.





UNIVERSITY FACTS

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida, located in Gainesville, is a co-educational state university and land-grant college with a faculty of 2,500 and a student body of 31,000. The physical plant is valued at more than \$300 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

The University has conferred more than 125,000 degrees since its founding. There are 5,000 individual courses offered providing 90 areas of instructional specialization for undergraduates and more than 50 specialties for doctoral degrees.

Tracing its beginning to 1853 (founding date of the East Florida Seminary, one of six state-supported institutions consolidated in 1905 to form the University of Florida), classes on the present campus first were held in 1906.

There have been seven presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-20), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67), Dr. Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-73) and Dr. Robert Q. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

Encompassing 16 colleges and three schools, the University offers programs ranging from general to highly specialized education. It is unique in that all of its colleges are located on a single campus where the professional skills represented in the various departments can combine for interdisciplinary work.

SERVICE

In addition to numerous research projects in the colleges, the University has specialized laboratories carrying on continuous basic research in engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, public administration, architecture, building construction and other areas which make significant contributions to private industry and government agencies.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. The expansion program provides space for the College of Dentistry.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences is the University's statewide agricultural research and educational organization. Its purpose is accomplished through 18 departments and the School of Forest Resources and Conservation in Gainesville and the efforts of 22 research and education centers throughout the state.

The Division of Continuing Education enables the University to be responsive to the varied and changing needs of Florida's citizens. Last year 80,000 people obtained educational opportunities through credit, non-credit and special programs of the division.

WORKING PRESS DECK

Reserved for print media and statistical and scoreboard operation. Teletypewriter service available. Make arrangements for your telephone through Southern Bell in Gainesville. We will furnish play-by-play, individual and team stats and coaches' quotes.

PHOTO DECK

Reserved for electronic media and two coaches' telephone booths.

CREDENTIALS

Requests for working press and photo passes will be honored from SPORTS EDITORS of DAILY newspapers and TV SPORTS DIRECTORS ONLY. Make request directly to NORM CARLSON, preferably a week in advance. Spouses, dates, non-workers and children will not be permitted in the working press area.

PRIORITY: Print Media — (1) Daily newspapers with Sunday editions; (2) Official school newspaper, maximum of two per daily; (3) Other approved special coverage (magazines, etc.).

Electronic Media — (1) Press and TV working photographers; (2) Coaches game films, TV shows; (3) Approved special coverage (magazines, etc.). NOTE: In accordance with SEC regulations, armbands must be worn on sidelines. No free-lance photographers will be allowed, nor any radio stations except the two originating networks.

1981 GATOR OUTLOOK

In 1980 Florida football closed the gap on programs generally regarded as prime Southeastern Conference title contenders each year. In 1981 Coach Charley Pell hopes to gain more ground in the nation's top football league.

"Our schedule is demanding in a conference which has produced the national champion three of the last four years," says Pell. "Our team will be improved, but so will our opposition. We are in the process of closing the gap between us and being a solid contender."

Pell regards the Gator strong areas as the corps of receivers and quarterbacks. The "soft" spots, as he likes to describe areas which need priority treatment, include the offensive line, defensive secondary, punting and developing depth.

"We need growth and development in a young offensive line," he says. "In this regard we must improve our running attack. The secondary gained some ground in the spring but we are by no means solid in that area."

"We lack depth in most spots and our posture in the league will be determined by the progress our veterans made in the summer off-season of conditioning and strength building, and the success of freshmen coming in and helping us early."

Offensively, the Gators feature an outstanding one-two quarterback punch in sophomore Wayne Peace and junior Bob Hewko, with solid reserves in sophomores Mark Massey and Dale Dorminey. The receivers are talented and deep in juniors Tyrone Young and Spencer Jackson and sophomores Dwayne Dixon and Broughton Lang. Tight end is a strong position with all-SEC performer Chris Faulkner backed by big Mike Mularkey and Bob Kurzu.

Fullback James Jones, the team's leading rusher in 1980, is a pre-season all-conference choice who ranks as one of the nation's premier fullbacks. He will be backed up by junior Shannon Burch and senior Calvin Davis, who will also play tailback. Others in the tailback picture are juniors Johnell Brown, Derald Williams and freshmen Lorenzo Hampton and Greg Bain.

The offensive line will be young. Sophomores Russell Gallon, Buddy Schultheis, Andy Smith, Jon Moyle, Gary Ellis, Preston Roberts and John Hunt will be counted on for heavy duty. They will join juniors Danny Fike, Dan Plonk and John Redmond.

Florida's defense is anchored around pre-season All-America tackle David Galloway, a superb athlete at 6-2½, 283 pounds. He is in his fourth season as a starter and has been named the pre-season choice as the

SEC's top defensive lineman.

Galloway gets help in the defensive interior from an exceptional 240-pound nose guard, Robin Fisher, and tackle John Whittaker, a 250-pound senior converted from second team nose guard in the spring.

Outside linebacker Wilber Marshall is a new name to note. The 230-pound sophomore has the potential for stardom. He joins veterans Val Brown, Lawrence Patrick and fellow sophs Randy Clark and Charlie Kerr as top candidates for playing time.

Fernando Jackson and Tom Wiegmann return at inside linebacker, and help is needed in this area in a hurry. Such is the case in the secondary, also, with young players having an opportunity to play quickly.

Juniors Kyle Knight, Bruce Vaughan, Ivory Curry and Sonny Gilliam will be joined by sophomores Tony Lilly, Roger Sibbald and Vito McKeever as the top contenders for defensive backfield positions.

The placekicking game is very good with pre-season All-SEC choice Brian Clark, leading Gator scorer the past two seasons. Punting will be up for grabs with Villanova transfer Joe Borajkiewicz expected to get the nod.

MILLER RECALLS CHRISTENING OF UF TEAMS AS ALLIGATORS

Reprinted from Florida Times-Union, August 2, 1948

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'"

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head.

"With the first display of the new banners and pennants in Gainesville, the name 'Alligators' to describe the football team 'caught on' Miller recalled and, now contracted to 'Gator.'"





UNIVERSITY FACTS

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida, located in Gainesville, is a co-educational state university and land-grant college with a faculty of 2,500 and a student body of 31,000. The physical plant is valued at more than \$300 million and includes more than 700 buildings on 2,000 acres.

The University has conferred more than 125,000 degrees since its founding. There are 5,000 individual courses offered providing 90 areas of instructional specialization for undergraduates and more than 50 specialties for doctoral degrees.

Tracing its beginning to 1853 (founding date of the East Florida Seminary, one of six state-supported institutions consolidated in 1905 to form the University of Florida), classes on the present campus first were held in 1906.

There have been seven presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reliz (1955-67), Dr. Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-73) and Dr. Robert Q. Marston (1974-).

COLLEGES

Encompassing 16 colleges and three schools, the University offers programs ranging from general to highly specialized education. It is unique in that all of its colleges are located on a single campus where the professional skills represented in the various departments can combine for interdisciplinary work.

SERVICE

In addition to numerous research projects in the colleges, the University has specialized laboratories carrying on continuous basic research in engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, public administration, architecture, building construction and other areas which make significant contributions to private industry and government agencies.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. The expansion program provides space for the College of Dentistry.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences is the University's statewide agricultural research and educational organization. Its purpose is accomplished through 18 departments and the School of Forest Resources and Conservation in Gainesville and the efforts of 22 research and education centers throughout the state.

The Division of Continuing Education enables the University to be responsive to the varied and changing needs of Florida's citizens. Last year 80,000 people obtained educational opportunities through credit, non-credit and special programs of the division.

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



Gator Outlook

Coach Charley Pell's Analysis Of Spring Practice And The 1982 Outlook For The Florida Gators

Schedule and General Review

"We'll be a good team in 1982. How good depends on how far we come and if we can manage to peak in September. How we manage September is important with three of the nation's Top Ten-type teams on the schedule in Miami, Southern California and Mississippi State. The schedule demands that we peak early.

"That September schedule is like playing with dynamite. It's very dangerous. We've got to focus on the challenge we're faced with. If we understand that challenge, the rest will take care of itself.

"It's obvious to me: Being good isn't enough. That's been proven time and again at Florida. It takes more than being good. Florida has been good several times over the years, but it's never won the championship.

"If everyone understands that, the other things will take care of themselves. But if we spend too much time wondering how good we are, we'll be singing the same old song of three generations of Gators.

"We're not ready to jump up and down for joy in every area but this was the best spring football practice we've had of the four here at Florida. We wanted to develop mental toughness, improve the running game, find positions where our young players could best help this football team and have solid competition in every area. I was satisfied with what we accomplished in these areas."

Defensive Front

"The thing that has to happen, and we can't do anything about it 'til the 1982 season, is the aging of our defensive line. Roy Harris is the only one of the front three on course going into fall practice. Our other tackle, John Whittaker, is behind because of a hamstring pull he had this spring. Tim Newton and Ricky Williams, our sophomore nose guards, are going to be good, but they're not good now and the same goes for Alton Jones at tackle. We lost an All-America tackle in David Galloway and a three-year starter at nose guard in Robin Fisher. It's a fact of life: Our three down people are not as good as last year's three today. They are not ready to play in the SEC at this point."

Running Game

"We got better and more consistent at the line of scrimmage under the direction of our new offensive line coach Phil Maggio. Nowhere on the squad is the high level of competition more evident than it is here. Sophomore Lorenzo Hampton had an impressive spring showing at tailback and Derald Williams showed us he can play in the league at fullback. James Jones was outstanding, as he always is, giving us as fine a play at fullback as there is in our conference."

Mental Toughness

"That was the key part of the spring. Over and

over, we put the ball on the 30-yard line and worked the offense going in, worked the defense on keeping them out. That's where the game is. That's where it's won or lost on Saturday. The long scrimmages (several over four hours in duration) caused some fatigue, but fatigue lets the real man show. The results satisfied us."

Quarterbacks

"We have the quality of athlete and experience and some depth at this position. This could be one of the strongest positions on our football team. Wayne Peace is already third in Florida history in total offense and passing and he has only played a little over one and one-half seasons. He is a poised, solid player. Bob Hewko has shown what he can accomplish when healthy and we have every confidence in the world in his ability to find the open receiver and get him the football, and to run the team. Roger Sibbald had an outstanding spring and is capable of stepping in and certainly will compete for playing time. We are pleased with this position. Dale Dorminey is another prospect here who has shown some very good things at times."

Wide Receivers

"Tyrone Young had a good spring, his blocking was much improved. Spencer Jackson has proved he can play and win in the conference and he is a steady performer. Dwayne Dixon is close, he makes the tough catch. Bee Lang, Gary Rolie and Howard Akers are in the fight for playing time. Although we were disappointed in our passing game last spring it was probably due to so much practice field emphasis on the running attack. We are very confident this will be a strong area for us in 1982."

Competition

"Easily the best since we've been at Florida. For example, there are positions where two players are dead-even after spring practice . . . Chris Faulkner and Mike Mularkey at tight end, Tim Newton and Ricky Williams at nose guard, Spencer Jackson and Dwayne Dixon at wide receiver. There are other positions where competition is very close, like defensive tackle with John Whittaker and Roy Harris challenged by Alton Jones, offense line with Ryan Fraser, Jon Moyle, Russell Gallon, Dan Plonk, Phil Bromley and Lomas Brown all very much in the fight for a first team job." (NOTE: First unit offensive line at conclusion of spring drills included tackles Dan Fike and Gary Ellis, guards John Hunt and Buddy Schultheis and center Doug Smith.)

Kicking Game

"We've still got a way to go here. Roger Sibbald, from what we saw in the spring, is the punter but he's the only punter we saw who appeared even close to being able to perform in our league. We have not decided on a placekicker and go into fall practice with that decision to make."

Linebackers

"Wilber Marshall is a big-play man, a certain all-star candidate at outside linebacker. We think Fernando Jackson, who plays bigger than he is, might be the best small linebacker around. Tom Wiegmann is a steady senior who makes very few errors. We lack depth and experience at linebackers and this is a concern. Fred McCallister can help us in the middle and Val Brown and Lawrence Patrick are veterans outside, but we need newcomers to come along quickly both inside and outside at linebacker. Somebody has got to step forward if we are to be solid in these areas."

Secondary

"Rehabilitation of injured players will play a major role here. We had Vito McKeever and Victor Bradley both out of spring practice after knee surgery. Kyle Knight missed the spring after an auto accident. Ivory Curry had emergency stomach surgery in June. How much these players can bounce will have a big influence on how good we can be back there. Tom Lilly is one of the finest safetymen anywhere in college football and Sonny Gilliam had an excellent spring at strong safety. Bruce Vaughan is a heady senior with a knack for getting around the football. Ricky Easmon had his moments in the spring, as did Scott Marshall and Randy Clark. Linzey Smith was out much of the spring but had a few solid days. We will just have to wait and see how the pieces fit together this fall."



Fergie Ferguson Award

The Forrest K. (Fergie) Ferguson Award is given in memory of one of the all-time great athletes at Florida. It goes annually to the senior football player voted as the most valuable by his fellow lettermen.

Ferguson enrolled at Florida in 1938, after having been an outstanding football end, track, basketball and baseball player at Stuart High School. He became a starting end for the Gators as a sophomore, and wrote several pass receiving records into the books, all of which remained standing until the pro-style passing era of the 1960s.

He was also a collegiate track and boxing champion, and his javelin throw of 203-6½ won the National AAU title in 1942.

Fergie entered the Army in 1942 as a second lieutenant, and was severely wounded in the Normandy landing in 1944. He so distinguished himself that he was awarded the nation's highest medal for gallantry in action. He died of those war wounds 10 years later.

Alligator Nickname Dates Back To 1907

Reprinted from Florida Times-Union, August 2, 1948

"A Jacksonville lawyer 'christened' the University of Florida's football team 41 years ago when he gave a pennant-designing firm in Charlottesville, Va., the suggestion of 'The Alligators.'

"Austin Miller, who has practiced law here since shortly after his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1910, yesterday recalled the circumstances surrounding the choice of a name for Florida University's athletic teams. It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville had fielded its first team.

"Miller, a native of Gainesville, was enrolled in the University of Virginia at the time and was visited by his father, Phillip Miller, a Gainesville merchant. The elder Miller, who died nine years ago, then owned and operated a combination drug store and stationery store in Gainesville, a popular rendezvous for university students.

"While in Charlottesville the father decided to order some pennants and banners for the University of Florida from the Michie Company, which was engaged in the manufacture of such items. The Millers went to the firm, where they were shown samples of pennants which featured the Yale bulldog, the Princeton tiger and other school emblems. When the manager asked for Florida's emblem, the Millers realized, the new school had none.

"Austin Miller said the name 'Alligators' occurred to him as a suitable emblem, both because the Michie manager said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state. 'I had no idea it would stick, or even be popular with the student body,' Miller said. 'We wanted to get the Michie firm started on the pennants as quickly as possible, though, so they would be available in time for the opening of the 1908 school term.

"The Michie manager complicated the 'christening' when he told young Miller he'd never seen an alligator and didn't believe he could design one. The law student volunteered to find a suitable picture of a 'gator. After much search, he said, he located a picture of one in the library of the University of Virginia.

"The first appearance of the alligator emblem, Miller recalled, was in his father's Gainesville store in 1908. The Michie firm had supplied 'Miller's' with the blue banners measuring six by three feet, showing a large orange alligator, and also with several different types of smaller banners and pennants. Some of them showed the alligator lying down, some rampant, while others included only the alligator's head."

Otis Boggs, who retired after the 1981 season after 42 years as the Gator play-by-play announcer, will continue on the radio team in 1982 on the post-game show.

Color commentary on this year's broadcast will again be handled by Fred Abbott. Bob Leach directs the on-air activity and teams with Norm Carlson to host the post-game show.

David Steele, a native of Jacksonville who went on to become North Carolina Sportscaster of the Year, was chosen from a field of over 300 applicants as Network Coordinator for the University of Florida athletics.

As such, Steele will handle play-by-play for Gator football on a 65-station network and basketball and emcee the television play-back shows in both sports.

Steele, 29, was sports director in the nation's 34th market at WLOS-TV in Asheville, N.C. from 1977-80. He was selected by Gator Athletic Director Bill Carr from a list of applicants which included an NFL play-by-play announcer, four from the NBA, two announcers from the largest sports entertainment cable system in the nation and several who did college regional play-by-play accounts for ABC-TV.

"David has demonstrated excellence in broadcasting in radio, television and play-by-play in both football and basketball," said Carr. "We are tremendously impressed with his personal and professional qualities and background and knowledge of the Southeastern Conference."

Steele was born in Jacksonville in 1953 and lived in Knoxville, Tenn. for 10 years. He attended Carson-Newman College on a baseball scholarship and graduated from the University of Georgia in 1975. He was sports director at WJHG-TV in Panama City from 1975-77.

"This is one of the finest play-by-play opportunities in the nation," said Steele. "The position is unique in college athletics but Florida has a model program in this area, one which many schools will copy. I'm excited about the challenge."

Steele has done the football and basketball radio network play-by-play for Western Carolina University the past two seasons, does Southern Conference television play-by-play, covered the 1980 Winter Olympics and the NASCAR circuit.

He and his wife, Sally, have two children, David (3) and Kate (6 months).





THE FLORIDA GATORS: The birth of a nickname

A Jacksonville lawyer, Austin Miller, christened the University of Florida football team 75 years ago when he gave a pennant designing firm in Charlottesville, Virginia the suggestion of "The Alligators."

It happened in the fall of 1907, a year after the University of Gainesville, as it was called back then, fielded its first team.

The first appearance of the alligator emblem was in Miller's father's Gainesville stationery-drug store in 1908. The pennants made were blue banners measuring six by three feet showing a large orange alligator.

Austin Miller said the name "Alligators" occurred to him as a suitable emblem because the designing firm said no other school had adopted it and because the alligator was native to this state.

Florida Gator Assistant Coaches

Assistant Coach, **CONNIE JO ISRAEL**

Connie Jo Israel begins her third season as an assistant coach for the Florida gymnastics team. She contributes to the Gator program in many ways, especially in the areas of musical composition, floor exercise choreography and artistic creativity. Israel is no stranger to Coach Ernestine Weaver, who coached the Ames, Iowa native and her Clarion State teammates to back-to-back AIAW National Championship titles in 1976 and 1977, while Israel was an undergraduate. Following her graduation from Clarion State in 1977, with a bachelors degree in elementary education, Israel served as an assistant to Weaver for one year at her alma mater, before moving on to Indiana State as an assistant coach for a single season. During the 1979-80 academic year, Israel toured Europe, spending most of her time in France.

Israel enjoyed a highly-successful gymnastics career as an undergraduate. In 1976, she won the AIAW National Championship All-Around and Balance Beam individual crowns, as her Clarion State team won the first of its two national championships (University Division II). In 1977, as a senior, Israel won the AIAW National title in floor exercise, and in her second year as captain, again helped her squad to win the national team championship. Israel received the Broderick Award in 1977, as the nation's most outstanding collegiate gymnast, and as a member of the 1977 USA team, she placed seventh in the world on the uneven parallel bars at the World University Games.

During the 1982 USA-USSR national tour, Israel served as a production assistant, and held a similar position at the 1982 USOC's National Sports Festival for both artistic and rhythmic gymnastics.

Ms. Israel holds a master's degree in physical education from Indiana State ('79). In addition to her coaching duties at Florida, Israel, like Coach Weaver, is a member of the College of Health and Physical Education faculty.




Graduate Assistant Coach, **NGOZI MENSAH**

Ngozi ("Ozzie") Mensah is in his first year as a graduate assistant coach for the Gators' gymnastics program, but is no newcomer to the sport.

Born in Farnborough, England, and raised in White Plains, New York, the 31-year-old Mensah moved to Tanzania, East Africa, at the age of nine. He remained there, attending Rift Valley Academy in Kijabe, Kenya, playing soccer, tennis, rugby and track, before returning to the United States in 1969 to attend Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minn., where he also started his gymnastics coaching in 1971.

"Ozzie" served as an assistant coach at Gustavus Adolphus from 1971-73, and then coached the Mini-Hops Gymnastics Club in Minneapolis from 1973-75. In addition to coaching at numerous camps and clinics, Mensah coached at the Chace School of Gymnastics from 1976-81, in West Palm Beach, the club that Florida freshman Marie Egan attended.

Mensah is currently a chemistry major at Florida, who is working towards a degree in pre-medicine.


Jim Weaver begins his ninth year of active involvement with women's collegiate gymnastics. His first five years in the sport, he served as assistant coach and administrative assistant.

Now entering his fourth season at Florida, Weaver serves as the administrative assistant and coordinates recruiting, scheduling, travel and fund-raising, as well as promotions, and serves as the announcer at all home competitions.

Weaver has extensive experience as a meet director in the sport of gymnastics. Last season, he served as the meet director for the USA-USSR International Competition in the O'Connell Center. He also served as meet director for the USA Olympic Finals Trials for men and women in 1980. That same year, Weaver was also the administrative assistant for the USA National Team Tour of the United States.

Weaver has also been the meet director for the past two years for the Sunshine State Games, held at Florida's O'Connell Center, as well as the AIAW and NCAA regional championships. In 1977 and 1979, Weaver was the meet director for the USA World University Games Finals Trials for women, as he was for the 1981 International Mixed Pairs Championships.

Weaver has coordinated, promoted and directed two USA National Exhibitions to promote the sport of gymnastics in his community.

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MEDIA AND PRESS BOX INFORMATION

The University of Florida Athletic Department is very pleased to supply the press with information publication on the 1983 Florida football team and program. We hope this will answer many of your questions throughout the next few months. We sincerely appreciate your tremendous interest in the Florida football program and we hope to do all we can to meet your needs throughout the course of the coming season. This guide will be supplemented with weekly materials throughout the year. The following information should be helpful in the event you are assigned to cover the Gators at Florida Field this year.

ENTRANCE TO PRESS BOX: Enter the Press Box via the Press Elevator that is located midway at the base of the West Stand (press box side of the field). This elevator will go to all levels of the press operations. The "Press Call Windows" will be located in the press elevator lobby at street level. We are currently undergoing construction designed to provide the ultimate in working press facilities so please bear with us. All construction should be completed in time for the 1984 season.

PRESS BOX LEVELS: There are seven levels in the Florida Field Press Box: 1) President's Deck which houses a lounge for the University President and his guests; 2) Bull Gator Club; 3) Working Press Deck - print media; 4) Coaches' Booths, Television Networks, Home and Visiting Radio Networks; 5) Photo Deck; 6) Luxury Box Level; 7) Lower Box Level.

WORKING PRESS DECK: This level is reserved for print media, and statistical and scoreboard operations. **Teletypewriter Service** is available on a first-come first-serve basis. We suggest that you let us know in advance what your needs in this area might be on game day. **Telephone orders** should be placed directly with Southern Bell in Gainesville. Contact Norm Carlson in the SID office regarding telephones and data on shared phones or reduced cost private arrangements. We strongly urge you to make sure your phone needs are met prior to game day. The SID Office phones are used for in-game and post-game reports as well as handling the teletypewriter service thus limiting their availability to the media.

GUIDELINES: The University of Florida follows NCAA and SEC rules regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 30 yard line and they must wear an armband at all times. No credentials will be issued to freelance photographers, freelance writers, equipment carriers, or radio station representatives except for the two originating networks.

CREDENTIALS: All members of the media covering the game in a working capacity must seek appropriate credentials in advance through Norm Carlson. We would appreciate receiving these requests as early as possible. Requests for working space in the press box and photo passes for the sidelines will be honored from Sports Editors of DAILY Newspapers and Sports Directors of Television Stations ONLY. Due to a lack of working space, credentials for radio stations are limited to immediate Gainesville area stations and the two broadcast network crews doing the game. Any radio station working in-game and post-game reports can receive them by calling the SID Office in advance to make proper arrangements with our staff. Request for working credentials must be made in advance in writing to Norm Carlson. Spouses, date, non-workers and anyone 18 years of age or younger, are not permitted in the press box. Violators will not be tolerated.

SIDELINE CREDENTIALS: Media representatives with sideline credentials must report to the Press Elevator lobby prior to the game. When you present your credentials, a sideline armband will be issued at that time. Your credential will not gain admittance to the sidelines. You must have a armband.

PRESS BOX SERVICES: Play-by-play, complete halftime and final statistics, coaches quote sheet, defensive stats, and game notes are all regular writers on game day. Upon your arrival, you will receive an extensive press folder with game program, flip-card, updated statistics, biographical sketches, and game-day notes. Coach Pelt will conduct a conference in the media room in the south entrance 15-20

minutes after the game. His conference can also be heard via an amplified phone hookup in the Press Box. The opponent coach will conduct his press conference outside the opponent locker room located through the southeast tunnel. Florida's SID staff will begin to escort you to the proper areas with around five minutes to go in the game.

PARKING: Media parking is located on Fleming Field, just outside the north endzone off of University Avenue. You should request your parking credential at the same time you request your game day working credential. If time permits, both of these credentials will be mailed. If time doesn't permit the parking credential to be mailed, you will have to pick it up at the Press Box Elevator Lobby.



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Previewing The 1983 Gators

Florida heads into a schedule in 1983 which appears to be more difficult than last year's, which was rated the third-toughest in the nation. There are some personnel questions which are still to be answered, but Coach Charley Pell and his staff are confident these answers will be forthcoming by the Sept. 3 opener against Miami.

The chief question which must be answered involves the defensive interior. Two positions on the first unit are set with senior tackle Roy Harris and junior nose guard Tim Newton, both of whom are all-star candidates. Pell's concern is over who will be the other starting tackle and where will the depth come from in the middle of the line.

Foremost among the candidates are tackles Ricky Williams, Greg Cleveland, Alton Jones, Keith Williams, Melvin Ellison and Larry Douglas, and nose guards Don Tanny and Alonzo Mitz. The progress of these seven linemen should be a major factor in how good the defensive unit can be in 1983.

Florida has a chance to be the best it has been at linebacker since Pell came to the Gators in 1979. All-American Wilber Marshall, the only junior named as a finalist for the Lombardi College Lineman of the Year Award last fall, anchors the unit and will play both inside and outside linebacker. He will be joined inside by junior college transfer Mark Korff and senior Fred McCallister, who are dead-even in a battle for starting honors.

Sophomores Alonzo Johnson and Ron Moten head a talented crew of outside linebackers which also includes junior Pepper Downie, sophomores Leon Pennington and Walter Byrd and walkon Roland Cummings.

The secondary has experience with seniors Tony Lilly (free safety) and Randy Clark (corner) along with junior Roger Sibbald (strong safety). If senior corners Bruce Vaughan and Vito McKeever are completely over injuries the secondary will be much improved. Young players who figure heavily in plans include sophomores Vernell Brown, Patrick Miller, Victor Bradley and Curtis Stacey, along with junior Ricky Easmon.

Offensively, Florida will be able to throw the ball with the best of college attacks. NCAA record-setting passer Wayne Peace returns for his senior year at quarterback and he has a talented corps of receivers, headed by Dwayne Dixon.

Coach Pell has been concentrating on building a running game and results are beginning to show with the 1982 Gators fielding their best set of runners of the Pell era. Tailbacks Neal Anderson and Lorenzo Hampton team with sophomore fullback John L. Williams, who appears headed for stardom, to provide a potent punch. Sophomore Joe Henderson backs up Williams and is another top-flight player.

Tight ends Bob Vitello, Tom Peddie, Bob Kurzu and Rodney Jones will battle for the honor of replacing the

graduated Mike Mularkey and Chris Faulkner. Jones and Kurzu are coming off injuries. Freshman Walter Odom could figure in the scrap.

The offensive line is good, a mixture of experience and talented young players. Guards Buddy Schultheis and John Hunt are all-star candidates, as is tackle Lomas Brown. Scott Trimble holds down the other tackle slot and junior Phil Bromley is at center.


Ray Criswell, an outstanding punter as a freshman a year ago, is in a battle with transfer David Nardone. Florida will be solid here, and at placekicker with either Bobby Raymond or Chris Perkins.

With a schedule including five bowl teams plus Southern California in Los Angeles, Pell knows his Gators had better be solid in every area.



Wide Receiver Dwayne Dixon, called "the most underrated receiver in the SEC," by Charley Pell last fall, should not go unnoticed this season. Dixon caught 43 passes last year (the most for a Florida receiver since 1969) and was named the MVP of the Bluebonnet Bowl after grabbing eight passes for three TD's.

1982 Gator Notebook

- When Florida met Arkansas in the 1982 All-American Bowl it marked the Gators' third consecutive bowl appearance under Charley Pell.
- The Florida passing attack in 1982 ranked among the most efficient in the history of college football. QB Wayne Peace led an air attack that established a new NCAA single season record for teams passing completion percentage. On the year, the Gators converted on 294 of 295 passing attempts for a sparkling 68.8%. That figure broke the previous NCAA team passing completion percentage mark of 67.8% (minimum 150 attempts) set by North Carolina in 1974. Peace himself entered the NCAA record book, as well. On the year, he completed 174 of 244 passes for an eye-catching 70.23%. That figure established a new NCAA individual single season completion percentage mark, breaking the old mark of 70.70% that was set by California's Bob Campbell in 1960 (193 of 273 passes). Florida also established a new school record for total offense in a season with 4,543 yards.
- Wayne Peace ranked fourth in the final NCAA statistics in passing efficiency with a mark of 143.4. That figure is the highest for any returning QB in the nation as the '83 season approaches.
- The Florida running attack in 1982 did not establish any new NCAA records but it did represent a significant improvement from recent Gator squads. Consider the following:
 - The tailback trio of Neal Anderson (483 yards), John L. Williams (424) and Lorenzo Hampton (365) rushed for a combined 1,492 yards from that position in 1982. In 1979, Charley Pell's first year at the Gator helm, his tailbacks rushed for a combined total of 583 yards, then 520 in 1980 and 667 in 1981.
 - During the course of the 1982 campaign four individual Gator running backs rushed for 100 or more yards nine times, quite a contrast to the three previous Florida contingents that achieved that statistic just twice over a 33 game regular season span from 1979 through 1981.
 - Florida outruled its opponent in nine of eleven games in 1982. Again that represents a marked improvement from the three previous Gator teams. In 1979, Florida held the rushing advantage just twice in 11 contests, four of eleven in 1980, and held a five of 11 mark in that category in 1981.
 - Some of the finest individual rushing performances in Florida history took place in 1982. Neal Anderson's 197 yard effort vs. Kentucky represented the fourth best single game mark in school history. Another freshman, John L. Williams, rushed for 179 yards against West Texas St., a figure that now ranks as the sixth best in Florida history. James Jones' 146 yard effort vs. Vanderbilt now stands as the tenth best single game rushing performance by a Florida back.
 - The four largest rushes from scrimmage during Charley Pell's tenure at Florida all took place during the 1982 campaign: John L. Williams - 86 yards vs. West Texas State, Lorenzo Hampton - 76 vs. West Texas State, Hampton - 69 yards vs. Mississippi State, and Neal Anderson's 63 yards vs. Kentucky.
