Petitioner's consented motion filed January 9, 2009 to extend petitioner's unilateral discovery and trial dates is granted. Trademark Rule 2.127(a).

In the event that the parties seek further extensions of time or periods of suspension to facilitate any settlement discussions, the parties must support such requests for enlargement of time with a **detailed report** on the progress of their discussions. The report should include a recitation of the issues that have been resolved; the issues that remain to be resolved; a firm timetable for resolution, and a list of all dates in which settlement has been discussed.

Such dates are reset in accordance with petitioner's motion.

NEWS FROM THE TTAB:

The USPTO published a notice of final rulemaking in the Federal Register on August 1, 2007, at 72 F.R. 42242. By this notice, various rules governing Trademark Trial and Appeal Board inter partes proceedings are amended. Certain amendments have an effective date of August 31, 2007, while most have an effective date of November 1, 2007. By one rule change effective August 31, 2007, the Board's standard protective order is made applicable to all TTAB inter partes cases, whether already pending or commenced on or after that date. However, as explained in the final rule and chart, this change will not affect any case in which any protective order has already been approved or imposed by the Board. Further, as explained in the final rule, parties are free to agree to a substitute protective order or to supplement or amend the standard order even after August 31, 2007, subject to Board approval.
