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Gem Box®

Gem Box® *llex glabra* is an excellent alternative to boxwood.

We know that boxwood is facing some challenges due to the spread of boxwood blight, so we wanted to offer the industry another option for a small, shear-able evergreen.

Gem Box® delivers, and then some. *I. glabra* is native to North America and so is appealing to people who are trying to work more with native species. Gem Box® has tight compact branching that continues to the ground so the plant doesn't look bare legged like older varieties can.

Here's a video of the plant.

Or Strongbox®

Strongbox® *llex glabra* does pretty much what Gem Box does, but has larger leaves. It gives our growers another choice - some of you may prefer one, some the other, and many of you will decide to grow both. After all, most nurseries carry more than one kind of boxwood because over the years they've found that clients or conditions prefer one over the other.

Both varieties will grow 2-3' tall and wide and grow in full sun to partial shade. They are hardy to USDA Zone 5, and will adapt to many types of soil, including wet ones. The exception is alkaline soil - 1. glabra generally doesn't like that.

Weather

As I sat down to write this I was thinking about how *llex glabra* will tolerate wet feet, and what a good thing that is. we've had quite a bit of rain here in West Michigan and the ground is pretty soggy.

Then I remembered what's going on in the southeast with Hurricane Michael, and how many of you are still recovering from Hurricane Florence, and our rainy days seem really insignificant.

We hope that you are all doing all right and your losses weren't too bad, or are at least manageable. As you know, we went through our own disaster when our office burned down. It's a terrible feeling. One thing that we did learn from our experience is that engaging a public insurance adjuster can be really helpful. So if you're looking at filing a sizable insurance claim you might consider that. Here's a helpful resource for that.







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Ilex glabra is a great plant for a number of reasons. It's a species native to North America, which appeals to people. It's a great plant in its own right, too, being a durable choice that tolerates both wet feet and salt spray.

The problem with *llex glabra* is that many cultivars get leggy and hollowed out as they age. That was an opportunity for us to develop a cultivar that retained good branching and a nice, compact habit. The result is not just one, but two new varieties of *llex glabra*: Gem Box® (right) and Strongbox® (left).



Both of these new varieties stay about 2-3' tall and wide and maintain a nice rounded habit. Like other *llex glabra* they will grow in full sun or partial shade and have good deerresistance.

The leaves of Strongbox® are a little bigger than those of Gem Box® but both look a lot like boxwood and can be sheared or shaped just like Buxus.

Gem Box® is our 2020 Landscape Shrub of the Year but Strongbox® is getting some promotion along with it. We encourage our growers to try both; just as with boxwood you may find you have a favorite or want to offer a choice to your customers.

Turning a problem into an opportunity.

Sometimes we face a challenge that has the potential to really mess up our plans. A flight delay that leads to an extra few hours in an airport - that's a problem. But maybe you can use that time to explore a new city for the afternoon - what a great opportunity!

Boxwood is facing some challenges that are a lot more serious than a missed connection.

<u>Boxwood blight</u> is just one of them; the <u>boxwood tree moth</u> has wreaked havoc across European *Buxus* fields and has the potential to do the same here in North America. These are serious threats, and it's hard to find the opportunity in them.

Taking charge of the situation can help. One action is to start using alternatives to boxwood where possible. Gem Box® and Strongbox® *llex* are two options.

Another possibility is to use this potential disaster to set yourself apart from the competition. Whether that's letting clients know how you've trained your landscape crews to recognize the pathogens or advertising your healthy nursery stock, you're both helping your business and the industry as a whole. Dr. Brand and his crew imbued Low Scape Hedger aronia with a narrow "stovepipe" habit that makes it ideal for low hedges in formal and informal landscapes. Densely branched for excellent coverage from base to top, this robust triploid selection flowers abundantly but does not set fruit.

"Go-To" plant for hedges, borders and/or as a supportive backdrop for more colorful herbaceous compositions (Fig. 1 and Fig. 2). Small evergreen leaves, short internodes that respond well to shearing, and rich green color throughout the year are attractive contributions to the landscape. In addition, the vast number of cultivars makes it relatively easy to choose a selection that fits the form. aesthetics and management priorities of the designer. Boxwood has long maintained a prominent position in our plant palettes, that is until the Polar Vortex graced us with its appearance (Fig. 3), Back-to-back winter extremes in 2013 and 2014 and other unseasonable environmental events have cast a cloud over its widespread use and challenge designers to find more suitable alternatives. Let's examine the traits that have elevated Boxwood to stardom and look for companions to share in the limelight.

Small evergreen leaves and short internodes are the primary characteristics that make Boxwood a plant of choice (Fig 4). Small leaves and short internodes contribute to its overall appearance — uniform outline, foliage depth and compactness of its crown, Also, plants with short internode length usually respond well to shearing. Shearing stimulates multiple bud breaks again contributing to overall uniformity and crown density. Green is the foundation color of our landscapes and Boxwood certainly contributes with its glossy rich greens throughout the year. There are a few variations such as the winter brown cast on the outer foliage of Green Velvet; however, it bounces back each spring with a rich green outline.


Yew (Taxus) shares a position of prominence with Boxwood (Fig. 5). Small narrow-leaved foliage, short internodes, rich green color, and a receptiveness to shearing provide similar benefits in the landscape (Fig. 6). Taxus also has a number of cultivars offering variations in overall size, form and growth rate. However, it also had problems in the Polar Vortex years.

So, what else is out there? Narrow-leaved evergreens have a few genera/species to consider. Few people are aware of the differences between juvenile and mature foliage of Arborvitae (*Thuja*), Juvenile foliage is









Holly (*Ilex*) is a broad-leaved evergreen with a few possibilities. If hardiness and exposure are appropriate, *Ilex crenata*, Japanese Holly can be a likely choice. It tends to favor Zone 6 conditions, however, I have seen cultivars work in favorable microclimatic locations in Zone 5 landscapes. Japanese Holly offers several cultivars that lend themselves as reasonable alternatives to boxwood. *Ilex glabra*, Inkberry Holly is a strong Zone 5 possibility with its newly introduced cultivars, Gem Box® (Fig. 8) and Strong Box®. In addition, Inkberry Holly will tolerate a variety of soil conditions.

We can expand our possibilities by quite a bit if we include deciduous shrubs in the mix. Several shrub species are likely candidates for bordering. Aronia, Deutzia, Diervilla, and the dwarf Physocarpus will not only fit the formal appearance but will add an expanded color dimension. We plan to explore these possibilities and more at the 2019 Great Lakes Trade Exposition in Lansing. See you there!

What are a few easyto-grow shrubs for a small space?

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The genus Potentilla contains about 500 species, only four of which were used in the breeding of the shrubs we know today. Deciduous P. fruticosa is native to most of the northern hemisphere, including every Canadian province and territory except Nunavut. The other three species (P. arbuscula, P. davurica and P. parvifolia) are native to Asia.

In addition to a wide range of colours, our adaptable modern cultivars vary in size, from groundcovers (e.g., 'Yellow Gem') to tall, upright shrubs (e.g., 'Jackman's Variety'), although most new cultivars are selected for their compact, mounding habits (e.g., Mango Tango and Happy Face White).

Extremely versatile, potentillas can be used as long-flowering specimens in foundation plantings and flowerbeds, for reliable colour in shrub borders or even trimmed into low, flowering hedges. Many potentillas also make excellent container plants (e.g., Happy Face White), and because of their cast-iron hardiness, container-grown specimens can be overwintered in situ without extra protection to at least Zone 5.

In order to achieve their full potential, site shrubby potentillas in full sun (they will ac-

cept shade, but flowering is considerably reduced). They're best planted in average garden loam that drains well; very rich soil will produce lush foliage but few blooms.

In midsummer, the saturated colours of some cultivars—especially orange—and red-flowered types—may fade. This was long thought to be the result of the sun's rays bleaching the petals, but recent research suggests that heat and drought are the real culprits. Of course, gardeners can't do much about ambient temperatures, but keeping plants well irrigated during bud formation has been shown to significantly reduce fading.

Potentillas bloom on new wood, and a light, early-spring pruning to keep plants fidy will result in the shapeliest shrubs with the most flowers. Badly neglected, overgrown specimens can be hard-pruned for a fresh start, but the resulting weak, succulent growth is prone to downy mildew and/or spider mite outbreaks in hot, dry weather. Instead, it's preferable to remove one-third of the oldest, woodiest stems each spring over a three-year period so that by the fourth year, all the old wood has been replaced by vigorous one- to three-year-old stems.

10 potentillas to try

The following cultivars of Potentilla fruticosa are hardy to Zone 2, except where noted.

'Abbotswood' A particularly bushy, compact form of potentilla that grows about two feet (60 cm) tall and wide, and bears large, pristine white flowers from late spring until autumn's first frosts. Older branches turn dark brown, but new stems are a striking red and, together with the shrub's dark green foliage, serve to emphasize the whiteness of the blooms. Frequently used for mass planting, it also makes a great specimen plant in herbaceous borders or as a small foundation shrub.

Happy Face Pink Paradise ('Kupinpa') An extra-dense, bushy potentilla cultivar, Happy Face Pink Paradise has a narrow, upright growth habit and grows 2½ feet (75 cm) tall and wide. Its foliage is medium green, and it bears sterile, one-inch (2.5-cm)

-wide, semi-double pink flowers from early summer to mid-autumn. At home as a specimen plant in smaller gardens, its prolonged period of bloom and semi-double flowers make it an excellent choice for large containers and planters; it can be overwintered in situ without extra protection in Zone 5 and warmer. In hot, dry conditions, the flowers may fade to a light creamy pink.

Happy Face White ('White Lady') With a compact, freely branching habit, Happy Face White grows two by 21/2 feet (60 x 75 cm). It produces soft, pubescent green leaves and bears 11/4-Inch (3-cm)- wide, upward-facing, pure white flowers from late spring to mid-autumn. It can be grouped together (three or more) to brighten foundation plantings or used as an accent plant in herbaceous borders. but may be at its best in large containers, where it will add both height and light. Happy Face White tolerates temperatures of up to 40°C without ever breaking a sweat.

Happy Face Yellow

('Lundy') A compact potentilla with an upright, outwardly spreading habit and a dense, bushy form, Happy Face Yellow grows two by 21/2 feet (60 x 75). Its slightly pubescent branches produce dark green foliage and bear abundant, 11/2-inch (3.8-cm) -wide, outward-facing, dark yellow flowers from early summer to early autumn. It can be planted in flowerbeds or shrub borders, or in groups of three or more for vivid punches of continuous colour in foundation plantings.

'Jackman's Variety' (syn. 'Jackman') Bearing large, golden yellow flowers from late spring to mīd-autumn, Jackman's Variety' has an upright habit, and grows 3½ by 2½ feet (105 x 75 cm). Its brown branches bear large, dark green leaves with five to seven spreading, finger-like leaflets. Often used for low hedging, It should be pruned to shape in early spring.

Mango Tango ('UMan') A compact cultivar with a dense, semi-upright growth habit, Mango Tango grows two feet (60 cm) tall and wide. It produces light green leaves, and from early summer until the first autumn frosts, it bears deep yellow-orange flowers with vermillion-red centres that radiate toward the petal edges. In hot, dry weather, the blooms may fade to yellow with orange centres, while cool weather results in almost entirely red flowers with orange edges. Given its bright, eye-catching flowers, it makes an excellent specimen plant, and can easily hold its own in the most colourful herbaceous borders.

'Pink Beauty' (syn. Lovely Pink) A medium-sized potentilla, 'Pink Beauty' grows 31/2 by 21/2 feet (105 x 75 cm), and holds its deep green foliage well, even at the base of the plant. From early summer to mid-autumn, it produces a profusion of medium-sized, semi-double, deep pink flowers; hot, dry weather may cause the blooms to fade to a creamy pink, Plant it in shrub borders, flowerbeds and foundation plantings for season-long colour. It also works well when sited beside

What are a few easyto-grow shrubs for a small space?

'Primrose Beauty' Amounding, low-growing shrub, 'Primrose Beauty' grows 21/2 by 31/2 feet (75 x 105 cm), and produces large, creamy vellow flowers with bright golden centres from late spring to mid-autumn. Its rather hairy stems bear silvergrey leaves that complement the pale primrose-coloured flowers to perfection. Lovely in gardens with pastel colour schemes, it can also act as a peacemaker in beds and borders, mediating between blooms with highly saturated colours that might otherwise clash.

potentilla, 'Red Ace' grows two by three feet (60 x 90 cm), and bears vivid orangered to brick-red flowers from late spring to late summer; its medium green leaves are small, with five to seven narrow leaflets. A slow grower, it's best suited to areas with reliable winter snow cover, and should be planted in a sheltered position. When pruned regularly, 'Red Ace' makes a splendid rock garden plant, and also works well as a low-growing "facer" bush in shrub borders to hide the bare ankles of larger specimens. Zone 3.

'Red Ace' A medium-sized



'Yellow Gem' A lovely lowgrowing potentilla, 'Yellow Gem' reaches 11/2 by three feet (45 x 90 cm) and bears 11/4-inch (3-cm)-wide, bright yellow flowers with delightfully crinkled petals from late spring until the first hard frosts of autumn. Older branches turn reddish brown, but new stems glow a vivid hot pink; both bear soft, pubescent grey-green leaves that further accentuate the clear golden flowers.

A groundcover par excellence, 'Yellow Gem' provides reliable colour for almost the entire growing season, and looks best when massed together in groups for maximum floral impact. It roots easily wherever its lower branches touch the soil surface (a process known as natural layering). Newly rooted sections can be severed from the parent plant and transplanted elsewhere in the garden.

Expert tip Most potentillas are container grown from rooted softwood cuttings, and may be planted at any time during the growing season. However, it's best to move or transplant mature shrubs when they're dormant in early spring or mid-autumn.

Consider these

More space-saving shrubs to add form and colour

JAPANESE BARBERRY

(Berberis thunbergii cvs.)

Japanese barberries have long been valued for their dainty, ornamental foliage-which may be green, yellow, rose, purple or variegated-on deciduous shrubs with a variety of growth habits, including dwarf hybrids and groundcover types that perfectly match the reduced scale of small gardens. In spring, older cultivars bear yellow flowers that produce ornamental (and edible!) red berries that persist throughout winter; newer introductions bear sterile flowers (or are completely flower-free) in response to concerns about escaped barberry seedlings crowding out native species in the wild. Avoid planting fertile barberry cultivars near sensitive ecosystems.

The best leaf colour is always achieved in full sun, although barberries will tolerate part shade. Plant in average garden loam, amending the hole with organic matter (such as shredded leaves) to improve soil tilth and drainage. To maintain shape, prune in late spring or early summer. Deer resistant, drought and pollution tolerant; hardy to Zone 4.

Golden Japanese barberry (Berberis thunbergil 'Aurea', syn. 'Aurea Nana') has vivid yellow leaves that don't scorch in full sun; foliage turns orange red in autumn. A slow-growing variety with a rounded form, it flowers and fruits lightly; grows

24 by 30 inches (60 x 75 cm).

Golden Nugget (B. t.

'Monlers') is a dwarf cultivar with a tight, spherical habit that grows 14 by 20 inches (35 x 50 cm). New foliage emerges a vivid orange and matures to a golden yellow that doesn't scorch in full sun; inconspicuous spring flowers are followed by moderate amounts of bright red berries.

Royal Burgundy (B. t. 'Gentry') grows 24 by 30 inches (60 x 75 cm) and has a low, spreading habit. New leaves emerge a rich burgundy colour with a velvety, waterresistant pubescence; as they age, they darken to reddish black and develop a satiny patina. Resistant to sun scald, Royal Burgundy produces a moderate number of small flowers followed by red berries, and can be used as an accent plant or a low hedge.

retains its rich red-purple leaf colour (without bleaching) during prolonged heat waves in full sun. A dwarf variety that grows 20 inches (50 cm) tall and wide, it has a spherical habit with small, velvety leaves, making it suitable for containers or as an accent plant in a sunny border. 'Concorde' bears small flowers in spring and produces medium-sized crops of red berries.

'Concorde' (B. t. var.

DWARF HARDY HYDRANGEAS

(Hydrangea cvs.)

Hardy hydrangeas are one of the best loved and most widely planted shrubs, but many cultivars grow too large to be accommodated in small gardens. Fortunately, breeders have been hard at work to produce dwarf hydrangeas perfectly suited to containers and small spaces.

Hardy hydrangeas don't have any serious disease or insect pests and produce the most blooms when sited in part shade in moist, well-drained soil rich in organic matter. Feeding plants with a soluble fertilizer such as 24-8-16 in late spring and again in midsummer is often recommended for faster growth and larger flowers (hardy hydrangeas bloom on new wood). The following are hardy to Zone 3.

Invincibelle Wee White

smooth hydrangea (Hydrangea arborescens 'NCHA5') produces large, white Annabella-style flows

white Annabelle-style flowers on strong stems in midsummer on a shrub that grows just two feet (60 cm) tall and wide. Flowers age to soft pinks and pale greens. Prune plants to within two inches (5 cm) of the crown in late winter.

Bobo panicle hydrangea (H. paniculata 'ILVOBO') is a dwarf variety that grows

30 by 36 inches (75 x 90 cm) and produces an abundance of large white flowers in late summer that continue to grow and lengthen as they bloom. Strong-stemmed flowers age to pink. Prune panicle hydrangeas in spring before leaf break; they can be pruned minimally to shape, or hard-pruned to control size.

Little Lime (H. p. 'Jane') is the dwarf form of 'Limelight' and grows only one-third as big as its parent—up to 36 inches (90 cm) tall and wide. Bright chartreuse flowers age to dark pink in autumn.

Little Quick Fire (H. p.

'SMHPLQF') is the dwarf form of Quick Fire and blooms as early as its popular forebear, usually in midsummer. Growing 36 inches (90 cm) tall and wide, its white flowers age to pink—often before other panicle hydrangeas have even started to bloom; flowers mature to burgundy in autumn.

DWARF RHODODENDRONS (Rhododendron cvs.)

Most early spring shrubs bear yellow flowers (think witch-hazel and forsythia), and it isn't until rhododendrons and azaleas begin to bloom that the colour palette expands to include white, pink, red,

magenta and purple flowers.
Site rhododendrons in sun to part shade in humus-rich soil, planting shallowly, as all rhodos have fine, fibrous roots close to the soil surface. Rhododendrons prefer acidic soil in the range of pH 4.5

to 5.5 (pH 7.0 is neutral); elemental sulphur pellets and soil-acidifying rhododendron fertilizers will help, but where soils are strongly alkaline, it's easier to grow dwarf-rhodos in ralsed beds or containers. To conserve water and moderate soil temperature, mulch plants with pine needles, shredded oak leaves or bark chips. Deadheading spent blooms encourages new growth. Plants rarely require pruning; feed after flowering.

Only gardeners distinguish between rhododendrons and azaleas—to botanists, they're all rhododendrons. Despite exceptions, by tradition rhodos have flowers with 10 stamens and evergreen foliage, while azaleas have five stamens and tend to be deciduous.

'Amy Cotta' small-leaved rhododendron grows 30 inches (75 cm) tall and wide and bears large, ruffled lavender-pink flowers held above evergreen leaves. Zone 4.

Bollywood ('Farrow') azalea bears neon red-pink flowers above semi-evergreen variegated (green and pale yellow) foliage. In colder zones, grow Bollywood in pots and overwinter in an unheated porch or garage; grows 30 inches (75 cm) tall and wide. Zone 6.

'Ingrid Mehlquist' largeleaved mododendron bears lightly fragrant, burgundyblotched pale pink (fading to white) flowers above evergreen leaves. It grows 24 by 36 inches (60 x 90 cm) and has a dense, spreading habit. Zone 5.

'Purple Gem' small-leaved rhododendron has a rounded habit and grows 24 by 36 inches (60 x 90 cm). It bears large trusses of lavender-purple flowers held above evergreen foliage. Zone 4.

JAPANESE SPIREAS

(Spiraea japonica cvs.)
Since their introduction in the 1850s, Japanese spireas have been embraced by gardeners for their white, pink and red flowers, tidy habit, easy care, ability to grow in poor to average spils and bright, calculful

ability to grow in poor to average soils and bright, colourful foliage. These multi-stemmed shrubs bear large clusters of flowers in midsummer, after most other shrubs have finished blooming.

Preferring full sun, Japanese spireas will tolerate part shade, but won't flower as profusely, and given a choice, they prefer rich loam that remains moist but not waterlogged. During active growth, they require a minimum of one inch (2.5 cm) of water per week. Japanese spireas bloom on new wood and should be pruned in early spring; confine annual pruning to cutting away dead wood and maintaining the shrub's rounded, mounding habit. Slow-growing dwarf cultivars are especially well suited to containers.

'Flowering Choice' is a dwarf variety that grows 16 by 14 inches (40 x 35 cm) and has an exceptionally long period of bloom. It produces three-inch (8-cm)-wide corymbs of purplish-pink flowers for 15 weeks from late spring to late summer held above green leaves that turn purplish red in autumn. Zone 4.

'Genpei', syn. 'Shirobana' produces deep rose, pink and white flowers on the same



plant—even on the same corymb—at the same time, held above lustrous light green foliage that turns russet in autumn. With a mounding, dwarf habit, 'Genpei' grows 24 by 32 inches (60 x 80 cm), and continues to produce new flowers sporadically until fall. Zone 4.

'Golden Elf' is a dwarf, nonflowering, golden-leaved groundcover spirea that grows just six by 12 inches (15 x 30 cm) with a low, spreading habit. When sited in full sun, its leaves retain their golden colour from early spring until the first frosts. Zone 3.

Magic Carpet ('Walbuma') grows 20 inches (50 cm) tall and wide with a compact, spreading habit. Early spring foliage emerges brilliant red, changing to gold as the leaves mature. It produces dark pink flowers in midsummer, Zone 3.

DWARF VIBURNUMS

(Viburnum cvs.)

Most viburnum species and cultivars eventually grow to be large shrubs or small trees, but there are several dwarf selections that are perfectly sized

for smaller landscapes and bear the same beautiful white, cream or pink flowers as their larger kin. Springtime blooms are often fragrant, and are followed by colourful berries that are particularly prized by songbirds.

Plant viburnums in sun to part shade in moist, well-drained soil that's high in organic matter. To maintain a tidy habit, prune immediately after flowering, because viburnums bloom on old wood. In Eastern Canada and parts of British Columbia, the Eurasian viburnum leaf beetle (VLB) has devastated some species of Viburnum, so except in the Prairies, plant VLB-resistant cultivars.

'Diana' Koreanspice
viburnum (Viburnum carlesii
'Diana') has a dense, compact
habit and grows 3½ feet (105
cm) tall and wide. In spring, it
produces three-inch (7.5-cm)wide snowball-like cymes of
highly fragrant pink flowers
followed by black fruit and
burgundy autumn foliage.

Spice Baby Koreanspice viburnum (V. c. 'SMVCB') is a seedling of V. c. 'Compactum' and identical to 'Diana' in every way, except that it bears snow-white flowers. Plant Koreanspice viburnums near open windows and walkways where their intoxicating fragrance can be fully appreciated; VLB resistant. Zone 4.

Lil' Ditty witherod viburnum (V. cassinoides 'SMNVCDD') produces four-inch (10-cm)wide cymes of creamy white flowers in early summer followed by showy clusters of fruit that change from green to pink to red to blue before turning jet-black in early autumn; fall foliage is orange-red to purple. Lil' Ditty grows 18 by 30 inches (45 x 75 cm). Tolerant of damp soils and native from Newfoundland to Manitoba, witherod viburnums are moderately susceptible to VLB. Zone 3.

Wabi-Sabi doublefile

viburnum (V. plicatum f. tomentosum 'SMVPTFD') is a low-growing dwarf cultivar that grows 30 by 40 inches (75 x 100 cm) and bears flat-topped clusters of white lacecap flowers in spring on an architectural, horizontally layered shrub. Blooms are followed by black fruit and purple-red autumn foliage; VLB resistant. Zone 5.

TOP-NOTCH JUNIPERS FOR GROUNDCOVERS

I'm looking for a groundcover that stays green all year long.

Blueberry Delight common Juniper (Juniperus communis 'AmiDak') Bearing heavy crops of showy blueberry-like cones, Blueberry Delight grows up to 20 inches (50 cm) tall with a spread of 60 inches (1.5 m)—although if you prune out any vertical branches in late winter, a height of 12 inches (30 cm) can be easily maintained. Blueberry Delight requires full sun, tolerates poor soil and withstands droughty conditions once established. Its silver-striped powder-blue foliage turns coppery bronze in autumn; Zone 2.

Alpine Carpet common juniper

(J. c. 'Mondap') Derived from plants collected in the Rocky Mountains, this ground-hugging variety of common juniper grows eight by 36 inches (20 x 90 cm) and produces soft, blue-green foliage. Alpine Carpet is hardy to Zone 3 and tolerant of high humidity. Growing best in lean to average garden soil in full sun, it's useful for blurring or obscuring the hard edges of driveways and paved areas, for draping over walls or for erosion control on steep banks. Alpine Carpet can be "dressed up" by combining it with other natives such as dwarf inkberry (*llex glabra'* Compacta', Zone 5), with its jet-black winter berries, or the orange-red summer fruit of 'Mohican' wayfaring tree (*Viburnum lantana' Mohican', Zone 4).

Good Vibrations Gold creeping juniper

(J. horizontalis 'Hegedus') Some shy away from junipers because of their prickly foliage, but Good Vibrations Gold is not only soft to the touch, its scale-like leaves also change colour with the seasons. Growing 12 inches (30 cm) tall with a 60-inch (1.5 m) spread, this juniper has chartreuse foliage in spring that matures to a bright yellow green in summer, then takes on an orange hue in autumn and winter. An easy-to-grow groundcover that thrives in full sun and average garden soil, it's drought tolerant once established and, like all junipers, is deer resistant; Zone 4.

Over the past 20 years, Icee Blue has become one of the most popular evergreen groundcovers, and with good reason. Growing just four Inches (10 cm) tall with a 36-inch (90-cm)-wide spread after five years (up to 8 ft./2.4 m after 15 years), its foliage maintains the best silver-blue winter colour of any juniper, with the added attraction of turning plum purple In Zone 5 and colder. Icee Blue maintains a dense crown (elimi-

nating bare patches) and provides solid coverage

quickly. It prefers full sun in average garden soil.

Icee Blue creeping juniper (J. h. 'Monber')

'Mother Lode' creeping juniper

Ideal for green roofs, too; Zone 3.

(J. h. 'Mother Lode') Growing just four inches (10 cm) tall with a mature spread of nine feet (2.7 m), 'Mother Lode' produces brilliant golden foliage that turns orange yellow in winter. It prefers full sun in average garden soil; its creeping branches root as they spread, making it easy to transplant naturally "layered" (or rooted) sections elsewhere. Capable of brightening up the darkest mid-winter day, this long-lived cultivar also tolerates hot, humid weather: Zone 4.

Caigary Carpet savin juniper

(J. sabina 'Monna') Native to Eurasia and cultivated since the 16th century, the savin juniper had been avoided by most gardeners because of its susceptibility to juniper tip blight (Phamopsis juniperovora). In an effort to find resistant cultivars. thousands of seeds were sent to D. Hill Nursery (Illinois) from St. Petersburg (Russia) in 1933; of these, three plants were chosen for their disease resistance: I.s. 'Arcadia', 'Broadmoor' and 'Skandia'. Calgary Carpet is a selection from 'Arcadia', singled out for its low, spreading habit and ability to add winter interest to mixed borders. Its scale-like leaves retain their lime-green colour all winter. Rabbit resistant, Calgary Carpet requires full sun and, once established, is one of the most drought-resistant juniper cultivars available; keep pruning to a minimum. It grows 12 inches (30 cm) tall with a spread of four feet (1,2 m); Zone 3.

Leaving bare soil exposed is never a good idea, and in addition to looking pretty, groundcovers suppress weed growth, retard soil erosion and insulate the roots of adjacent plants from temperature extremes.

Consider these

More problem-solving evergreen groundcovers

Celtic Pride Siberian carpet cypress (Microbiota decussata 'Prides') Looking like a cross between a juniper and a fern, Celtic Pride's graceful scale-like shoots are bright green in summer, changing to shades of bronze or russet in winter. It grows 18 inches (45 cm) tall with an almost indefinite spread. More shade tolerant than junipers, it prefers good, well-drained garden soil (waterlogged soil will cause rot) and has excellent resistance to tip dieback. Deer resistant and hardy to Zone 2.

Weeping Norway spruce (Picea abies f. pendula) Usually staked to support the main leader, the weeping Norway spruce will, when left to its own devices, obligingly crawl along the soil's surface, making it an excellent conferous aroundcover. Annual spring pruning will encourage a dense habit. Plants grow no more than 36 inches (90 cm) tall—pruning out any upright branches will maintain a height of 12 inches (30 cm)with a mature spread of up to 10 feet (3 m). Deer-resistant weeping Norway spruce prefers full sun in good, well-drained soil, and is particularly attractive cascading down a retaining wall, slope or bank; Zone 3.

'Prostrata' eastern white pine (Pinus strobus 'Prostrata') I've always loved the soft, green needles of the eastern white pine, and 'Prostrata' is a low-growing selection that has

been vegetatively propagated for decades as a groundcover par excellence. Hardy to Zone 3, 'Prostrata' prefers rich, welldrained soil in full sun. Growing six by 30 inches (15 x 75 cm), it is often sited so that it tumbles over large rocks, further emphasizing its dense, highly textured growth habit. All white pines are susceptible to white pine blister rust (Cronartium ribicola), whose alternate host is Ribes spp. and cvs. (gooseberries and currants); avoid planting the two genera near each other.

Emerald Spreader Japanese

yew (Taxus cuspidata 'Monloo') Unlike most lapanese yews, which have a somewhat floopy branching habit. Emerald Spreader produces short, rigid needles on a low-growing shrub with a compact, flattopped, symmetrical growth habit, Growing 30 Inches (75 cm) tall with horizontally arranged branches and a spread of up to 10 feet (3 m), It makes a handsome groundcover for large gardens; it can also be trained as a low hedge. Retaining its deep green colour throughout the winter, this Japanese yew produces attractive red arils (or berries). a winter food source for birds. It's similar in form and function to 'Repandens' English yew (T. baccata 'Repandens', Zone 6)—the best choice for warmer zones. Both are pollution tolerant and prefer rich, welldrained soil in sun or shade;

Zone 4.

'Glauca Prostrata' Korean arborvitae (Thuja koraiensis 'Glauca Prostrata') Although this cultivar bears typical Thuja foliage, its resemblance to all other cedars ends there: 'Glauca Prostrata' produces distinctive leaves that are silvery blue green on the upper surface with bright white undersides, the only cedar with this coloration. It grows 18 inches (45 cm) tall with a four-foot (120-cm) spread, and prefers average, well-drained garden soil in full sun to part shade. Although its graceful foliage mixes well with other groundcover conifers, it has sufficient "garden oomph" to stand alone as a low, mounding specimen shrub; Zone 5.

'Cole's Prostrate' Canadlan hemlock (Tsuga canadensis 'Cole's Prostrate') 'Cole's Prostrate' hugs the ground, growing just 10 inches (25 cm) tall with a spread of four feet (1.2 m). Its rich green follage and elegant habit make it an ideal choice for areas in part to full shade, where other conifers would snuff it from lack of sunlight. Overtime, its branch structure and silvery-white bark become more prominent, adding a wonderfully architectural element to plantings. Perfect for creeping over large rocks or tumbling down walls. Woolly adelgids can be a nulsance in the eastern half of the country, but are easily dealt with using insecticidal soap, It grows best in rich, moist soil with plenty of organic matter; Zone 4.

TACKLE THE SLOPE It isn't always easy to grow plants on a slope, especially one that is near a street and sidewalk that gets regularly treated with salt in winter. Salt spray from passing cars can sometimes cause damage, but these plants are all tolerant of a little salt.

Keep most plants upright and vertical when planting; it may mean that a little of the root ball will stick up from the slope. Make a small berm around this side of the plant to cover the roots and to give a spot for water to slow and sink into the soil. Staggering plants on a slope also helps slow the running water so it has a chance to be absorbed. For some flat-growing plants and ground covers, such as the aronia berry, plant at a slight angle that follows the slope. It will look better, and the branches can help keep the soil in place. A thick layer of shredded mulch (which will stick together better) 3 to 4 in. deep will keep the soil from eroding, too. In heavy rains it might start to wash away, but it's much easier to add more mulch than to replace soil.

After planting, the upkeep is prefty easy. Water frequently the first year and in really dry spells, do a little pruning here and there to keep the shrubs in shape. In spring, cut back the perennials that were left for winter interest down to about 4 in. from the ground.

Perennial; in late spring maroon buds open to bicolor maroon and yellow flowers that age to gold by early summer; round habit keeps looking good even after blooms fade; leave the black seedheads for fall and winter interest; full sun to part shade; 30 to 36 in. tall and wide; cold zones 4 to 9, heat zones 9 to 1



Amsonia
Amsonia tabernaemontana 'Storm Cloud'

Perennial; periwinkle blue star-shaped flowers in late spring to summer; round habit; follage turns chartreuse in fall but is not as striking as other cultivars; full sun to part shade; 24 to 30 in. tall, 38 to 42 in. wide; cold zones 4 to 9, heat zones 9 to 1




Aronia
Aronia melanocarpa Low Scape[®] Mound

Shrub; white blooms in midspring and purple-black berries that can be harvested and eaten in late summer and early fall; will become the center of attention in fall when foliage turns bright red; low-growing habit helps hold soil in place; full sun to part shade; 12 to 24 in. tall, 18 to 24 in. wide; cold zones 3 to 9, heat zones 9 to 1



Inkberry holly llex glabra Gem Box³

Shrub; dark green foliage makes it a source of color in every season; red tips in spring; maintains a round habit without pruning; full sun to part shade; 2 to 3 ft. tall and wide; cold zones 5 to 9, heat zones 9 to 1



Norway spruce Picea abies 'Perry's Gold'

Conifer; bright yellow chartreuse new growth in spring slowly fades throughout the season and becomes dark green in winter; slow to mature so buy a full-grown plant for instant height; full sun; 3 to 4 ft. tall, 2 to 3 ft. wide; cold zones 3 to 8, heat zones 8 to



Allium Allium caeruleum

Bulb; in early summer 1-in, globes of small, star-shaped sky blue flowers bloom on long stems; foliage is easily hidden behind taller perennials and shrubs as it fades; can leave seedheads for interest; full sun to part shade; 12 to 18 in. tall, 4 to 8 in. wide; cold zones 4 to 8, heat zones 8 to 1



Turkish sage Phlomis russeliana

Perennial; pale yellow clusters in early summer to fall; leave the seedheads for winter interest; plant will spread easily but not invasively and its broad, long leaves suppress weeds and hold soil in place; full sun; 24 to 36 in. tail, 18 to 24 in. wide; cold zones 5 to 9, heat zones 9 to 1



Bearded iris Iris 'Beverly Sills'

Perennial; pink flowers in spring; strappy foliage adds interest when not in bloom; rhizomes will multiply over time so give them room to grow and be prepared to divide occasionally; full sun to part shade; 30 to 36 in. tall, 18 to 24 in. wide; cold zones 3 to 9, heat zones 9 to 1



Bergenia Bergenia 'Bressingham Ruby'

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DECKSCAPING: HOW TO SOFTEN A BACKYARD DECK


Does your deck suffer from naked ankles? If so, chances are it could use a little botanical assistance. For our deck landscape design, we varied the heights of the plants so that they make a smooth transition from the unsightly base of the deck to railings above.

We placed climbers and taller plants close to the deck and gradually decrease plant height as the garden merges with the surrounding lawn. This concept will work well with a near-grade deck like this, or one that sits a few steps above the surface of the ground. These trees and shrubs will surround the hardscaping in color, texture and blossoms like a bedskirt. Before long, from a comfortable perch on your well-dressed deck, you will be able to appreciate the handsome red bark of the Japanese maple, the fragrance of the clematis clambering up the railing and the handsome seedheads of the cut-leaf coneflowers as they nod under the weight of hungry goldfinches. After all, without plants to soften its lines, a deck can seem out of place. Even in your own backyard.



She also suggests Christmas cactus, an easy-care houseplant that prefers humidity, not the arid environment we typically associate with cacti, Interest in Christmas cactus feeds into the succulent craze, while herb rosemary can serve as both a functional and fragrant item to have around the holidays. Rotella says some can be turned into wreaths or topiary art and used right in the kitchen.

Other year-round items that could work alongside traditional poinsettias are cyclamen, gerbera and ornamental peppers.

Natalie Carmolli, marketing and

promotions specialist for Spring Meadow Nursery, says boxwood is also a very popular evergreen holiday plant.







commonly known as blue holly, is known for its thick, shiny, pointed leaves and red berries. However, if your customers want those iconic red berries, there are a few steps to ensure they take.

One tricky aspect your retail customers may have to explain is that only the female bushes produce fruit. The berries won't be produced at all unless there is also

a male bolly bush in the area to pollinate the female flowers, Spring Meadow Nursery introduced a brand new cultivar at the 2019 California Spring Trials, Castle Keep holly. At 3 to 5 feet, it's a good contender for a patio pot. While Castle Keep has a rounded habit, the Michigan wholesale nursery also carries a pyramidal blue holly, Castle Spire.

This shrub, however, is quite big, filling out at 8 to 10 feet at maturity. Spring

Meadow's male variety is Castle Wall.

in holiday decorations, such as a wreath or centerpiece. Spores can persist in the soil for up to 5 years, so even a new boxwood planted where an infected plant was removed can become diseased. WHAT TO DO ABOUT BOXWOOD BLIGHT If the infection is in the early stages, cut off all affected branches and clean up debris off the ground. Double bag the trimmings and dispose of them in the trash. burn (where permitted), or bury them at least 2 feet deep in the ground. Don't compost infected foliage.

You may be able to keep boxwood blight at bay on remaining unaffected foliage by spraying a chlorothalonil-containing fungicide every 7 to 14 days during the growing season when temperatures are above 60 degrees F. Reapply if it rains-the fungus thrives in warm, humid weather. Use this fungicide carefully according to directions, as it is toxic to fish.

Sanitize any tools that you use with a 1:9 bleach to water mixture and wash clothing that comes into contact with infected plants.

All that said, it might be easiest (and definitely less expensive) to remove the whole plant, including any soil touching the roots. There are several boxwood cultivars that are resistant to boxwood blight:

North Star* boxwood Buxus sempervirens 24 to 32 in. tall and wide, cold hardy in zones 5 to 9

Sprinter® littleleaf boxwood Buxus microphylla 2 to 4 ft. tall and wide, cold hardy in zones 5 to 8

In new plantings, grow open-habit boxwood species, such as littleleaf boxwood cultivars, and space them far enough apart that their branches don't intertwine. More air movement discourages

Pull weeds, prune foliage, and do other maintenance tasks only when boxwood foliage is dry so you are less likely to transfer the sticky spores with clothing and tools (and make sure lawn care workers follow these procedures as well).

Use a 2-inch layer of mulch, such as pine bark, under plants to keep water from splashing spores from the soil up onto the leaves.

Purchase boxwoods only from nurseries certified as disease-free in the Boxwood Blight Cleanliness Program, which requires growers to adhere to strict cultural practices.





supportive backdrop for more colorful herbaceous compositions (Fig. 1 and Fig. 2). Small evergreen leaves, short internodes that respond well to shearing, and rich green color throughout the year are attractive contributions to the landscape. In addition, the vast number of cultivars makes it relatively easy to choose a selection that fits the form, aesthetics and management priorities of the designer. Boxwood has long maintained a prominent position in our plant palettes, that is until the Polar Vortex graced us with its appearance (Fig. 3), Back-to-back winter extremes in 2013 and 2014 and other unseasonable environmental events have cast a cloud over its widespread use and challenge designers to find more suitable alternatives. Let's examine the traits that have elevated Boxwood to stardom and look for companions to share in the limelight.

Small evergreen leaves and short internodes are the primary characteristics that make Boxwood a plant of choice (Fig 4). Small leaves and short internodes

contribute to its overall appearance — uniform outline, foliage depth and compactness of its crown, Also, plants with short internode length usually respond well to shearing. Shearing stimulates multiple bud breaks again contributing to overall uniformity and crown density. Green is the foundation color of our landscapes and Boxwood certainly contributes with its glossy rich greens throughout the year. There are a few variations such as the winter brown cast on the outer foliage of Green Velvet; however, it bounces back each spring with a rich green outline.


Yew (Taxus) shares a position of prominence with Boxwood (Fig. 5). Small narrow-leaved foliage, short internodes, rich green color, and a receptiveness to shearing provide similar benefits in the landscape (Fig. 6). Taxus also has a number of cultivars offering variations in overall size, form and growth rate. However, it also had problems in the Polar Vortex years.

So, what else is out there? Narrow-leaved evergreens have a few genera/species to consider. Few people are aware of the differences between juvenile and mature foliage of Arborvitae (*Thuja*). Juvenile foliage is










Holly (*Ilex*) is a broad-leaved evergreen with a few possibilities. If hardiness and exposure are appropriate, *Ilex crenata*, Japanese Holly can be a likely choice. It tends to favor Zone 6 conditions, however, I have seen cultivars work in favorable microclimatic locations in Zone 5 landscapes. Japanese Holly offers several cultivars that lend themselves as reasonable alternatives to boxwood. *Ilex glabra*, Inkberry Holly is a strong Zone 5 possibility with its newly introduced cultivars, Gem Box® (Fig. 8) and Strong Box®. In addition, Inkberry Holly will tolerate a variety of soil conditions.

We can expand our possibilities by quite a bit if we include deciduous shrubs in the mix. Several shrub species are likely candidates for bordering. Aronia, Deutzia, Diervilla, and the dwarf Physocarpus will not only fit the formal appearance but will add an expanded color dimension. We plan to explore these possibilities and more at the 2019 Great Lakes Trade Exposition in Lansing. See you there!

The boxwood blight that is wiping out generations-old plants across the southeast hit Wake Forest University's <u>Reynolda Gardens</u> in the fall of 2018, prompting experts to connect with <u>Spring Meadow Nursery</u>, to identify a boxwood replacement that is both consistent with the historic landscape and resistant to disease.

Boxwood blight is a serious and highly contagious disease caused by the fungus *Calonectria pseudonaviculatum*. It first appeared in the United Kingdom in the 1990s and in 2011 was detected in Connecticut and North Carolina. Since then, blight has been found in Alabama, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Kansas, Massachusetts, Maryland, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Oregon, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Michigan.

Boxwoods have long been a critical design feature of the Reynolda landscape, framing the forecourt of south façade of the bungalow since 1937. The boxwoods in landscape architect Thomas Sears's original plans were English dwarf boxwoods; however, this species was problematic and was replanted several times without success. Then, in 2015 as part of its landscape restoration project, Reynolda replanted the forecourt with Justin Brouwers boxwood, also called Korean dwarf boxwood and affectionately known as the "baby boxwoods" among the Reynolda staff.

Jon Roethling, director of Reynolda Gardens, said his staff first noticed discoloration in the boxwoods along the perimeter of the forecourt garden in early fall, 2018. The discoloration was soon diagnosed as blight infection. Shortly after diagnosing the boxwoods, Reynolda removed all infected boxwoods and treated all plants in close proximity to prevent fungal spread. At that time, 80 of the 300 boxwoods in front of Reynolda House were removed.

"Reynolda was not alone in seeing boxwood blight affect our plantings this fall," says Karl Erik, director of operations at Reynolda House. "Landscapes in our surrounding neighborhoods and beyond also suffered. But here at Reynolda, addressing changes in our historic landscape is a particularly sensitive task that we approach with caution, and in consultation with experts in the field."

Erik and Roethling talked with historic garden specialists, researched how other sites were dealing with the blight and ultimately connected with Tim Wood, the product development manager at Spring Meadow Nursery in Grand Haven, Mich. Wood agreed to provide Reynolda with a recommended replacement for the boxwoods, Proven Winners ColorChoice Gem Box *Ilex glabra* (inkberry holly). *Ilex* is proving to be a successful boxwood alternative in Europe, and Wood hopes Reynolda might become a case study for boxwood replacements in North American historic landscapes.

"Boxwood blight has been devastating in Europe," Wood says. "We have been testing alternatives in France where huge numbers of boxwood plants were used in palace, castle and chateaux gardens as low hedges, called parterres. In addition to Gem Box we've been growing Strongbox, Sky Box, Patti-O Box Ilex, as well as Juke Box, a new thornless, nonflowering *Pyracantha* hybrid."

All are recommended boxwood replacement cultivars and can serve different purposes in the landscape, with varying habits and features.

"There is a long history of this landscape being progressive and adapting to change," says Roethling. "The decisions we make today about how to address this epidemic puts Reynolda at the forefront of demonstrating approaches for responding to our changing environment."

Roethling and team favored Gem Box inkberry holly for its compact, rounded habit and small, dark green leaves that develop attractive red tips during the spring. Like boxwood, it responds well to pruning and can be sheared in globes or hedges with round or squared off edges. Unlike many generic versions of the species, it retains its lower foliage as it ages, making it an excellent replacement for boxwood. Inkberry holly is native to the Piedmont Triad and, according to Roethling, is a fitting replacement for the design of Reynolda's forecourt.

"Our responsibility is to both maintain the integrity of the original landscape design and character, and respond to the changing needs of our environment," Roethling said. "We'll be watching these new plants closely and sharing information with the nursery and our colleagues working in other historic landscape and gardens."
