DEFENDANT'S CROSS-MOTION FOR SUMMARY JUGEMENT AND OPPOSITION TO PETITIONERS MOTION

I. STATEMENT OF UNDISPUTED MATERIAL FACTS

The COMICSGATE mark arose organically

- 1. Registrant Ethan Van Sciver is a 20-year veteran comic book artist with credits including Green Lantern for DC and New X-Men for Marvel. Registrant's Exhibit 1, Van Sciver Deposition Excerpts "Ex. 1") at p. 13, 1ines 1-2; p. 14, lines 9-11, 14-18; p. 15, lines 5-9.
- 2. In 2017, Mr. Van Sciver became associated with social media discussions about the current state of affairs of the comic book industry, specifically whether the "Big Two" companies—DC and Marvel—had been overtaken by certain parties more interested in promoting "social justice" than producing interesting comic books. These discussions became associated with the term "COMICGATE," for example twitter discussions were tagged #COMICSGATE. *Id.* at p. 15, lines 14-22; p. 18, lines 17-25.
- 3. In 2018, Defendant Ethan Van Sciver hosted a YouTube channel. Under the label COMICSGATE, Mr. Van Sciver continued leading discussions of various topics in the comic book industry and began receiving donations from his viewers in the form of "Superchats." Under the label COMICSGATE, he also began promoting the crowdfunding of independent

comic books. p. 19, line 19 - p.20, line 6; Exhibit 2 (Registrants YouTube Channel using COMICSGATE in commerce to crowdfund comic books; crowdfunding campaigns.)

- 4. Mr. Van Sciver did NOT put the COMICSGATE mark on his comic books. (He had already established the mark "All Caps Comics" for use on his books.) Ex. 1, p. 97, lines 8-10; p. 98, lines 11-17.
- 5. Petitioner¹ knew of this platform and described its commercial activity. Exhibit 3, Poulter's YouTube Channel videos ("When it comes to the Comicsgate crowd, Ethan Van Sciver and Richard C. Meyer kind of define the genre. They are essentially the ones defining Comicsgate and saying what it is.") ("[Ethan Van Sciver] was able to take a guy who just had an idea for a comic . . . and get him to now \$55,000 on [the crowdfunding site] Indiegogo").
- 6. On Sep. 3, 2018, Vox Day, an uninvited third party, announced he would put COMICSGATE on comic books. Exhibit 4.
- 7. Mr. Van Sciver sent Vox Day a Cease-and-Desist letter. To our knowledge, Vox Day never used the COMICSGATE mark. Exhibit 6.

Antonio Malpica registers COMICSGATE

- 8. On Sep. 3, 2018, Antonio Malpica, acting *pro se*, applied for the COMICSGATE² trademark for use on comic books with the approval of Ethan Van Sciver. 1 TTABVUE 4, **P** 2
- 9. The application proceeded to registration. 1 TTABVUE 4, \(\) 4.

Petitioner Common Sense Press Inc. ("CSP") is the sole proprietorship of Preston Poulter. We will use "Petitioner" or "CSP" when referring to legal actions and "Poulter" when referring to private actions, for example Preston Poulter's social media activity.

At the time of filing COMICS GATE (two words) was an accepted form of the mark. Now the mark is universally seen as a single word, COMICSGATE, which will be used throughout this motion. Legally, the difference is *de minimus*.

10. To date, Petitioner has <u>not</u> shown Mr. Malpica to have made a false representation of a single fact before the USPTO trademark offices and has <u>not</u> shown Mr. Malpica to have subjectively intended to deceive the USPTO.

CSP/Poulter Attempts to Buy and Attempts to Destroy COMICSGATE

- 11. At one point, Petitioner CSP attempted to buy the mark from Mr. Malpica and stated to others, "It's worth money." Exhibits 5, 7.
- 12. Failing to buy the COMICGATE mark, CSP then filed for two applications for the COMICSGATE mark used in comic books. 1 TTABVUE 4, ▶ 1.
- 13. The CSP applications, which have the "intent to use" basis, contain a declaration that Both of CSP's trademark application contain the following sworn declaration:
 - "no other persons . . . have the right to use the mark in commerce, either in the identical form or in such near resemblance as to be likely, when used on or in connection with the goods/services of such other persons, to cause confusion or mistake, or to deceive."
- 14. This declaration if false. In fact, CSP knew others had been using the mark in commerce to crowdfund comic books and so this declaration is false. Ex. 3 (e.g. "He was able to take a guy [Mr. Bryce] who just had an idea for a comic, and you know, just some preliminary artwork and get him to now \$55,000 on Indiegogo.")
- 15. Poulter knew the use of the COMICSGATE mark on the comic books is confusingly similar to using the COMICSGATE mark used in YouTube videos. With his purported trademark rights Poulter threatened to strike YouTube videos using COMICSGATE. Ex. 8 ("[My] trademark powers allow me to strike videos from YouTube for claiming that a certain book is Comicsgate. And they understand what a reign of terror that would cause.")
- 16. CSP owner Preston Poulter has stated: Comicsgate has a "sociopathic leader" [referring to Registrant Van Sciver] who runs Comicsgate "like a crime boss," that it is a "hate group" and that he "seeks its destruction:"

[Comicsgate] has degenerated into a cult of personality around a sociopathic leader who runs the operation like a crime boss.

Poulter YouTube video description, Feb. 3, 2020. Ex. 9.

I've been quite vocal in my opinions about Comicsgate as a hate group. Ethan Van Sciver as the sociopathic leader of a hate movement, and the horrible people who follow him. It's more or less part of my brand at this point.

Poulter Text, April 17, 2021. Ex. 8 at 2.

Comicsgate is right to fear my legal designs on them. By the time I am through, I will have made an example of their chief bully before the courts and robbed them of their vary name.

Poulter Text, June 23, 2021. Ex. 8 at 5.

COMICSGATE use in Commerce

- 17. On or about the spring of 2020, Mr. Malpica licensed the mark to Mr. Anthony Romano. See e.g. 47 TTABVUE 253, Exhibit E at 5 (Declaration of Antonio Malpica).
- 18. Mr. Romano used the mark in commerce when he marketed and sold "The Art of Anthony Romano." 47 TTABVUE 281-82, Exhibit G at 9-10 (Declaration of Anthony Romano)
- 19. The USPTO has acknowledged the COMICSGATE mark was used in commerce. Ex.10 (USPTO notice of termination of Re-examination) ("[R]egistrant has demonstrated use of the mark in commerce . . .").

Quality Control

- 20. The "quality control" associated with COMICSGATE was that the mark owner would only license the mark to a recognized members of the COMICSGATE community, people who were more or less "regulars" on Van Sciver's YouTube channel and who had established that their values were in line with those of the rest of the community. Ex. 1, Van Sciver Decl. at 32-33, 98-99 (Licensees Mr. Malpica and Mr. Romano know what type of comic books the COMICSGATE community would like)
- 21. Anthony Romano's books, "The Art of Anthony Romano" and "Wart the Wizard, Sunday Follies" will be of acceptable quality because Mr. Romano knows what type of comic books the community would like. *Id*.

- 22. Mr. Van Sciver, after taking over ownership of the mark and with the benefit of legal advice, now issues written licenses which include specific "Quality Standards" terms as part of the license agreement. See e.g. 47 TTABVUE 378-80 (Public version of license); 46 TTABVUE Exhibit H at 16-17 (confidential version of license).
- 23. Currently, the mark is in use on the recently published comic book, "Black Riding Hood," Story & Art: by Jon Malin, Colors: Jason Wright, Letters: Eric Weathers and published by Registrant Ethan Van Sciver. Ex. 1 at p. 97; Ex. 11.
- 24. Additional books are currently in production, e.g. "Hunting Alice" and "Detective Dead." As cited above (\$\mathbb{P}\$ 22) the authors of these works have written licenses, including the Quality Standards terms, and have indicated their intentions to use that mark on these books. See \$\mathbb{P}\$ 22; 47 TTABVUE 382-409 (public version of Detective Dead preview); Exhibit H at 20-47 (confidential version of Detective Dead preview).

II. PETITIONERS GROUNDS FOR CANCELLATION

The Petitioner has alleged three grounds for cancellation: Count I: Abandonment and Non-Use; Count II: Fraud; and Count III: No Use of the Mark in Commerce Before the Statement of Use was Filed.

And while these remain the only grounds for cancelation pending in this case, Petitioner's summary judgment motion is not based on any of them.

A. Petitioner is seeking summary judgment on grounds the Board explicitly denied Petitioner

On June 30, 2023, over two and a half years after filing this Cancellation Proceeding and perhaps because the facts—Registrant's use of the mark—no longer support Counts I and III, Petitioner moved to add an additional ground for cancellation, that "the mark has been abandoned through naked licensing and a failure to "enforce" or police the mark. 32 TTABVUE 9, lines 13-17 (quoting the Board's Order, 35 TTABVUE 4) (emphasis added). The Board

DENIED this motion. 35 TTABVUE. Specifically with respect to the naked licensing allegation, the Board held that Petitioner "failed to allege any facts in support thereof, to identify the basis for these new claims of abandonment, or to explain why they were not earlier raised." *Id.* at 6.

Undaunted, Petitioner simply ignored the Order and filed its summary judgment motion arguing, "the license was a naked license." 47 TTABVUE 6-7. To be clear, this allegation is frivolous as will be briefly shown below, but Registrant is not waiving the issue of Petitioner's inequitable behavior. Registrant believes Petitioner's ignoring this Board's Order merits sanctions and Registrant moves for DENIAL of Petitioner's motion for summary judgment as that sanction.

III. PETITIONERS COUNTS I AND III SHOULD BE DISMISSED

As listed above, Counts I and II both depend on the mark not being used in commerce.

The first alleges no use at all, the third count alleges no use in the window of time before the "statement of use" in the TM prosecution.

A. There was no abandonment.

The undisputed facts show that the mark was used in commerce prior to the "statement of use" deadline, that the USPTO has recognized this use and, indeed, the mark is still in use to this date. Ex. 10 (Notice of Termination of Re-examination including the USPTO finding that "registrant has demonstrated use of the mark in commerce for all goods, subject to the proceeding.); Ex. 11 (COMICSGATE comic "Black Riding Hood")

B. There is no "naked licensing"

While the newly presented grounds of cancellation, abandonment due to naked licensing, is not properly before this Board, it is nonetheless frivolous. Petitioner cannot meet its "heavy burden" merely because the licensor relies on the licensee to control the quality of the marked product.

"Because a finding of inadequate control can result in a forfeiture of trademark rights, courts impose a heavy burden on the person asserting a lack of reasonable control by a licensor. As a general matter, courts are reluctant to interfere with the marketing arrangements adopted by trademark owners, and minimal control over the quality of a licensee's goods or services is often sufficient to satisfy the requirement imposed under this Section."

Licensing of Trademarks, Restatement (Third) of Unfair Competition § 33 (1995). Also, in similar cases, where the licensor and licensee have a preexisting relationship, courts often allow the licensee to handle quality control. See e.g. *Boss Products, Inc. v. Port-A-Pit Bar-B-Que of Edgerton, Inc.*, No. 3:05–CV–293, 2009 WL 260793 (S.D. Ind., February 27, 2017) and cases cited therein. In *Boss Products* the Court noted that the Seventh Circuit advocates a "flexible approach" to trademark oversight, including allowing the trademark owner to rely on the expertise of licensees where appropriate. *Id.* at *6. Specifically, *Boss Products* involved the trademark "Port-A-Pit" for restaurant products and services. When certain long-standing agreements with Port-A-Pit Bar-B-Que of Edgerton, Inc. ("Edgerton") were terminated, trademark owner Boss Products, Inc. insisted Edgerton stop using the Port-A-Pit mark.

Edgerton argued that the trademark had been abandoned due to "naked licensing." Their agreements with Boss Products did not include terms by which the trademark owner exercised any control over the trademark rights it claimed to assert.

The Court disagreed, noting that Edgerton had not asserted that it was offering a lower quality of products or services than those contemplated by the parties' agreements, or that the sauce(s) it was using constituted a significant deviation from the owner's quality standards, or that Edgerton's actions lessened the significance of the "Port–A–Pit" mark. *Id.* at *5-*6. Finally, the court noted that the parties "close working relationship" justifiably allowed the owner to rely on Edgerton's intimacy with the standards and procedures to ensure consistent quality. Thus, it would depart from the purpose of trademark law to find an abandonment simply for want of inspection and control formalities. *Id.* (citing *Taco Cabana Intern., Inc. v. Two Pesos, Inc.*, 932 F.2d 1113, 1121 (5th Cir.1991))

In the case of the COMICSGATE licensees, there was a preexisting relationship as members of the COMICSGATE community. Ex. 1 (Van Sciver Decl.) at p. 99. Accordingly, the licensee could be trusted to know what type of comic books the community would like.

C. Petitioner Cannot Prove That the Registered Mark Has Lost All Capacity As a Source Indicator

Abandonment cannot be found for another, fundamental reason. Petitioner CSP allegations are faulty and incomplete and do not properly allege all the elements for a finding of abandonment. It merely alleges, "Registrant is not currently using, has discontinued using, and has not used for at least the past three years, and possibly longer, the COMICS GATE mark" and "Registrant's discontinuance of use of the mark COMICS GATE . . . was accompanied by Registrant's intent not to resume use of the mark." 1 TTABVUE 5–6.

But Petitioner leaves out an additional, critical element necessary for finding abandonment. Petitioner must also prove that the mark has lost all capacity as a source indicator for registrant's comics. *See e.g. Leatherwood Scopes International, Inc. v. Leatherwood*, 63 U.S.P.Q.2d 1699, 1703 (T.T.A.B. 2002); J. Thomas McCarthy on Trademarks and Unfair Competition, § 20:57 (5th ed., 2021 update) ("To state a claim that the registrant's mark has been abandoned, petitioner must allege that the mark has lost all capacity as a source indicator for registrant's goods.")

Moreover, Petitioner's own actions prove fatal to Petitioner's abandonment claim;

Petitioner offered to buy the mark from the Registrant. See Ex. 5 (Petitioner attempting to purchase Mark from Mr. Malpica); Ex. 7 (Petitioner admitting "it's worth money"). This is substantial evidence that the mark retains significance as an indication of origin and a symbol of good will. *See Sterling Brewers, Inc. v. Schenley Industries, Inc.*, 441 F.2d 675, 679 (C.C.P.A. 1971). (reservoir of good will remaining in registrant's mark, after eight years of non-use, revealed by cancellation petitioner's willingness "to pay a considerable sum for the rights to the

mark.") Thus, Petitioner's own behavior shows Petitioner itself believes the mark was not

abandoned in that it retains value in the mind of the public.

IV. Petitioner has not shown a single action of Registrant was dishonest.

To prevail on its Fraud, Count II, Petitioner must prove:

1. Registrant made a false representation of a material fact.

2. Registrant knew that the representation was false ("scienter").

3. Registrant intended to deceive the USPTO.

4. Reasonable reliance on the misrepresentation, and

5. Damage proximately resulting from such reliance.

The Federal Circuit emphasized that proof of intent to deceive is always an essential

element of fraud: "subjective intent to deceive, however difficult it may be to prove, is an

indispensable element in the analysis." In re Bose Corp., 580 F.3d 1240, 1245 (Fed. Cir. 2009).

Mr. Malpica's entire trademark application file has been served on Petitioner, as well as

the re-examination proceedings. Petitioner has not, and cannot, show a single false

representation, much less subjective intent to deceive the USPTO by Mr. Malpica, a non-lawyer

who submitted all his responses to the USPTO in good faith.

V. CONCLUSION

Registrant requests all three counts of this cancellation proceeding be DISMISSED and

any other remedy the Board sees fit and proper.

- 1 A I'm a comic book publisher, author, writer,
- 2 artist, and also a YouTuber.
- 3 Q Okay. So how long have you been in this line
- 4 of work?
- 5 A Thirty-one years. I've been -- well, I've
- 6 been making comic books for thirty-one years.
- 7 Q Okay.
- 8 A YouTube since about 2017. I think that's when
- 9 I started, officially started broadcasting about comics
- 10 and the culture.
- 11 Q Okay. More generally not necessarily
- 12 ComicsGate, which I'll get to, but comics, I guess more
- 13 broadly, right?
- 14 A Yeah. I think the first couple of months were
- 15 -- were mostly about comics more broadly, interviewing
- 16 my peers, things like that.

- 18 comic sphere; is that correct?
- 19 A Yeah. I think so. You could go back and
- 20 look. The videos are there, you know?

BIC: Will this be a shared universe imprint like what you are doing with Arkhaven Comics and Alt-Hero?

Vox: No, this is not a shared universe. We set it up as a means of giving ComicsGaters a means of broad and reliable distribution that cannot be shut down by SJWs in the comics industry.

BIC: Do you have any creators already lined up? Who are they?

Vox: Will Caligan is the first. We do have others lined up, but I prefer not to identify them until their comics or graphic novels are ready for publication. Vox: The ride never ends.





Dear Mr. Beale:

This firm represents Ethan Van Sciver who owns and has been maintaining and broadcasting for an extended period of time a YouTube Channel under the ComicsGate name and in which he holds and maintains a common law trademark and service mark. It has come to my client's attention that you intend to, and/or have already begun to, circulate a stamp, imprint or other printed material for use by third parties and which contains Mr. Van Sciver's ComicsGate mark, without any authorization or other form of consent by Mr. Van Sciver.

Neither you nor any business in which you have an interest or which you manage has any right whatsoever to use the mark ComicsGate in the fashion which you are doing and/or propose to do in some manner. Your attempt to do so is clearly an effort by you to use the mark in a manner which is confusingly similar to Mr. Van Sciver's mark in the same industries as Mr. Van Sciver's mark already exists and is disseminated in interstate commerce. Demand is therefore being made on you on behalf of Mr. Van Sciver that you and any other persons or organizations with which you have an interest or are affiliated and which are using ComicsGate immediately and permanently cease and desist the unauthorized copying and distribution of that mark, including but not limited to any uses of it on any stamp, imprint, sticker, etc. intended for distribution in any manner on a comic book or other printed material, on a website, or elsewhere. Further, in no way may you suggest that you are in any way sponsored by, approved by or affiliated with Mr. Van Sciver or ComicsGate.



WC labeled Brad Ashford a doxxer and tried to destroy his Handyman IGG campaign simply because Crypto helped him set the page up. George Alexopolous objected and was subjected to a War Campaign tribunal which caused him to leave. Doug TenNapel also left over this incident. All three figures have been constantly harassed ever since.

- Doug Garrett was similarly labeled a doxxer after he failed to thank Jon Malin and refused to denounce Jon Del Arroz after the conclusion for his campaign for "Legends of the Lone Wolf."
- TUG called Hasbro to get Aibrey Sitterson fired for a tweet.
